- *The type of environment in which an organism or group normally lives or occurs.*
- *A person's usual or preferred surroundings.*
- *The natural home or environment of an animal, plant, or other organism.*



Synonyms of "Habitat" as a noun (9 Words)

domain	People in general; especially a distinctive group of people with some shared interest. <i>His domain extended into Europe.</i>
<u>haunt</u>	A frequently visited place. <i>The bar was a favourite haunt of artists of the time.</i>
home	The district or country where one was born or has settled on a long-term basis. <i>He doesn't have a home to go to.</i>
home ground	Housing that someone is living in.
natural element	A first roll of 7 or 11 that immediately wins the stake.
natural environment	A first roll of 7 or 11 that immediately wins the stake.
natural surroundings	A notation cancelling a previous sharp or flat.
natural terrain	Someone regarded as certain to succeed.

natural territory

Someone regarded as certain to succeed.

abide	Accept or act in accordance with (a rule, decision, or recommendation). <i>At least one memory will abide.</i>
<u>abode</u>	A stay; a sojourn. <i>My humble abode.</i>
<u>citizen</u>	An inhabitant of a particular town or city. <i>The good citizens of Edinburgh.</i>
denizen	A person who inhabits a particular place. <i>Denizens of field and forest.</i>
domicile	The residence where you have your permanent home or principal establishment and to where whenever you are absent you intend to return every person is compelled to have one and only one domicile at a time. <i>His wife has a domicile of origin in Germany.</i>

<u> dwell </u>	Exist or be situated within. <i>Groups of people still dwell in these caves.</i>
 dweller 	A person who inhabits a particular place. <i>The majority of urban dwellers live in small apartments.</i>
<u> dwelling </u>	Housing that someone is living in. <i>The proposed dwelling is out of keeping with those nearby.</i>
 floodplain 	A low plain adjacent to a river that is formed chiefly of river sediment and is subject to flooding.
 french 	Cut (e.g, beans) lengthwise in preparation for cooking.
 habitable 	Suitable or good enough to live in. <i>The house should be habitable by Christmas.</i>
 habitant 	An inhabitant. <i>The habitant farmhouses of old Quebec.</i>
 habitation 	The native habitat or home of an animal or plant. <i>Signs of human habitation.</i>
 home 	Provide an animal with a home as a pet. <i>He was four fences from home.</i>
<u> inhabit </u>	Inhabit or live in be an inhabitant of. <i>The people inhabited the islands that are now deserted.</i>
 inhabitant 	A person who inhabits a particular place.
<u> lifelong </u>	Continuing through life. <i>The two men were to remain lifelong friends.</i>
 live 	Continue to live through hardship or adversity. <i>The happiest person alive.</i>
<u> living </u>	The condition of living or the state of being alive. <i>Scared the living daylights out of them.</i>
<u> mansion </u>	A terrace or mansion block. <i>Carlyle Mansions.</i>
<u> marsh </u>	United States painter (1898-1954). <i>The marsh marigold loves damp fields riverbanks and marshes.</i>
<u> meadow </u>	A piece of grassland, especially one used for hay. <i>A pleasant campsite in a meadow complete with sparkling stream.</i>
 populate 	Fill or be present in (a place or sphere). <i>The island is populated by scarcely 40 000 people.</i>
<u> reside </u>	Have one's permanent home in a particular place. <i>The meaning of an utterance does not wholly reside in the semantic meaning.</i>

- resident** (of a computer program, file, etc.) immediately available in computer memory, rather than having to be loaded from elsewhere.
*He has been **resident** in Brazil for a long time.*
- riparian** Of or relating to or located on the banks of a river or stream.
*The ranch s most expansive **riparian** habitat.*
- savanna** A flat grassland in tropical or subtropical regions.
- vegetation** Inactivity that is passive and monotonous, comparable to the inactivity of plant life.
*Pleistocene **vegetation**.*
- wetland** Land consisting of marshes or swamps; saturated land.
*The draining of British **wetlands**.*
- zone** Divide into or assign to zones.
*United are still in the relegation **zone**.*
