- Make repeated small-scale attacks on (an enemy.
- Annoy continually or chronically.
- Exhaust by attacking repeatedly.
- Subject to aggressive pressure or intimidation.





Synonyms of "Harass" as a verb (33 Words)

agitate	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. They agitate d for a reversal of the decision.
<u>annoy</u>	Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations. A gallant Saxon who annoy ed this Coast.
<u>assail</u>	(of an unpleasant feeling or physical sensation) come upon (someone) suddenly and strongly. The Scots army assail ed Edward s army from the rear.
attack repeatedly	Begin to injure.
badger	Repeatedly ask (someone) to do something; pester. Journalists badger ed him about the deals.
bedevil	(of a person) torment or harass. Projects like this are bedevil led by a shortage of cash.
beleaguer	Annoy persistently. <i>Our leaders decided to beleaguer the city.</i>



<u>beset</u>	Annoy continually or chronically. I was beset by clouds of flies.
bother	Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. <i>He wasn t to bother himself with day to day things.</i>
chevvy	Annoy continually or chronically.
chevy	Annoy continually or chronically.
chivvy	Tell (someone) repeatedly to do something. An association which chivvies government into action.
chivy	Annoy continually or chronically.
<u>disturb</u>	Interrupt the sleep, relaxation, or privacy of. Take the rollers out carefully so as not to disturb the curls too much.
exasperate	Exasperate or irritate. This futile process exasperate s prison officers.
harry	Persistently harass. He is known to harry his staff when he is overworked.
<u>hassle</u>	Harass; pester. You want to sit and relax and not get hassle d.
hound	Harass, persecute, or pursue relentlessly. She was hound ed by the Italian press.
maraud	Raid and plunder (a place. War parties crossed the river to maraud .
<u>oppress</u>	Cause to suffer. He was oppress ed by some secret worry.
persecute	Harass or annoy (someone) persistently. <i>His followers were persecuted by the authorities.</i>
<u>pester</u>	Annoy persistently. She constantly pester ed him with telephone calls.
<u>plague</u>	Cause to suffer a blight. He has been plague d by ill health.
press hard	Ask for or request earnestly.
<u>provoke</u>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. Her behavior provoke d a quarrel between the couple.
<u>raid</u>	Conduct a raid on. T Boone Pickens raid ed many large companies.
ravage	Cause extensive destruction or ruin utterly. The hurricane ravage d southern Florida.



set upon	Urge to attack someone.
torment	Torment emotionally or mentally. He was torment ed by jealousy.
trouble	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. My legs started to trouble me.
vex	Make (someone) feel annoyed, frustrated, or worried, especially with trivial matters. <i>Thou shalt not vex a stranger.</i>
<u>worry</u>	(of a dog) chase and attack (livestock, especially sheep. There was no need to worry her.



Usage Examples of "Harass" as a verb

- Harass the enemy.
- Being harassed at work can leave you feeling confused and helpless.
- The squadron's task was to harass the retreating enemy forces.
- This man harasses his female co-workers.





Associations of "Harass" (30 Words)

afflict

Cause great unhappiness for; distress. She was **afflict**ed by the death of her parents.



<u>annoy</u>	Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations. <i>The decision really</i> annoy ed him.
beleaguer	Cause problems or difficulties for. <i>He attempts to answer several questions that</i> beleaguer <i>the industry.</i>
<u>beset</u>	Surround and harass. Springy grass all beset with tiny jewel like flowers.
blooming	Informal intensifiers. I didn t learn a blooming thing.
cruelly	Excessively. <i>He marries Edgar s sister Isabella and cruelly ill treats her.</i>
distress	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. She was the classic maiden in distress .
<u>disturb</u>	Destroy the peace or tranquility of. I am disturb ed by the document I have just read.
harry	Persistently carry out attacks on (an enemy or an enemy's territory. <i>He is known to harry his staff when he is overworked.</i>
importunate	Expressing persistant and earnest entreaty. <i>Importunate creditors.</i>
intensely	With extreme force or strength. She has the ability to concentrate intensely for long periods.
irk	Irritate; annoy. It irk s her to think of the runaround she received.
irritable	Capable of responding to stimuli. The seeds have been reputed to help conditions such as irritable bladder.
irritate	Make (someone) annoyed or a little angry. Sprays and polishes can irritate dry sensitive skin.
nag	A person who nags someone. He s always nag ging at her for staying out late.
nettle	Used in names of other plants with leaves of a similar appearance to those of the nettle e g dead nettle. <i>I was only asking Jess said nettled</i> .
offend	Cause to feel upset, annoyed, or resentful. Those activities which offend against public order and decency.
<u>oppress</u>	Cause distress or anxiety to. The government oppress es political activists.
peeve	An annoyed or irritated mood. Another peeve of mine is these so called reality shows.



persecute	Cause to suffer. No one should be persecute d for their religious beliefs.
persistently	In a persistent manner; continuously. <i>The rules are persistently flouted</i> .
<u>pester</u>	Annoy persistently. She constantly pester ed him with telephone calls.
rag	Give a decorative effect to a painted surface by applying paint typically of a different colour with a rag. <i>The deputy</i> rag <i>ged the Prime Minister.</i>
ravage	Acts of destruction. The hurricane ravage d southern Florida.
rile	Make (someone) annoyed or irritated. <i>He has been riled by suggestions that his Arsenal future is in doubt.</i>
tease	Backcomb (hair) in order to make it appear fuller. I used to tease her about being so house proud.
<u>throes</u>	Violent pangs of suffering. <i>He convulsed in his death throes.</i>
torment	A feeling of intense annoyance caused by being tormented. <i>The journey must have been a torment for them.</i>
vex	Make (someone) feel annoyed, frustrated, or worried, especially with trivial matters. A vex ing problem.
<u>vexation</u>	The act of troubling or annoying someone. <i>The vexations of life under canvas.</i>
