## Guest as a Noun

### Definitions of "Guest" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “guest” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person invited to take part in a radio or television programme or other entertainment.*
- *Any computer that is hooked up to a computer network.*
- *A person invited to participate in an official event.*
- *A person who is invited to visit someone's home or attend a particular social occasion.*
- *A customer at a restaurant.*
- *A small invertebrate that lives unharmed within an ants' nest.*
- *A person staying at a hotel or guest house.*
- *A customer of a hotel or restaurant etc.*
- *United States journalist (born in England) noted for his syndicated homey verse (1881-1959).*
- *(computer science) any computer that is hooked up to a computer network.*
- *A visitor to whom hospitality is extended.*



## Synonyms of "Guest" as a noun (9 Words)

<b>caller</b>	An investor who buys a call option. <i>You need a fiddler and a <b>caller</b> for country dancing.</i>
<b>client</b>	A person who seeks the advice of a lawyer. <i>Insurance tailor made to a <b>client</b>'s specific requirements.</i>
<b>edgar albert guest</b>	A visitor to whom hospitality is extended.
<b>edgar guest</b>	Any computer that is hooked up to a computer network.
<b>invitee</b>	A visitor to whom hospitality is extended. <i>Wedding <b>invitees</b> will undoubtedly send gifts.</i>
<b>node</b>	A lymph node or other structure consisting of a small mass of differentiated tissue. <i>The intersections of two or more such arteries would clearly become major <b>nodes</b> of traffic and urban activity.</i>

**patron** A patrician in relation to a client.  
*We surveyed the plushness of the hotel and its sleek well dressed **patrons**.*

**person staying** A grammatical category used in the classification of pronouns, possessive determiners, and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker, the addressee, or a third party.

**visitor** A person visiting someone or somewhere, especially socially or as a tourist.  
*She s a frequent **visitor** to London.*



## Usage Examples of "Guest" as a noun

- *A regular guest on the morning show.*
- *A guest speaker.*
- *A reduction for guests staying seven nights or more.*
- *I have two guests coming to dinner tonight.*
- *The guest list.*

- *He was in Warsaw as a guest of the Polish government.*



## Associations of "Guest" (30 Words)

- client** A person or organization using the services of a lawyer or other professional person or company.  
*A **client** referred for counselling.*
- clientele** Clients collectively.  
*They have an upper class **clientele**.*
- customer** Someone who pays for goods or services.  
*Mr Harrison was a regular **customer** at the Golden Lion.*
- exhibitor** A person who displays works of art or other items of interest at an exhibition.  
*The trade fair attracted 89 **exhibitors** and 37 000 visitors.*
- facilitator** A person or thing that makes an action or process easy or easier.  
*A programme run by trained **facilitators**.*

<b><u>greet</u></b>	Send greetings to. <i>Some of the customers <b>greeted</b> the barman in Gaelic.</i>
<b>greeting</b>	(usually plural) an acknowledgment or expression of good will (especially on meeting). <i>Warm <b>greetings</b> to you all.</i>
<b><u>hello</u></b>	Say or shout hello. <i>I pressed the phone button and <b>helloed</b>.</i>
<b><u>hospitable</u></b>	Favorable to life and growth. <i>A <b>hospitable</b> act.</i>
<b>hospitality</b>	Relating to or denoting the business of entertaining clients, conference delegates, or other official visitors. <i>Scotland is renowned for its <b>hospitality</b>.</i>
<b><u>host</u></b>	A person who acts as host at formal occasions makes an introductory speech and introduces other speakers. <i>Innsbruck once played <b>host</b> to the Winter Olympics.</i>
<b>hostess</b>	A woman steward on an airplane. <i>A game show <b>hostess</b>.</i>
<b><u>hotel</u></b>	A code word representing the letter H, used in radio communication. <i>A five star <b>hotel</b>.</i>
<b><u>intruder</u></b>	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>The <b>intruder</b> had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.</i>
<b>invite</b>	Invite someone to one's house. <i><b>Invite</b> criticism.</i>
<b>landholder</b>	A person who owns land, especially one who either makes their living from it or rents it out to others.
<b>moderator</b>	A person who reviews examination papers to ensure consistency, or otherwise oversees an examination. <i>In a fast reactor there is no <b>moderator</b> to slow the reaction down.</i>
<b><u>own</u></b>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>She makes her <b>own</b> clothes.</i>
<b><u>owner</u></b>	Someone who owns (is legal possessor of) a business. <i>They are searching for the <b>owner</b> of the car.</i>
<b>panelist</b>	A member of a panel.
<b><u>proprietor</u></b>	The owner of a business, or a holder of property. <i>By 1640 he was himself the <b>proprietor</b> of a three hundred acre tract.</i>

<b>resort</b>	The action of resorting to a course of action in a difficult situation. <i>Her only <b>resort</b> is a private operation.</i>
<b>salute</b>	Make a formal salute to. <i>A musical <b>salute</b> to the composer on his birthday.</i>
<b>speaker</b>	Electro-acoustic transducer that converts electrical signals into sounds loud enough to be heard at a distance. <i>Language communication involves the interrelation between <b>speaker</b> and hearer.</i>
<b>tourist</b>	Travel as a tourist. <i>The pyramids have drawn <b>tourists</b> to Egypt.</i>
<b>trespasser</b>	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>A <b>trespasser</b> on his land.</i>
<b>visiting</b>	(of an academic) working for a fixed period of time at another institution. <i>A <b>visiting</b> speaker.</i>
<b>visitor</b>	A person with the right or duty of occasionally inspecting and reporting on a college or other academic institution. <i>The <b>visitors</b> came back into the game with two penalty goals.</i>
<b>welcome</b>	The state of being welcome. <i>Made the children feel <b>welcome</b>.</i>
<b>welcoming</b>	Very cordial. <i>A <b>welcoming</b> smile.</i>
