fast	Abstaining from food.
hastiness	Hasty impulsiveness.
hurriedness	Overly eager speed (and possible carelessness.
hurry	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. In my <b>hurry</b> to leave I knocked over a pile of books.
immediateness	The quickness of action or occurrence.
in a hurry	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.



in a rush	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.
precipitation	An unexpected acceleration or hastening. The storm brought several inches of <b>precipitation</b> .
promptness	The quality or habit of adhering to an appointed time.
<u>quickness</u>	The quality of being prompt to understand, think, or learn. An athlete with outstanding <b>quickness</b> and agility.
rapidity	The fact of happening at a great rate; swiftness. The fish sank into the sand with such <b>rapidity</b> that it must be seen to be believed.
rapidness	A rate that is rapid.
rush	Physician and American Revolutionary leader; signer of the Declaration of Independence (1745-1813. <i>The pre Christmas <b>rush</b>.</i>
rushing	(American football) an attempt to advance the ball by running into the line. <b>Rushing</b> is a popular option for first and second year students.
<u>speed</u>	The light-gathering power or f-number of a camera lens. An engine running at full <b>speed</b> .
swiftness	A rate (usually rapid) at which something happens. Kay had the upper hand with her agility and <b>swiftness</b> .
with alacrity	Liveliness and eagerness.
with dispatch	Killing a person or animal.
with urgency	An urgent situation calling for prompt action.






## Usage Examples of "Haste" as a noun

# Associations of "Haste" (30 Words)

<u>agility</u>	Ability to move quickly and easily. Games teach hand eye coordination mental <b>agility</b> and alertness.
bustle	A rapid active commotion. <i>The cheerleaders</i> <b>bustle</b> d about excitingly before their performance.
celerity	A rate that is rapid.
dash	A journey or period of time characterized by urgency or eager haste. The ship was <b>dash</b> ed upon the rocks.
fast	(of a surface) allowing or producing high-speed movement. They were too <b>fast</b> asleep to reply.



fastness	A secure place well protected by natural features. A remote Himalayan mountain <b>fastness</b> .
fussy	Full of unnecessary detail or decoration. A <b>fussy</b> design.
hasten	Cause to occur rapidly. We <b>hasten</b> ed back to Paris.
hie	Move fast. I <b>hie</b> d down to New Orleans.
hurried	Moving rapidly or performed quickly or in great haste. I ate a <b>hurried</b> breakfast.
hurry	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. In my <b>hurry</b> to leave I knocked over a pile of books.
<u>hustle</u>	Push one's way; bustle. Stockwell <b>hustle</b> d into the penalty area.
overhasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation. <i>Rejected what was regarded as an</i> <b>overhasty</b> <i>plan for reconversion.</i>
pace	Regulate or set the pace of. <i>Our fast <b>pace</b>d daily lives</i> .
precipitant	A cause of a particular action or event. Depression may be a <b>precipitant</b> in many cases.
quick	At a fast rate quickly. <i>Get out <b>quick</b></i> .
quicken	Cause (a fire) to burn. Her interest <b>quicken</b> ed.
quickly	With rapid movements. <i>He works <b>quickly</b></i> .
<u>quickness</u>	Intelligence as revealed by an ability to give correct responses without delay. <i>An athlete with outstanding quickness and agility.</i>
rapidity	The fact of happening at a great rate; swiftness. The fish sank into the sand with such <b>rapidity</b> that it must be seen to be believed.
rush	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. As soon as the campaign started they <b>rush</b> ed into action.
rushed	(of a person) short of time; hurrying. I m too <b>rushed</b> to do it.
rushing	The act of moving hurriedly and in a careless manner. <i>He is becoming the best <b>rushing</b> quarterback in NFL history.</i>



scramble	Make one's way quickly or awkwardly up a steep gradient or over rough ground by using one's hands as well as one's feet. <i>I lost Tommy in the <b>scramble</b> for a seat.</i>
<u>speed</u>	Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit. We turned on to the runway and began to gather <b>speed</b> .
<u>stronghold</u>	A place that has been fortified so as to protect it against attack. Their mountain <b>stronghold</b> s fell to enemy attack.
<u>swift</u>	Swiftly. A <b>swift</b> runner.
swiftness	A rate (usually rapid) at which something happens. <i>Researchers were impressed with the <b>swiftness</b> of responses.</i>
urgently	In a way which requires immediate action or attention. <i>Housing is <b>urgently</b> needed.</i>
velocity	Distance travelled per unit time. The tank shot backwards at an incredible <b>velocity</b> .
