- The act of tormenting by continued persistent attacks and criticism.
- Aggressive pressure or intimidation.





## Synonyms of "Harassment" as a noun (12 Words)

aggravation	An exasperated feeling of annoyance. The <b>aggravation</b> of her condition resulted from lack of care.
annoyance	The feeling or state of being annoyed; irritation. There was <b>annoyance</b> at government interference.
badgering	Sturdy carnivorous burrowing mammal with strong claws; widely distributed in the northern hemisphere. $% \left( {{\left[ {{\left[ {{\left[ {\left[ {\left[ {{\left[ {{\left[ {{\left$
bother	An angry disturbance. It may seem like too much <b>bother</b> to cook just for yourself.
coercion	The act of compelling by force of authority. <i>Our problem cannot be solved by any form of</i> <b>coercion</b> <i>but only by</i> <i>agreement.</i>
force	The army navy and air force of a country. The Committee accepted the <b>force</b> of this argument.



intimidation	The feeling of being intimidated; being made to feel afraid or timid. The <b>intimidation</b> of witnesses and jurors.
<u>irritation</u>	A sudden outburst of anger. The minor <b>irritation</b> s of life.
molestation	The action of pestering or harassing someone in an aggressive or persistent manner. He was tried for <b>molestation</b> of two young girls.
persecution	The act of persecuting (especially on the basis of race or religion. His <b>persecution</b> at the hands of other students.
pressure	The pressure exerted by the atmosphere. Gas can be fed to the turbines at a <b>pressure</b> of around 250 psi.
torment	A feeling of intense annoyance caused by being tormented. So great was his harassment that he wanted to destroy his <b>torment</b> ors.

# Associations of "Harassment" (30 Words)

avaricious	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. They are <b>avaricious</b> and will do anything for money.
<u>avenge</u>	Take revenge for a perceived wrong. He vowed in silent fervour to <b>avenge</b> their murders.
browbeat	Be bossy towards. A witness is being <b>browbeat</b> en under cross examination.
bully	Be bossy towards. <i>He did a <b>bully</b> job.</i>
bullying	The act of intimidating a weaker person to make them do something.
complaining	The expression of dissatisfaction or annoyance about something. <i>A complaining</i> boss.



Illegally obtain money from (someone) by deception. She <b>defraud</b> ed the customers who trusted her.
The act of making some area of land or water more profitable or productive or useful. <i>Capitalistic exploitation of the working class.</i>
Unpredictably difficult in operation; likely to be troublesome. <i>King Malcolm struggled to unite his <b>fractious</b> kingdom.</i>
Nervous and unable to relax. The baby was crying with a <b>fretful</b> whimper.
An act of gloating. His enemies <b>gloat</b> ed over his death.
Be bossy towards. She doesn t <b>hector</b> us about giving up things.
The act of intimidating a weaker person to make them do something. The election was marred by allegations of government <b>intimidation</b> and vote rigging.
A person whose business is lending money to others who pay interest.
Habitually complaining. She became <b>querulous</b> and demanding.
The forcible seizure of a foreign subject or their goods as an act of retaliation. The threat of <b>reprisal</b> .
Make a counterattack and return like for like, especially evil for evil. The blow stung and she <b>retaliate</b> d immediately.
The action of harming someone because they have harmed oneself; revenge. The bombings are believed to be in <b>retaliation</b> for the trial of 15 suspects.
The act of taking revenge (harming someone in retaliation for something harmful that they have done) especially in the next life. <i>Employees asked not to be named saying they feared retribution</i> .
Inflict revenge on behalf of someone else. Other spurned wives have taken public <b>revenge</b> on their husbands.
A seedling or plant deviating from the standard variety. A <b>rogue</b> elephant.
A violent criminal or troublemaker.
Describe or regard as worthy of disgrace or great disapproval. Francis <b>stigmatize</b> d in fashion as his Lord.



tease	Ruffle (one's hair) by combing the ends towards the scalp, for a full effect. Some think of him as a <b>tease</b> who likes to keep others guessing.
<u>tense</u>	Pronounced with relatively tense tongue muscles e g the vowel sound in beat. Relations between the two neighbouring states were <b>tense</b> .
testy	Easily irritated or annoyed. She could see him growing quite <b>testy</b> beneath that polished urbanity.
unscrupulous	Having or showing no moral principles; not honest or fair. <b>Unscrupulous</b> landlords might be tempted to harass existing tenants.
<u>vengeance</u>	The act of taking revenge (harming someone in retaliation for something harmful that they have done) especially in the next life-Romans 12:19. <i>He swore</i> <b>vengeance</b> on the man who betrayed him.
victimize	Punish unjustly. I was <b>victimize</b> d by this con man.
wreak	Avenge (someone who has been wronged. Torrential rainstorms <b>wreak</b> ed havoc yesterday.
