## **Handwriting as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Handwriting" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “handwriting” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Something written by hand.*
- *A person's particular style of writing.*
- *Writing with a pen or pencil.*
- *The activity of writing by hand.*



## Synonyms of "Handwriting" as a noun (6 Words)

- hand** A prehensile organ resembling the hand and forming the end part of a limb of various mammals such as that on all four limbs of a monkey.  
*The palm of her **hand**.*
- letters** The literary culture.  
*This book shows American **letters** at its best.*
- longhand** Ordinary handwriting (as opposed to shorthand, typing, or printing).  
*A **longhand** draft.*
- pen** An electronic device like a pen used in conjunction with a writing surface to enter commands or data into a computer.  
*She was forced to support herself by the **pen**.*

**script** Printed type imitating handwriting.  
*Her neat tidy **script**.*

**writing** Handwriting.  
*She did the thinking while he did the **writing**.*



## Usage Examples of "Handwriting" as a noun

- *Handwriting can be slow and painful for one with arthritis.*
- *This method of duplicating can reproduce typewriting, handwriting, or drawings.*
- *Her handwriting was small and neat.*
- *She recognized his handwriting.*





## Associations of "Handwriting" (30 Words)

<b>crabbed</b>	Bad-tempered. A <b>crabbed</b> unhappy middle age.
<b>cursive</b>	Cursive writing. This style of writing began to compete with Gothic <b>cursive</b> .
<b>demotic</b>	Demotic Greek. A poet with a keen ear for <b>demotic</b> rhythms.
<b>disquisition</b>	A long or elaborate essay or discussion on a particular subject. Nothing can kill a radio show quicker than a <b>disquisition</b> on intertextual analysis.
<b>doodle</b>	Make a doodle draw aimlessly. The text was interspersed with <b>doodles</b> .

<b>draft</b>	Select a player for a sports team through the draft. <i>The White Sox chose him in the 13th round of the 1990 <b>draft</b>.</i>
<b>dramaturgy</b>	The art of writing and producing plays. <i>Studies of Shakespeare s <b>dramaturgy</b>.</i>
<b>essay</b>	Attempt or try. <i>Donald <b>essayed</b> a smile.</i>
<b>graffiti</b>	Write words or drawings as graffiti. <i>He <b>graffitied</b> his tag on a window and door.</i>
<b>hastily</b>	With excessive speed or urgency; hurriedly. <i><b>Hastily</b> he scanned the headlines.</i>
<b>illegible</b>	(of handwriting, print, etc.) not legible. <i><b>Illegible</b> handwriting.</i>
<b>interpolation</b>	A remark interjected in a conversation. <i>Yields were estimated using linear <b>interpolation</b>.</i>
<b>journal</b>	Write in a journal or diary. <i>While abroad he had kept a <b>journal</b>.</i>
<b>ledger</b>	Fish using a ledger. <i><b>Ledger</b> tackle.</i>
<b>legible</b>	(of handwriting or print) clear enough to read. <i>The original typescript is scarcely <b>legible</b>.</i>
<b>libretto</b>	The text of an opera or other long vocal work.
<b>manuscript</b>	An author's handwritten or typed text that has not yet been published. <i>An illuminated <b>manuscript</b>.</i>
<b>memorandum</b>	A written message in business or diplomacy. <i>The two countries signed a <b>memorandum</b> of understanding on economic cooperation.</i>
<b>palimpsest</b>	Something reused or altered but still bearing visible traces of its earlier form. <i>Sutton Place is a <b>palimpsest</b> of the taste of successive owners.</i>
<b>proofread</b>	Read (written or printed material) and mark any errors. <i>They must revise and <b>proofread</b> their work.</i>
<b>quickly</b>	Without taking pains. <i>We moved <b>quickly</b> to deal with our auditor s questions.</i>
<b>recognizance</b>	A bond by which a person undertakes before a court or magistrate to observe some condition, especially to appear when summoned. <i>He was released on his own <b>recognizance</b> of 30 000.</i>

<b>scrawl</b>	Write (something) in a hurried, careless way. <i>The page was covered in <b>scrawls</b> and doodles.</i>
<b>scribble</b>	An aimless drawing. <i>Illegible <b>scribbles</b>.</i>
<u><b>scribe</b></u>	Write. <i>Mark the position of the lock body on the door edge then <b>scribe</b> a centre mark.</i>
<u><b>script</b></u>	Write a script for a play film or broadcast. <i>The playwright <b>scripted</b> the movie.</i>
<u><b>signature</b></u>	A sheet with several pages printed on it it folds to page size and is bound with other signatures to form a book. <i>The <b>signature</b> of a senior manager.</i>
<u><b>sketch</b></u>	Make a sketch of. <i>Jeanne <b>sketched</b> and painted whenever she had the time.</i>
<u><b>transcribe</b></u>	Put (thoughts, speech, or data) into written or printed form. <i>Polymerases <b>transcribe</b> it into a long RNA molecule.</i>
<u><b>write</b></u>	Compose write and send a letter to someone. <i>He had to <b>write</b> a cheque for 800.</i>
