- *The act of moving hurriedly and in a careless manner.*
- *A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry.*
- *Overly eager speed (and possible carelessness).*

briskness	Liveliness and eagerness.
fast	Abstaining from food.
hastiness	Hasty impulsiveness.
hurriedness	Overly eager speed (and possible carelessness).
hurry	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. <i>In my hurry to leave I knocked over a pile of books.</i>
immediateness	The quickness of action or occurrence.
in a hurry	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.

in a rush	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.
precipitation	An unexpected acceleration or hastening. <i>The storm brought several inches of precipitation.</i>
promptness	The quality or habit of adhering to an appointed time.
<u>quickness</u>	The quality of being prompt to understand, think, or learn. <i>An athlete with outstanding quickness and agility.</i>
rapidity	The fact of happening at a great rate; swiftness. <i>The fish sank into the sand with such rapidity that it must be seen to be believed.</i>
rapidness	A rate that is rapid.
rush	Physician and American Revolutionary leader; signer of the Declaration of Independence (1745-1813). <i>The pre Christmas rush.</i>
rushing	(American football) an attempt to advance the ball by running into the line. <i>Rushing is a popular option for first and second year students.</i>
<u>speed</u>	The light-gathering power or f-number of a camera lens. <i>An engine running at full speed.</i>
swiftness	A rate (usually rapid) at which something happens. <i>Kay had the upper hand with her agility and swiftness.</i>
with alacrity	Liveliness and eagerness.
with dispatch	Killing a person or animal.
with urgency	An urgent situation calling for prompt action.

agility	Ability to move quickly and easily. <i>Games teach hand eye coordination mental agility and alertness.</i>
bustle	A rapid active commotion. <i>The cheerleaders bustled about excitingly before their performance.</i>
celerity	A rate that is rapid.
dash	A journey or period of time characterized by urgency or eager haste. <i>The ship was dashed upon the rocks.</i>
fast	(of a surface) allowing or producing high-speed movement. <i>They were too fast asleep to reply.</i>

fastness	A secure place well protected by natural features. <i>A remote Himalayan mountain fastness.</i>
fussy	Full of unnecessary detail or decoration. <i>A fussy design.</i>
hasten	Cause to occur rapidly. <i>We hastened back to Paris.</i>
hie	Move fast. <i>I hied down to New Orleans.</i>
hurried	Moving rapidly or performed quickly or in great haste. <i>I ate a hurried breakfast.</i>
hurry	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. <i>In my hurry to leave I knocked over a pile of books.</i>
<u>hustle</u>	Push one's way; bustle. <i>Stockwell hustled into the penalty area.</i>
overhasty	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation. <i>Rejected what was regarded as an overhasty plan for reconversion.</i>
pace	Regulate or set the pace of. <i>Our fast paced daily lives.</i>
precipitant	A cause of a particular action or event. <i>Depression may be a precipitant in many cases.</i>
quick	At a fast rate quickly. <i>Get out quick.</i>
quicken	Cause (a fire) to burn. <i>Her interest quickened.</i>
quickly	With rapid movements. <i>He works quickly.</i>
<u>quickness</u>	Intelligence as revealed by an ability to give correct responses without delay. <i>An athlete with outstanding quickness and agility.</i>
rapidity	The fact of happening at a great rate; swiftness. <i>The fish sank into the sand with such rapidity that it must be seen to be believed.</i>
rush	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>As soon as the campaign started they rushed into action.</i>
rushed	(of a person) short of time; hurrying. <i>I m too rushed to do it.</i>
rushing	The act of moving hurriedly and in a careless manner. <i>He is becoming the best rushing quarterback in NFL history.</i>

scramble Make one's way quickly or awkwardly up a steep gradient or over rough ground by using one's hands as well as one's feet.
*I lost Tommy in the **scramble** for a seat.*

speed Of a motorist travel at a speed that is greater than the legal limit.
*We turned on to the runway and began to gather **speed**.*

stronghold A place that has been fortified so as to protect it against attack.
*Their mountain **strongholds** fell to enemy attack.*

swift Swiftly.
*A **swift** runner.*

swiftness A rate (usually rapid) at which something happens.
*Researchers were impressed with the **swiftness** of responses.*

urgently In a way which requires immediate action or attention.
*Housing is **urgently** needed.*

velocity Distance travelled per unit time.
*The tank shot backwards at an incredible **velocity**.*
