Definitions of "Guiding" as an adjective

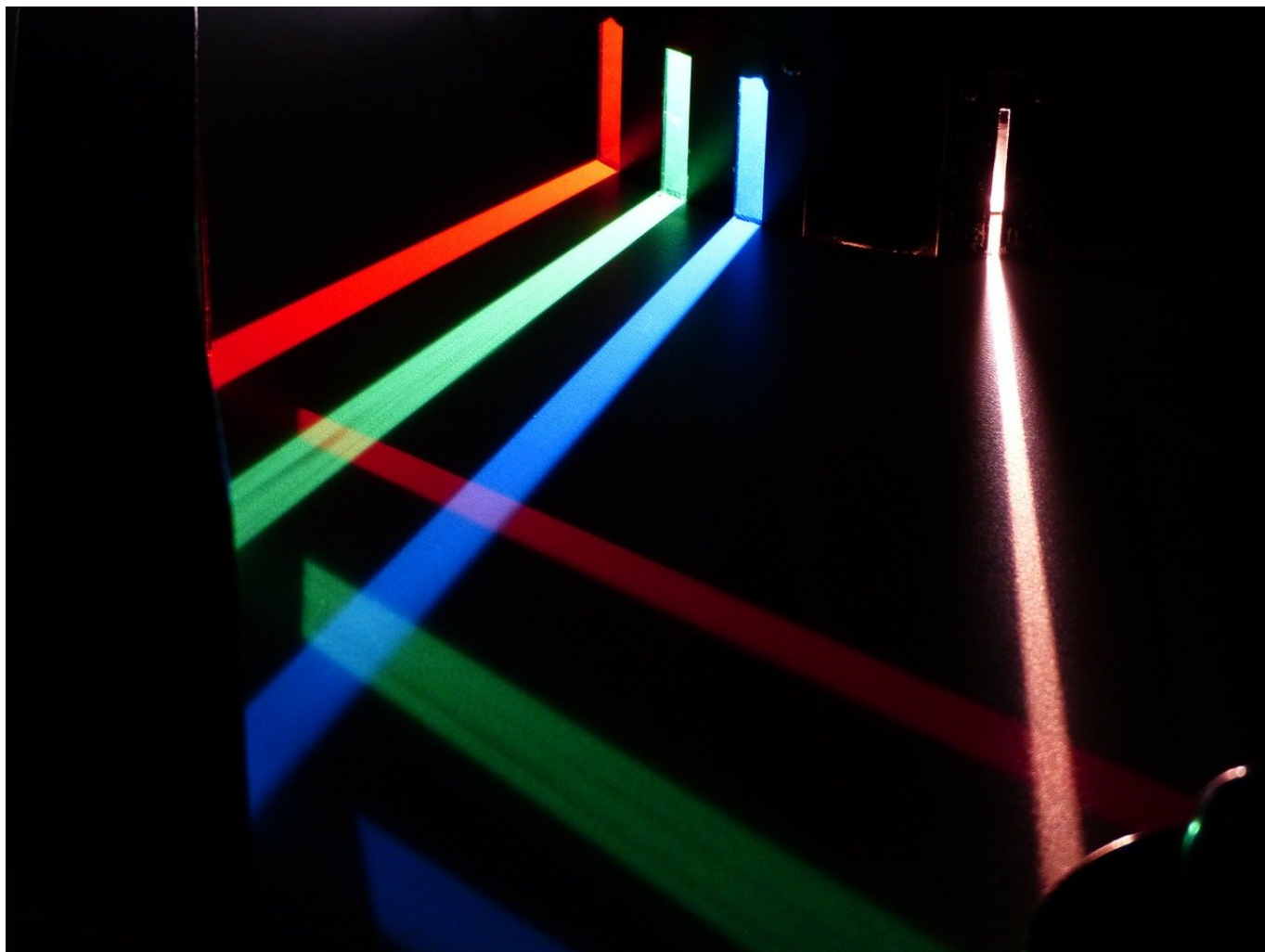
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “guiding” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Showing the way by conducting or leading; imposing direction on.*
- *Exerting control or influence.*



