*An **alliance** between medicine and morality.*
- association** The act of consorting with or joining with others.
*A bog **association** containing ericaceous plants.*

*A gesture of solidarity and **brotherhood**.*
- club** The premises used by a particular club.
*A social **club**.*
- coalition** A temporary alliance for combined action, especially of political parties forming a government.
*They had a taste of government in **coalition** with the Social Democrats.*

combine	Harvester that heads and threshes and cleans grain while moving across the field. <i>One of the world s biggest food and personal products combines.</i>
company	A person or people regarded as pleasant (or unpleasant) to be with. <i>He was silent among such distinguished company.</i>
consortium	The right of association and companionship with one's husband or wife. <i>The amount awarded for loss of consortium must be included.</i>
cooperative	A jointly owned commercial enterprise (usually organized by farmers or consumers) that produces and distributes goods and services and is run for the benefit of its owners. <i>We run the agency as a workers cooperative.</i>
federation	The action of forming states or organizations into a single group with centralized control. <i>A first step in the federation of Europe.</i>
fellowship	The state of being with someone. <i>The church welcomed new members into its fellowship.</i>
fraternity	A group of people sharing a common profession or interests. <i>The ideals of liberty equality and fraternity.</i>
gild	A formal association of people with similar interests.
league	The contest for the championship of a league. <i>The leading goalscorer in the league.</i>
lodge	A formal association of people with similar interests. <i>A hunting lodge.</i>
order	A thing made supplied or served as a result of an order. <i>There were mistakes in the ordering of items on the list.</i>
organization	An ordered manner; orderliness by virtue of being methodical and well organized. <i>His lack of organization.</i>
partnership	A cooperative relationship between people or groups who agree to share responsibility for achieving some specific goal. <i>Their 176 run third wicket partnership.</i>
sisterhood	The feeling of kinship with and closeness to a group of women or all women. <i>Much of sisterhood is about sharing lipsticks.</i>
social club	A party of people assembled to promote sociability and communal activity.
society	A specified section of society. <i>The analogy between insect society and human city is not new.</i>
sorority	A society for female students in a university or college.

syndicate A group of individuals or organizations combined to promote a common interest.

*A crime **syndicate**.*

trust An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries.

*A **trust** was set up.*

union A device on a national flag emblematic of the union of two or more sovereignties typically in the upper inner corner.

*Let C be the **union** of the sets A and B.*



Associations of "Guild" (30 Words)

affiliate A subsidiary or subordinate organization that is affiliated with another organization.

*The main party agreed to **affiliate** four Conservative associations.*

affiliation	The state or process of affiliating or being affiliated. <i>His political affiliations.</i>
alliance	A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim. <i>His party is in alliance with the Greens.</i>
ally	A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose. <i>He s a good ally in fight.</i>
association	A connection or cooperative link between people or organizations. <i>He developed a close association with the university.</i>
club	A nightclub playing fashionable dance music. <i>A jazz club.</i>
coalescence	The joining or merging of elements to form one mass or whole. <i>The lack of coalescence among fields of science.</i>
coalition	An organization of people (or countries) involved in a pact or treaty. <i>They had a taste of government in coalition with the Social Democrats.</i>
collaboration	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>They worked either in collaboration or independently.</i>
combination	A sequence of numbers or letters used to open a combination lock. <i>A good uppercut hook combination.</i>
confederacy	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. <i>The Italian confederacy known as the Lombard League.</i>
confederation	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a confederation in 1867.</i>
conjugate	A mixture of two partially miscible liquids A and B produces two conjugate solutions one of A in B and another of B in A. <i>Conjugate the verb.</i>
consolidation	The act of combining into an integral whole. <i>After their consolidation the two bills were passed unanimously.</i>
cooperation	Assistance, especially by complying readily with requests. <i>Economic cooperation.</i>
federalism	The idea of a federal organization of more or less self-governing units. <i>Idealists who were committed to European federalism.</i>
football	The inflated oblong ball used in playing American football. <i>His team played some impressive football.</i>

<u>fusion</u>	Correction of an unstable part of the spine by joining two or more vertebrae; usually done surgically but sometimes done by traction or immobilization. <i>The fusion of resin and glass fibre in the moulding process.</i>
integrated	Resembling a living organism in organization or development. <i>An integrated Europe.</i>
<u>league</u>	Join in a league or alliance. <i>The year we won the league.</i>
member	The male organ of copulation member is a euphemism. <i>Canada is a member of the United Nations.</i>
membership	The members or the number of members in a group. <i>They polled their membership.</i>
<u>reunion</u>	The act of coming together again. <i>She had a tearful reunion with her parents.</i>
society	A specified section of society. <i>He enjoyed the society of his friends.</i>
sorority	A social club for female undergraduates.
synthesis	The process of producing a chemical compound (usually by the union of simpler chemical compounds). <i>The ideology represented a synthesis of certain ideas.</i>
team	Form a team. <i>His team played well.</i>
unification	The act of making or becoming a single unit. <i>There were conversations about unification between the Church of England and the Methodist Church.</i>
<u>unify</u>	To bring or combine together or with something else. <i>The government hoped to centralize and unify the nation.</i>
<u>union</u>	Of trade unions. <i>Their union had not been blessed with children.</i>
