- *A person who is invited to visit someone's home or attend a particular social occasion.*
- *A customer at a restaurant.*
- *A small invertebrate that lives unharmed within an ants' nest.*
- *A person staying at a hotel or guest house.*
- *A customer of a hotel or restaurant etc.*
- *United States journalist (born in England) noted for his syndicated homey verse (1881-1959).*
- *(computer science) any computer that is hooked up to a computer network.*
- *A visitor to whom hospitality is extended.*



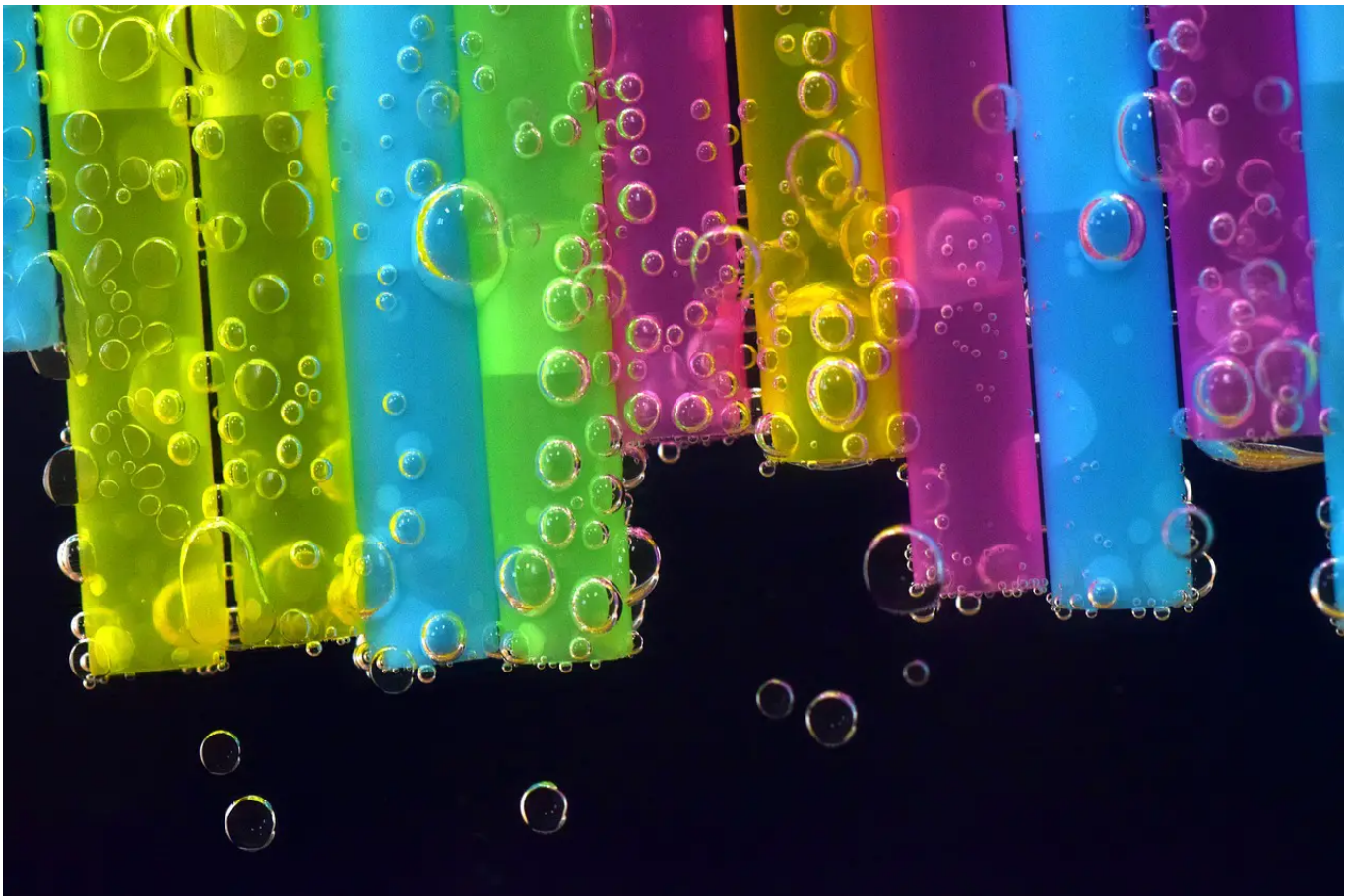
Synonyms of "Guest" as a noun (9 Words)

