

bad-tempered Annoyed and irritable.

Resembling or likened to a bear, typically in being rough, surly, or

bearish clumsy.

cantankerous

Having a difficult and contrary disposition.

He can be a cantankerous old fossil at times.

churlish Rude and boorish.

It seems **churlish** to complain.

crabbed (of style) contorted and difficult to understand.

A crabbed unhappy middle age.



crabby Irritable.

He was **crabby** at having his siesta interrupted.

Unpredictably difficult in operation; likely to be troublesome.

fractious Rockets were much too **fractious** to be tested near thickly populated

areas.

fussy

Overcrowded or cluttered with detail.

Eleanor patted her hair with quick fussy movements.

Irritable and bad-tempered; grumpy; complaining.

grouchy

The old man grew sulky and grouchy.

ill-humoured Brusque and surly and forbidding.

ill-natured Having an irritable and unpleasant disposition.

ill-tempered Annoyed and irritable.

irascible Characterized by anger.

An irascible response.

Easily irritated or annoyed.

irritable The seeds have been reputed to help conditions such as **irritable**

bladder.

peevish Having or showing an irritable disposition.

A thin **peevish** voice.

PepperyHaving the piquant burning taste of peppers.

Nasturtiums have a **peppery** taste.

pettish Easily irritated or annoyed.

He comes across in his journal entries as spoiled and **pettish**.

Covered in prickles.

prickly

Masses of prickly brambles.

short-tempered Quickly aroused to anger.



Bad-tempered and unfriendly.

The porter left with a **surly** expression.

testy Easily irritated; impatient and somewhat bad-tempered.

His **testy** disapproving father.

tetchy Easily irritated or annoyed.

A **tetchy** statement.

touchy Quick to take offense. *A touchy subject.*

Readily expressing anger or irritation.

waspish

He had a waspish tongue.
