burst	The act of exploding or bursting. <i>A burst of applause.</i>

ebullition	An unrestrained expression of emotion. <i>Because the bath is now so cold no further violent ebullition will occur.</i>
effusion	Flow under pressure. <i>He studied the rates of effusion of gases.</i>
flood	The act of flooding filling to overflowing. <i>The villagers had been cut off by floods and landslides.</i>
flow of speech	The monthly discharge of blood from the uterus of nonpregnant women from puberty to menopause-Hippocrates.

<u>flush</u>	Denoting a type of toilet that has a flushing device. <i>The frogs feast on the great flush of insects.</i>
jet	An airplane powered by one or more jet engines. <i>A private jet.</i>
outburst	A volcanic eruption. <i>A very dramatic outburst of neutrons.</i>
outflow	The discharge of a fluid from some container. <i>Capital outflow took place on a very large scale.</i>
outpouring	The rapid and continuous delivery of linguistic communication (spoken or written). <i>A massive outpouring of high energy gamma rays.</i>
rush	An act of advancing forward, especially towards the quarterback. <i>After the shoot the agency team will see the rushes.</i>
spout	A tube or lip projecting from a container, through which liquid can be poured. <i>The tall spouts of geysers.</i>
spurt	A sudden marked burst or increase of activity or speed. <i>Late in the race he put on a spurt and reached second place.</i>
<u>stream</u>	The act of flowing or streaming continuous progression. <i>Stream of consciousness.</i>
stream of words	A natural body of running water flowing on or under the earth.
<u>surge</u>	A large sea wave. <i>The firm predicted a 20 surge in sales.</i>
sweep	A sweepstake. <i>A World Series sweep.</i>
<u>torrent</u>	A strong and fast-moving stream of water or other liquid. <i>A torrent of abuse.</i>

Definitions of "Gush" as a verb

- *Discharge (liquid) in a rapid and plentiful stream.*
- *Gush forth in a sudden stream or jet.*
- *Speak or write effusively or with exaggerated enthusiasm.*
- *Issue in a jet; come out in a jet; stream or spring forth.*

- *Praise enthusiastically.*
- *(of a liquid) flow out of something in a rapid and plentiful stream.*

- be effusive** Represent, as of a character on stage.
- be enthusiastic** Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun).
- burst** Cause to burst.
*The wardrobe was **bursting** with piles of clothes.*
- [cascade](#)** Rush down in big quantities like a cascade.
*Teachers who are able to **cascade** their experience effectively.*

dispense	(of a machine or container) supply or release (a product or cash). <i>I was dispensed from this terrible task.</i>
effuse	Pour out. <i>This was the type of material that they effused about.</i>
eject	Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule. <i>Angry supporters were forcibly ejected from the court.</i>
emit	Give off, send forth, or discharge; as of light, heat, or radiation, vapor, etc. <i>The ozone layer blocks some harmful rays which the sun emits.</i>
enthuse	Make (someone) interested and eagerly appreciative. <i>Public art is a tonic that can enthuse alienated youth.</i>
excrete	(of a living organism or cell) separate and expel as waste (a substance, especially a product of metabolism). <i>Excess bicarbonate is excreted by the kidney.</i>
exude	Release (a liquid) in drops or small quantities. <i>She exudes great confidence.</i>
flood	Become covered or submerged by a flood. <i>His old fears came flooding back.</i>
give off	Offer in good faith.
issue	Make out and issue. <i>The minister issued a statement.</i>
jet	Issue in a jet come out in a jet stream or spring forth. <i>Blood jetted from his nostrils.</i>
leak	Be leaked. <i>The news were leaked to the paper.</i>
let out	Cause to move; cause to be in a certain position or condition.
ooze	(of a fluid) slowly trickle or seep out of something. <i>She oozes a raunchy sex appeal.</i>
pour	Pour out. <i>Water poured all over the floor.</i>
rave	Attend a rave party. <i>She raved about that new restaurant.</i>
release	Release as from one's grip. <i>She released his arm and pushed him aside.</i>
rush	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>We'll rush you a copy at once.</i>
send out	Cause to be admitted; of persons to an institution.