caller	An investor who buys a call option. <i>You need a fiddler and a caller for country dancing.</i>
client	A person who seeks the advice of a lawyer. <i>Insurance tailor made to a client's specific requirements.</i>
edgar albert guest	A visitor to whom hospitality is extended.
edgar guest	Any computer that is hooked up to a computer network.
invitee	A visitor to whom hospitality is extended. <i>Wedding invitees will undoubtedly send gifts.</i>
node	A lymph node or other structure consisting of a small mass of differentiated tissue. <i>The intersections of two or more such arteries would clearly become major nodes of traffic and urban activity.</i>

patron A patrician in relation to a client.
*We surveyed the plushness of the hotel and its sleek well dressed **patrons**.*

person staying A grammatical category used in the classification of pronouns, possessive determiners, and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker, the addressee, or a third party.

visitor A person visiting someone or somewhere, especially socially or as a tourist.
*She s a frequent **visitor** to London.*



Usage Examples of "Guest" as a noun

- *A regular guest on the morning show.*
- *A guest speaker.*
- *A reduction for guests staying seven nights or more.*
- *I have two guests coming to dinner tonight.*
- *The guest list.*

- *He was in Warsaw as a guest of the Polish government.*



Associations of "Guest" (30 Words)

client	A person or organization using the services of a lawyer or other professional person or company. <i>A client referred for counselling.</i>
clientele	Clients collectively. <i>They have an upper class clientele.</i>
customer	Someone who pays for goods or services. <i>Mr Harrison was a regular customer at the Golden Lion.</i>
exhibitor	A person who displays works of art or other items of interest at an exhibition. <i>The trade fair attracted 89 exhibitors and 37 000 visitors.</i>
facilitator	A person or thing that makes an action or process easy or easier. <i>A programme run by trained facilitators.</i>

<u>greet</u>	Send greetings to. <i>Some of the customers greeted the barman in Gaelic.</i>
greeting	(usually plural) an acknowledgment or expression of good will (especially on meeting). <i>Warm greetings to you all.</i>
<u>hello</u>	Say or shout hello. <i>I pressed the phone button and helloed.</i>
<u>hospitable</u>	Favorable to life and growth. <i>A hospitable act.</i>
hospitality	Relating to or denoting the business of entertaining clients, conference delegates, or other official visitors. <i>Scotland is renowned for its hospitality.</i>
<u>host</u>	A person who acts as host at formal occasions makes an introductory speech and introduces other speakers. <i>Innsbruck once played host to the Winter Olympics.</i>
hostess	A woman steward on an airplane. <i>A game show hostess.</i>
<u>hotel</u>	A code word representing the letter H, used in radio communication. <i>A five star hotel.</i>
<u>intruder</u>	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>The intruder had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.</i>
invite	Invite someone to one's house. <i>Invite criticism.</i>
landholder	A person who owns land, especially one who either makes their living from it or rents it out to others.
moderator	A person who reviews examination papers to ensure consistency, or otherwise oversees an examination. <i>In a fast reactor there is no moderator to slow the reaction down.</i>
<u>own</u>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>She makes her own clothes.</i>
<u>owner</u>	Someone who owns (is legal possessor of) a business. <i>They are searching for the owner of the car.</i>
panelist	A member of a panel.
<u>proprietor</u>	The owner of a business, or a holder of property. <i>By 1640 he was himself the proprietor of a three hundred acre tract.</i>

resort	The action of resorting to a course of action in a difficult situation. <i>Her only resort is a private operation.</i>
salute	Make a formal salute to. <i>A musical salute to the composer on his birthday.</i>
<u>speaker</u>	Electro-acoustic transducer that converts electrical signals into sounds loud enough to be heard at a distance. <i>Language communication involves the interrelation between speaker and hearer.</i>
tourist	Travel as a tourist. <i>The pyramids have drawn tourists to Egypt.</i>
trespasser	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>A trespasser on his land.</i>
visiting	(of an academic) working for a fixed period of time at another institution. <i>A visiting speaker.</i>
<u>visitor</u>	A person with the right or duty of occasionally inspecting and reporting on a college or other academic institution. <i>The visitors came back into the game with two penalty goals.</i>
welcome	The state of being welcome. <i>Made the children feel welcome.</i>
<u>welcoming</u>	Very cordial. <i>A welcoming smile.</i>
