
## Growl as a Noun

#### Definitions of "Growl" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "growl" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A low guttural sound made in the throat by a hostile dog or other animal.
- The sound of growling (as made by animals.
- A low guttural sound or utterance made by a person, especially to express hostility or anger.






# Synonyms of "Growl" as a noun (14 Words)

<u>bark</u>	A sound resembling a bark typically one made by someone laughing or coughing. A short <b>bark</b> of laughter.
barking	A sailing ship with 3 (or more) masts.
baying	A small recess opening off a larger room.
bellow	United States author (born in Canada) whose novels influenced American literature after World War II (1915-2005. <i>His bellow filled the hallway.</i>



bellowing	United States author (born in Canada) whose novels influenced American literature after World War II (1915-2005.
clamour	A loud and confused noise, especially that of people shouting. The growing public <b>clamour</b> for more police officers on the beat.
clamouring	Loud and persistent outcry from many people.
cry	A pack of hounds. There was a <b>cry</b> of Silence.
crying	The shedding of tears. The <b>crying</b> of a child was heard.
growling	A gruff or angry utterance suggestive of the growling of an animal. <i>Hearing that <b>growling</b> was so scary.</i>
<u>howl</u>	The long plaintive cry of a hound or a wolf. I got <b>howl</b> s of protest from readers.
howling	A long loud emotional utterance. Their <b>howling</b> had no effect.
<u>roar</u>	A very loud, deep, prolonged sound made by something inanimate. <i>The <b>roar</b> of the sea.</i>
roaring	The sound made by a lion.





### Usage Examples of "Growl" as a noun

- The bulldog lumbered to her feet with a threatening growl.
- The growl of diesel engines.
- With a growl of fury, he tightened his grip.





## Growl as a Verb

#### Definitions of "Growl" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "growl" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- To utter or emit low dull rumbling sounds.
- (of a thing) make a low or harsh rumbling sound.
- (of a person) say something in a low grating voice, typically in a hostile or angry manner.
- (of an animal, especially a dog) make a low guttural sound in the throat.





## Synonyms of "Growl" as a verb (26 Words)

bang	Leap jerk bang. I <b>bang</b> ed my head on the low beams.
<u>bark</u>	Tan a skin with bark tannins. The dogs <b>bark</b> ed at the stranger.
<u>bay</u>	Utter in deep prolonged tones.
beat	Give a beating to subject to a beating either as a punishment or as an act of aggression. Drums were <b>beat</b> ing in the distance.
blast	Use explosives on. Four low flying jets <b>blast</b> ed down the glen.
boom	(of a bittern) utter its characteristic resonant cry. <i>Thunder <b>boom</b>ed in the sky.</i>
<u>echo</u>	Ring or echo with sound. The house <b>echo</b> ed with shouts.



fling	Start or engage in (an activity or enterprise) with great energy and enthusiasm. <i>Fling</i> the frisbee.
<u>grumble</u>	Make complaining remarks or noises under one's breath. She <b>grumble</b> s when she feels overworked.
hurl	Utter with force; utter vehemently. The demonstrators <b>hurl</b> ed abuse at councillors.
<u>pound</u>	Place or shut up in a pound. The locks <b>pound</b> the water of the canal.
resound	Ring or echo with sound. Whatever they do in the Nineties will not <b>resound</b> in the way that their earlier achievements did.
reverberate	Return or re-echo (a sound. The waves <b>reverberate</b> as far away as the end of the building.
ring	Ring or echo with sound. <i>Ring</i> birds.
<u>roar</u>	Make a loud noise, as of animal. A huge fire <b>roar</b> ed in the grate.
<u>rumble</u>	Make a continuous deep, resonant sound. <i>He g<b>rumble</b>d a rude response.</i>
say abruptly	Have or contain a certain wording or form.
say angrily	Utter aloud.
say brusquely	Communicate or express nonverbally.
say nastily	Express in words.
say roughly	Report or maintain.
snap	Close with a snapping motion. <i>He <b>snap</b>ped indignantly.</i>
<u>snarl</u>	Make a snarling noise or move with a snarling noise. The guard <b>snarl</b> ed at us.
<u>thud</u>	Make a dull sound. Bullets were <b>thud</b> ding against the wall.
thump	Make a dull sound. She <b>thump</b> ed on the cottage door.
yap	Give a sharp, shrill bark. The dachshunds <b>yap</b> ped at his heels.






### Usage Examples of "Growl" as a verb

- The dogs yapped and growled at his heels.
- 'Keep out of this,' he growled.
- Thunder growls without warning from a summer sky.





# Associations of "Growl" (30 Words)

angry	Severely inflamed and painful. An <b>angry</b> customer.
bawl	Weep or cry noisily. We don t need fans <b>bawl</b> ing at us from two or three yards away
bellow	A deep roaring shout or sound. A dozen large men were <b>bellow</b> ing Jerusalem.
complain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. You never listen to me Larry <b>complain</b> ed.
croon	Sing softly. He sang in a gentle highly expressive <b>croon</b> .
cry	Bring into a particular state by crying. <i>Had a good <b>cry</b>.</i>
gripe	Secure a boat with gripes. My only <b>gripe</b> is the size of the page numbers.



<u>grumble</u>	A low rumbling sound. In the distance I heard a <b>grumble</b> of thunder.
guttural	A guttural consonant e g k g or other speech sound. His parents <b>guttural</b> central European accent.
hiss	Express disapproval of someone by hissing. <i>He was <b>hiss</b>ed off the stage.</i>
holler	Utter a sudden loud cry. He <b>holler</b> ed out to surrender our weapons.
<u>howl</u>	Make a howling sound. The <b>howl</b> of the wind made him restless.
loud	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. They shouted as <b>loud</b> as they could.
moan	Make a sound resembling a human moan. My friend always <b>moan</b> s that I never make her a cake.
resounding	(of a sound) loud enough to reverberate. A <b>resounding</b> smack across the face.
<u>roar</u>	(of a person or crowd) utter a loud, deep, prolonged sound, typically from anger, pain, or excitement. She waited for the lion s <b>roar</b> .
<u>rumble</u>	(of a person's stomach) make a deep, resonant sound due to hunger. It wouldn t need a genius to <b>rumble</b> my little game.
screech	Make a high pitched screeching noise. A <b>screech</b> of brakes.
<u>shout</u>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. The angry mother <b>shout</b> ed at the teacher.
shriek	Be very obvious or strikingly discordant. <i>Shrieks of laughter.</i>
<u>snarl</u>	Make a snarling noise or move with a snarling noise. The guard <b>snarl</b> ed at us.
squawk	The noise of squawking. She awoke to the <b>squawk</b> of chickens.
<u>squeal</u>	Make a squeal. She feared they would victimize her for <b>squeal</b> ing on their pals.
<u>squelch</u>	A soft sucking sound made when pressure is applied to liquid or mud. <b>Squelch</b> any sign of dissent.
thunder	Be the case that thunder is being heard. The bus <b>thunder</b> ed down the road.



wail	Utter a wail. But why she <b>wail</b> ed.
<u>whimper</u>	A whimpering sound. <i>He s not dead is he she <b>whimper</b>ed</i> .
whine	Give or make a long, high-pitched complaining cry or sound. <i>The dog gave a small whine</i> .
whinny	Of a horse make a whinny. The pony whinnied and tossed his head happily.
<u>yell</u>	An organized cheer, especially one used to support a sports team. I <b>yell</b> ed to her from the window but she couldn t hear me.