Synonyms of "Guiding" as an adjective (3 Words)

- directing** Direct in spatial dimensions; proceeding without deviation or interruption; straight and short.
*Felt his mother's **directing** arm around him.*
- directional** Having a particular direction of motion, progression, or orientation.
*A **directional** womenswear designer.*
- directive** Showing the way by conducting or leading; imposing direction on.
*The authority is seeking a **directive** role in energy policy.*

Associations of "Guiding" (30 Words)

antimony	A metallic element having four allotropic forms; used in a wide variety of alloys; found in stibnite.
<u>asterisk</u>	Mark with an asterisk. <i>He had asterisked the things about the case that still bothered him.</i>
<u>bookmark</u>	A record of the address of a website, file, or other data made to enable quick access in future. <i>Fans will want to bookmark this site.</i>
catalog	Make a catalogue compile a catalogue. <i>He is cataloguing his photographic negatives.</i>
catalogue	Enter an item in a catalogue. <i>The report catalogues dangerous work practices in the company.</i>
<u>clue</u>	A slight indication. <i>A long pondered clue in a half completed crossword.</i>

connotation	An idea or feeling which a word invokes for a person in addition to its literal or primary meaning. <i>The word discipline has unhappy connotations of punishment and repression.</i>
cue	Give a cue to or for. <i>Have a list of needs and questions on paper to cue you.</i>
denotation	The literal or primary meaning of a word, in contrast to the feelings or ideas that the word suggests. <i>Beyond their immediate denotation the words have a connotative power.</i>
diacritical	Capable of distinguishing.
directive	A pronouncement encouraging or banning some activity. <i>The boss loves to send us directives.</i>
handbook	A book giving information such as facts on a particular subject or instructions for operating a machine. <i>The handbook says an alkaline battery should be good for around 2000 hours of continuous performance.</i>
hint	Drop a hint intimate by a hint. <i>Randall smiled with a hint of mockery.</i>
index	Link the value of prices wages or other payments automatically to the value of a price index. <i>She offered help in indexing my text book on bookselling.</i>
indicant	Something that serves to indicate or suggest. <i>Symptoms are the prime indicants of disease.</i>
indication	A reason to prescribe a drug or perform a procedure. <i>Heavy bleeding is a common indication for hysterectomy.</i>
key	A lever as in a keyboard that actuates a mechanism when depressed. <i>Nat turned the key in the ignition.</i>
label	Distinguish as a compound or molecule by introducing a labeled atom. <i>The alcohol content is clearly stated on the label.</i>
lead	A position of being the initiator of something and an example that others will follow especially in the phrase take the lead. <i>They didn't follow our lead.</i>
leading	The activity of leading. <i>A number of leading politicians.</i>
mark	Make underscoring marks. <i>The citizens mark the anniversary of the revolution with a march and a parade.</i>

principle	A fundamental truth or proposition that serves as the foundation for a system of belief or behaviour or for a chain of reasoning. <i>The principle of jet propulsion.</i>
sign	Commit oneself to work by signing a contract. <i>Wolverine sign.</i>
signpost	Indicate a place with a signpost. <i>Battle is clearly signposted off all the main roads.</i>
solder	Join with solder. <i>Solder these two pipes together.</i>
suggestion	Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. <i>The power of suggestion.</i>
symptom	An indication of the existence of something, especially of an undesirable situation. <i>The government was plagued by leaks a symptom of divisions and poor morale.</i>
<u>tab</u>	The key on a typewriter or a word processor that causes a tabulation. <i>The filing cards were organized by cards having indexed tabs.</i>
<u>tag</u>	Attach a tag or label to. <i>I will be tagged in every photo I post.</i>
<u>ticket</u>	Provide with a ticket for passage or admission. <i>The two winning tickets bought within days of each other went unclaimed.</i>
