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## Associations of "Harming" (30 Words)

<u>con</u>	Persuade (someone) to do or believe something by lying to them. She was jailed for <b>con</b> ning her aunt out of 500 000.
damage	Suffer or be susceptible to damage. She was awarded 284 000 in <b>damage</b> s.
damaging	Designed or tending to discredit, especially without positive or helpful suggestions. <i>Damaging</i> to career and reputation.
defect	A failing or deficiency. The property is free from <b>defect</b> .
demerit	A mark against a person for misconduct or failure; usually given in school or armed forces. <i>Ten <b>demerit</b>s and he loses his privileges.</i>
<u>detriment</u>	The state of being harmed or damaged. Light industry can be carried out in a residential area without <b>detriment</b> to its amenities.
<u>detrimental</u>	(sometimes followed by `to') causing harm or injury. Moving her could have a <b>detrimental</b> effect on her health.
disadvantage	Put at a disadvantage hinder harm. The pension scheme tends to <b>disadvantage</b> women.
disfigure	Mar or spoil the appearance of. Litter <b>disfigure</b> s the countryside.
<u>downside</u>	A negative aspect of something that is generally positive. There is a <b>downside</b> even to motherhood.
<u>drawback</u>	The quality of being a hindrance. The main <b>drawback</b> of fitting catalytic converters is the cost.
failing	Below acceptable in performance. <i>He was quick to point out his wife s <b>failing</b>s.</i>



<u>fatal</u>	Leading to failure or disaster. It is <b>fatal</b> to enter any war without the will to win it.
<u>fault</u>	Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults. <i>He studied the <b>fault</b>ing of the earth s crust.</i>
<u>flawed</u>	Having a blemish or flaw. A fatally <b>flawed</b> strategy.
<u>harmful</u>	Causing or likely to cause harm. Too much sun is <b>harmful</b> to the skin.
<u>inadequacy</u>	The state or quality of being inadequate; lack of the quantity or quality required. The <b>inadequacy</b> of unemployment benefits.
injurious	Causing or likely to cause damage or harm. Food which is <b>injurious</b> to health.
injury	An instance of being injured. Compensation for <b>injury</b> to feelings.
irremediable	Impossible to remedy or correct or redress. <i>Irremediable</i> marital breakdowns.
libel	Defame someone by publishing a libel. If a ship does you any injury you <b>libel</b> the ship.
libellous	Harmful and often untrue; tending to discredit or malign. A <b>libellous</b> newspaper story.
maleficent	Harmful or evil in intent or effect. <i>He did not act with any <b>maleficent</b> motivation.</i>
<u>mischief</u>	Harm or trouble caused by someone or something. The statute was passed to prevent a <b>mischief</b> in respect of which the defendant was already under a duty at common law.
misconceive	Fail to understand (something) correctly. <i>Criticism of the trade surplus in Washington is misconceived</i> .
<u>misunderstanding</u>	A disagreement or quarrel. <i>He left the army after a slight <b>misunderstanding</b> with his commanding officer.</i>
neurotoxin	A poison which acts on the nervous system.
prejudicial	(sometimes followed by `to') causing harm or injury. The proposals were considered <b>prejudicial</b> to the city centre.
<u>shortcoming</u>	A fault or failure to meet a certain standard, typically in a person's character, a plan, or a system. He is so forthright about his <b>shortcoming</b> s it s hard to chastise him.



## unforced

Not brought about by coercion or force. His retirement was an **unforced** departure.
