A colorless **negative** personality.

unfavourable Tending to hinder or oppose.

**Unfavourable** economic conditions.

unhealthy (of a person's attitude or behaviour) not sensible or well balanced.

Unhealthy ulcers.

Detrimental to physical or moral well-being.

**unwholesome** The use of the living room as sleeping quarters led to **unwholesome** 

crowding.

wounding Causing harm to a person's feelings or reputation.

A wounding description of their mother.

- The ozone layer blocks the harmful rays from the sun.
- Sugars which can be harmful to the teeth.
- Harmful effects of smoking.

**exotoxin** A toxin released by a living bacterial cell into its surroundings.

fatal Having extremely unfortunate or dire consequences; bringing ruin.

Such doctrines if true would be absolutely **fatal** to my theory.

harm Cause or do harm to.

The villains didn t **harm** him.

hurt Hurt the feelings of.

Dogs and cats with **hurt** paws.

injurious (of language) maliciously insulting; libellous.

Food which is **injurious** to health.

injury A casualty to military personnel resulting from combat.

Compensation for **injury** to feelings.

insulting Disrespectful or scornfully abusive.

**Insulting** remarks.

Containing or constituting a libel.

A libellous newspaper story.

libelous (used of statements) harmful and often untrue; tending to discredit or

malign.

noxious Harmful, poisonous, or very unpleasant.

They were overcome by the **noxious** fumes.

Working or spreading in a hidden and usually injurious way.

The **pernicious** influences of the mass media.

**poison** Kill by its poison.

She **poison**ed her husband.

**poisoning**The physiological state produced by a poison or other toxic substance.

Symptoms of **poisoning** may include nausea diarrhoea and vomiting.

(of an animal) producing poison as a means of attacking enemies or

**poisonous** prey; venomous.

A **poisonous** snake.

prejudicial (sometimes followed by `to') causing harm or injury.

The proposals were considered **prejudicial** to the city centre.

Causing injury or blight; especially affecting with sudden violence or

**ruinous** plague or ruin.

A **ruinous** course of action.

slanderous (of a spoken statement) false and malicious.

toxic

Denoting securities that are based on toxic debt and for which there is

not a healthy or functioning market.

**Toxic** liver injury.

toxin A poisonous substance produced during the metabolism and growth of

certain microorganisms and some higher plant and animal species.

unhealthy Not conducive to good health.

An **unhealthy** obsession with fast cars.

Toxin secreted by animals; secreted by certain snakes and poisonous

**venom** insects (e.g., spiders and scorpions.

His voice was full of venom.

Infectious; having the ability to cause disease.

**virulent** Staphylococcus aureus is a common organism whose **virulent** strains

are causing problems.

wound Inflict a wound on.

A wound to the thigh.