spill	Flow, run or fall out and become lost. Spill blood.
spirt	Gush forth in a sudden stream or jet.
spout	(of a liquid) flow out forcibly in a stream. <i>Blood was spouting from the cuts on my hand.</i>
spurt	Cause to gush out suddenly. <i>The other car had spurred to the top of the ramp.</i>
stream	Exude profusely. <i>Tears streamed down her face.</i>
surge	Rise or heave upward under the influence of a natural force such as a wave. <i>He levelled the score and then surged ahead.</i>
void	Take away the legal force of or render ineffective. Void a plea.
well out	Come up, as of a liquid.

- *Water gushed out of the washing machine.*
- *Everyone came up to me and gushed about how lucky I was.*

airliner	A large passenger aircraft.
barrage	Address with continuously or persistently as if with a barrage. <i>The speaker was barraged by an angry audience.</i>
blast	Play or sound very loudly. <i>The sign was meant to discourage motorists from blasting their horns.</i>
bomb	Make someone homeless by destroying their home with bombs. <i>A bomb attack.</i>

bombardment	A continuous attack with bombs, shells, or other missiles. <i>An aerial bombardment will precede the attack.</i>
bomber	A bomber jacket. <i>Manny hand rolled a couple of bombers.</i>
burst	The act of exploding or bursting. <i>A burst of applause.</i>
cockpit	The driver's compartment in a racing car. <i>Most conventional army training takes place on the cockpit of Salisbury Plain.</i>
detonate	Burst and release energy as through a violent chemical or physical reaction. <i>Two other bombs failed to detonate.</i>
detonation	The premature combustion of fuel in an internal combustion engine, causing pinking. <i>She was in a control building at the time of detonation.</i>
effusion	Flow under pressure. <i>A massive effusion of poisonous gas.</i>
eruption	A sudden outbreak of something, typically something unwelcome or noisy. <i>A sudden eruption of street violence.</i>
<u>explode</u>	Show (a theory or claim) to be baseless, or refute and make obsolete. <i>Lead ensures that petrol burns rather than explodes.</i>
<u>explosion</u>	The noise caused by an explosion. <i>An explosion of methane gas.</i>
flak	Intense adverse criticism. <i>He has been getting flak from certain quarters lately for pointing this out.</i>
irruption	A sudden violent entrance; a bursting in. <i>The recent irruption of bad manners.</i>
jabber	Talk in a rapid, excited, and often incomprehensible way. <i>He jabbered on about football.</i>
jet	Fly a jet plane. <i>A jet of boiling water spurted over his hand.</i>
outburst	A sudden violent disturbance. <i>A very dramatic outburst of neutrons.</i>
outpouring	Something that streams out rapidly. <i>Outpourings of nationalist discontent.</i>
overflow	Overflow with a certain feeling. <i>The river overflowed its banks.</i>

paroxysm	A sudden recurrence or attack of a disease. <i>A paroxysm of weeping.</i>
<u>pour</u>	Pour out. <i>We poured money into the education of our children.</i>
propulsion	A propelling force. <i>They dive and use their wings for propulsion under water.</i>
runoff	The occurrence of surplus liquid (as water) exceeding the limit or capacity.
seizure	The act of taking of a person by force. <i>The patient had a seizure.</i>
spout	(of a liquid) flow out forcibly in a stream. <i>The tall spouts of geysers.</i>
spurt	Move or act with a sudden increase in speed or energy. <i>The other car had spurted to the top of the ramp.</i>
squirt	A thin stream or small quantity of liquid squirted from something. <i>A squirt of perfume.</i>
sudden	Suddenly. <i>A sudden bright flash.</i>
