Definitions of "Handwriting" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “handwriting” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Something written by hand.*
- *A person's particular style of writing.*
- *Writing with a pen or pencil.*
- *The activity of writing by hand.*



Synonyms of "Handwriting" as a noun (6 Words)

- hand** A prehensile organ resembling the hand and forming the end part of a limb of various mammals such as that on all four limbs of a monkey.
*The palm of her **hand**.*
- letters** The literary culture.
*This book shows American **letters** at its best.*
- longhand** Ordinary handwriting (as opposed to shorthand, typing, or printing).
*A **longhand** draft.*
- pen** An electronic device like a pen used in conjunction with a writing surface to enter commands or data into a computer.
*She was forced to support herself by the **pen**.*

script Printed type imitating handwriting.
*Her neat tidy **script**.*

writing Handwriting.
*She did the thinking while he did the **writing**.*



Usage Examples of "Handwriting" as a noun

- *Handwriting can be slow and painful for one with arthritis.*
- *This method of duplicating can reproduce typewriting, handwriting, or drawings.*
- *Her handwriting was small and neat.*
- *She recognized his handwriting.*



Associations of "Handwriting" (30 Words)

crabbed	Bad-tempered. A crabbed unhappy middle age.
cursive	Cursive writing. This style of writing began to compete with Gothic cursive .
demotic	Demotic Greek. A poet with a keen ear for demotic rhythms.
disquisition	A long or elaborate essay or discussion on a particular subject. Nothing can kill a radio show quicker than a disquisition on intertextual analysis.
doodle	Make a doodle draw aimlessly. The text was interspersed with doodles .

draft	Select a player for a sports team through the draft. <i>The White Sox chose him in the 13th round of the 1990 draft.</i>
dramaturgy	The art of writing and producing plays. <i>Studies of Shakespeare s dramaturgy.</i>
essay	Attempt or try. <i>Donald essayed a smile.</i>
graffiti	Write words or drawings as graffiti. <i>He graffitied his tag on a window and door.</i>
hastily	With excessive speed or urgency; hurriedly. <i>Hastily he scanned the headlines.</i>
illegible	(of handwriting, print, etc.) not legible. <i>Illegible handwriting.</i>
interpolation	A remark interjected in a conversation. <i>Yields were estimated using linear interpolation.</i>
journal	Write in a journal or diary. <i>While abroad he had kept a journal.</i>
ledger	Fish using a ledger. <i>Ledger tackle.</i>
legible	(of handwriting or print) clear enough to read. <i>The original typescript is scarcely legible.</i>
libretto	The text of an opera or other long vocal work.
manuscript	An author's handwritten or typed text that has not yet been published. <i>An illuminated manuscript.</i>
memorandum	A written message in business or diplomacy. <i>The two countries signed a memorandum of understanding on economic cooperation.</i>
palimpsest	Something reused or altered but still bearing visible traces of its earlier form. <i>Sutton Place is a palimpsest of the taste of successive owners.</i>
proofread	Read (written or printed material) and mark any errors. <i>They must revise and proofread their work.</i>
quickly	Without taking pains. <i>We moved quickly to deal with our auditor s questions.</i>
recognizance	A bond by which a person undertakes before a court or magistrate to observe some condition, especially to appear when summoned. <i>He was released on his own recognizance of 30 000.</i>

scrawl	Write (something) in a hurried, careless way. <i>The page was covered in scrawls and doodles.</i>
scribble	An aimless drawing. <i>Illegible scribbles.</i>
<u>scribe</u>	Write. <i>Mark the position of the lock body on the door edge then scribe a centre mark.</i>
<u>script</u>	Write a script for a play film or broadcast. <i>The playwright scripted the movie.</i>
<u>signature</u>	A sheet with several pages printed on it it folds to page size and is bound with other signatures to form a book. <i>The signature of a senior manager.</i>
<u>sketch</u>	Make a sketch of. <i>Jeanne sketched and painted whenever she had the time.</i>
<u>transcribe</u>	Put (thoughts, speech, or data) into written or printed form. <i>Polymerases transcribe it into a long RNA molecule.</i>
<u>write</u>	Compose write and send a letter to someone. <i>He had to write a cheque for 800.</i>
