<b>blessedness</b>	The state of being blessed with divine favour.
<b>cheerfulness</b>	A feeling of spontaneous good spirits. <i>Her brand of hearty <b>cheerfulness</b>.</i>
<b><u>contentment</u></b>	A state of happiness and satisfaction. <i>He found <b>contentment</b> in living a simple life in the country.</i>
<b>delight</b>	Take delight in. <i>His <b>delight</b> to see her was obvious to all.</i>
<b>delighted</b>	Filled with wonder and delight. <i>We were <b>delighted</b> to see her.</i>
<b><u>ecstatic</u></b>	Feeling great rapture or delight. <i><b>Ecstatic</b> fans filled the stadium.</i>
<b>elated</b>	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>Dozens of <b>elated</b> fans welcomed the champions home.</i>
<b>enjoy</b>	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i><b>Enjoy</b> privileges.</i>
<b>enjoyable</b>	(of an activity or occasion) giving delight or pleasure. <i>They had an <b>enjoyable</b> afternoon.</i>
<b><u>euphoria</u></b>	A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation. <i>In his <b>euphoria</b> he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
<b>exult</b>	Feel or show triumphant elation or jubilation. <i><b>Exulting</b> in her escape Lisa closed the door behind her.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
<b>festal</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a celebration or festival. <i>A festive or <b>festal</b> occasion.</i>
<b>gaiety</b>	Entertainments or amusements. <i>The sudden <b>gaiety</b> of children s laughter.</i>

<b>glad</b>	Causing happiness. <i>Gave a <b>glad</b> shout.</i>
<b>gladden</b>	Make glad or happy. <i>The high childish laugh was a sound that <b>gladdened</b> her heart.</i>
<b>happiness</b>	State of well-being characterized by emotions ranging from contentment to intense joy. <i>She struggled to find <b>happiness</b> in her life.</i>
<b>hilarious</b>	Marked by or causing boisterous merriment or convulsive laughter. <i>The meal was noisy and <b>hilarious</b>.</i>
<b>jolly</b>	A happy party. <i>We had a very <b>jolly</b> time.</i>
<b>joy</b>	A thing that causes joy. <i>I felt shame that I had ever <b>joyed</b> in his discomfiture or pain.</i>
<b>joyful</b>	Feeling, expressing, or causing great pleasure and happiness. <i>Make a <b>joyful</b> noise.</i>
<b>joyous</b>	Full of or characterized by joy. <i>Felt a <b>joyous</b> abandon.</i>
<b>jubilant</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>A large number of <b>jubilant</b> fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
<b>laughing</b>	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i><b>Laughing</b> children.</i>
<b>merry</b>	Offering fun and gaiety. <i>Have a <b>merry</b> Christmas.</i>
<b>pleased</b>	Proud of one's achievements, especially excessively so; self-satisfied. <i>A <b>pleased</b> smile.</i>
<b>rapt</b>	Filled with an intense and pleasurable emotion enraptured. <i>They listened with <b>rapt</b> attention.</i>
<b>rapture</b>	Expressions of intense pleasure or enthusiasm about something. <i>Leonora listened with <b>rapture</b>.</i>
<b>rejoice</b>	To express great joy. <i>I love to <b>rejoice</b> their poor Hearts at this season.</i>
<b>smile</b>	Express with a smile. <i>She greeted us all with a <b>smile</b>.</i>
