| bodyguard | A group of men who escort and protect some important person. |
| captor | A person that catches or confines another. <i>He managed to escape from his captors two nights later.</i> |
| chaperone | Accompany as a chaperone. <i>She chaperoned the children at all times.</i> |
| convoy | A collection of merchant ships with an escort of warships. <i>The warships convoyed the merchant ships across the Pacific.</i> |
| defence | Protection from harm. <i>Wire netting is the best defence against rabbits.</i> |
| defend | Protect or fight for as a champion. <i>They were forced to defend for long periods.</i> |
| defense | An organization of defenders that provides resistance against attack. <i>A good boxer needs a good defense.</i> |
| defensible | Capable of being defended. <i>A morally defensible penal system.</i> |
| escape | Escape potentially unpleasant consequences get away with a forbidden action. <i>Their escape route.</i> |
| guardian | A person who cares for persons or property. <i>I am acting as guardian of my late brother s family.</i> |
| guide | Use as a guide. <i>A tour guide.</i> |
| helmet | A predatory mollusc with a squat heavy shell, which lives in tropical and temperate seas. |
| preclusive | Preventing something from happening; restrictive. <i>No preclusive action was taken.</i> |

| preventive | Designed to keep something undesirable such as illness or harm from occurring. <i>Quinine was used as a malaria preventive.</i> |
| probation | (law) a way of dealing with offenders without imprisoning them; a defendant found guilty of a crime is released by the court without imprisonment subject to conditions imposed by the court. <i>For an initial period of probation your manager will closely monitor your progress.</i> |
| protect | Use tariffs to favor domestic industry. <i>Security products are designed to protect information from unauthorized access.</i> |
| protective | Intended or adapted to afford protection of some kind. <i>The use of protective masks and equipment.</i> |
| protector | A person or thing that protects someone or something. <i>A man who became her protector adviser and friend.</i> |
| safeguard | Make safe. <i>A framework which safeguards employees from exploitation.</i> |
| safely | In a way that is not likely to cause or lead to harm or injury. <i>You can safely ignore that advice.</i> |
| safety | The condition of being protected from or unlikely to cause danger, risk, or injury. <i>They should leave for their own safety.</i> |
| secretive | (of a person's expression or manner) having an enigmatic or conspiratorial quality. <i>She was very secretive about her past.</i> |
| security | Procedures followed or measures taken to ensure the security of a state or organization. <i>The head of security was a former policeman.</i> |
| sentry | A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>On sentry duty.</i> |
| shelter | Provide shelter for. <i>People were sheltering under store canopies and trees.</i> |
| tenable | (of an office, position, scholarship, etc.) able to be held or used. <i>Such a simplistic approach is no longer tenable.</i> |
| tutelar | Providing protective supervision; watching over or safeguarding. <i>Tutelary gods.</i> |
| ward | The grooves in the bit of a key that correspond to the wards in a lock. <i>I saw them keeping ward at one of those huge gates.</i> |

watchman A man employed to look after an empty building, especially at night.
*A night **watchman**.*
