- *A formal association of people with similar interests.*
- *A group of species that have similar requirements and play a similar role within a community.*

<b>combine</b>	Harvester that heads and threshes and cleans grain while moving across the field. <i>One of the world s biggest food and personal products <b>combines</b>.</i>
<b>company</b>	A person or people regarded as pleasant (or unpleasant) to be with. <i>He was silent among such distinguished <b>company</b>.</i>
<b>consortium</b>	The right of association and companionship with one's husband or wife. <i>The amount awarded for loss of <b>consortium</b> must be included.</i>
<b>cooperative</b>	A jointly owned commercial enterprise (usually organized by farmers or consumers) that produces and distributes goods and services and is run for the benefit of its owners. <i>We run the agency as a workers <b>cooperative</b>.</i>
<b>federation</b>	The action of forming states or organizations into a single group with centralized control. <i>A first step in the <b>federation</b> of Europe.</i>
<b>fellowship</b>	The state of being with someone. <i>The church welcomed new members into its <b>fellowship</b>.</i>
<b>fraternity</b>	A group of people sharing a common profession or interests. <i>The ideals of liberty equality and <b>fraternity</b>.</i>
<b>gild</b>	A formal association of people with similar interests.
<b>league</b>	The contest for the championship of a league. <i>The leading goalscorer in the <b>league</b>.</i>
<b>lodge</b>	A formal association of people with similar interests. <i>A hunting <b>lodge</b>.</i>
<b>order</b>	A thing made supplied or served as a result of an order. <i>There were mistakes in the <b>ordering</b> of items on the list.</i>
<b>organization</b>	An ordered manner; orderliness by virtue of being methodical and well organized. <i>His lack of <b>organization</b>.</i>
<b>partnership</b>	A cooperative relationship between people or groups who agree to share responsibility for achieving some specific goal. <i>Their 176 run third wicket <b>partnership</b>.</i>
<b>sisterhood</b>	The feeling of kinship with and closeness to a group of women or all women. <i>Much of <b>sisterhood</b> is about sharing lipsticks.</i>
<b>social club</b>	A party of people assembled to promote sociability and communal activity.
<b>society</b>	A specified section of society. <i>The analogy between insect <b>society</b> and human city is not new.</i>
<b>sorority</b>	A society for female students in a university or college.



**syndicate** A group of individuals or organizations combined to promote a common interest.

*A crime **syndicate**.*

**trust** An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries.

*A **trust** was set up.*

**union** A device on a national flag emblematic of the union of two or more sovereignties typically in the upper inner corner.

*Let C be the **union** of the sets A and B.*



## Associations of "Guild" (30 Words)

**affiliate** A subsidiary or subordinate organization that is affiliated with another organization.

*The main party agreed to **affiliate** four Conservative associations.*

<b>affiliation</b>	The state or process of affiliating or being affiliated. <i>His political <b>affiliations</b>.</i>
<b>alliance</b>	A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim. <i>His party is in <b>alliance</b> with the Greens.</i>
<b>ally</b>	A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose. <i>He s a good <b>ally</b> in fight.</i>
<b>association</b>	A connection or cooperative link between people or organizations. <i>He developed a close <b>association</b> with the university.</i>
<b>club</b>	A nightclub playing fashionable dance music. <i>A jazz <b>club</b>.</i>
<b>coalescence</b>	The joining or merging of elements to form one mass or whole. <i>The lack of <b>coalescence</b> among fields of science.</i>
<b>coalition</b>	An organization of people (or countries) involved in a pact or treaty. <i>They had a taste of government in <b>coalition</b> with the Social Democrats.</i>
<b>collaboration</b>	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>They worked either in <b>collaboration</b> or independently.</i>
<b>combination</b>	A sequence of numbers or letters used to open a combination lock. <i>A good uppercut hook <b>combination</b>.</i>
<b>confederacy</b>	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. <i>The Italian <b>confederacy</b> known as the Lombard League.</i>
<b>confederation</b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a <b>confederation</b> in 1867.</i>
<b>conjugate</b>	A mixture of two partially miscible liquids A and B produces two conjugate solutions one of A in B and another of B in A. <i><b>Conjugate</b> the verb.</i>
<b>consolidation</b>	The act of combining into an integral whole. <i>After their <b>consolidation</b> the two bills were passed unanimously.</i>
<b>cooperation</b>	Assistance, especially by complying readily with requests. <i>Economic <b>cooperation</b>.</i>
<b>federalism</b>	The idea of a federal organization of more or less self-governing units. <i>Idealists who were committed to European <b>federalism</b>.</i>
<b>football</b>	The inflated oblong ball used in playing American football. <i>His team played some impressive <b>football</b>.</i>

<b><u>fusion</u></b>	Correction of an unstable part of the spine by joining two or more vertebrae; usually done surgically but sometimes done by traction or immobilization. <i>The <b>fusion</b> of resin and glass fibre in the moulding process.</i>
<b>integrated</b>	Resembling a living organism in organization or development. <i>An <b>integrated</b> Europe.</i>
<b><u>league</u></b>	Join in a league or alliance. <i>The year we won the <b>league</b>.</i>
<b>member</b>	The male organ of copulation member is a euphemism. <i>Canada is a <b>member</b> of the United Nations.</i>
<b>membership</b>	The members or the number of members in a group. <i>They polled their <b>membership</b>.</i>
<b><u>reunion</u></b>	The act of coming together again. <i>She had a tearful <b>reunion</b> with her parents.</i>
<b>society</b>	A specified section of society. <i>He enjoyed the <b>society</b> of his friends.</i>
<b>sorority</b>	A social club for female undergraduates.
<b>synthesis</b>	The process of producing a chemical compound (usually by the union of simpler chemical compounds). <i>The ideology represented a <b>synthesis</b> of certain ideas.</i>
<b>team</b>	Form a team. <i>His <b>team</b> played well.</i>
<b>unification</b>	The act of making or becoming a single unit. <i>There were conversations about <b>unification</b> between the Church of England and the Methodist Church.</i>
<b><u>unify</u></b>	To bring or combine together or with something else. <i>The government hoped to centralize and <b>unify</b> the nation.</i>
<b><u>union</u></b>	Of trade unions. <i>Their <b>union</b> had not been blessed with children.</i>
