- abomination** Hate coupled with disgust.

- aversion** A feeling of intense dislike.  
*They made plain their **aversion** to the use of force.*
- bad feeling** That which is below standard or expectations as of ethics or decency.
- detestation** A detested person or thing.  
*Wordsworth's **detestation** of aristocracy.*
- dislike** A feeling of distaste or hostility.  
*My **dislike** of him was instinctive.*
- [distaste](#)** A feeling of intense dislike.  
*His mouth twisted with **distaste**.*

**execration** Hate coupled with disgust.

**hate** The emotion of intense dislike; a feeling of dislike so strong that it demands action.

*Richard's pet **hate** is filling in his tax returns.*

**hostility**

Hostile behaviour; unfriendliness or opposition.

*He could not conceal his **hostility**.*

**ill feeling**

An often persistent bodily disorder or disease; a cause for complaining.

**ill will**

An often persistent bodily disorder or disease; a cause for complaining.

**loathing**

A feeling of intense dislike or disgust; hatred.

*The thought filled him with **loathing**.*

**resentment**

A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.

*Some people harbour **resentments** going back many years.*

- abhor** Find repugnant.  
*He **abhorred** sexism in every form.*
- abhorrence** Hate coupled with disgust.  
*The thought of marrying him filled her with **abhorrence**.*
- abomination** An action that is vicious or vile; an action that arouses disgust or abhorrence.  
*Concrete **abominations** masquerading as hotels.*
- acrimony** A rough and bitter manner.  
*The AGM dissolved into **acrimony**.*

<b>animosity</b>	Strong hostility. <i>He no longer felt any <b>animosity</b> towards her.</i>
<b><u>animus</u></b>	Motivation to do something. <i>The author s <b>animus</b> towards her.</i>
<b>antagonism</b>	An actively expressed feeling of dislike and hostility. <i>The <b>antagonism</b> between them.</i>
<b>antipathy</b>	A feeling of intense dislike. <i>Cats were his greatest <b>antipathy</b>.</i>
<b>aversion</b>	A feeling of intense dislike. <i>They made plain their <b>aversion</b> to the use of force.</i>
<b><u>contempt</u></b>	A manner that is generally disrespectful and contemptuous. <i>This action displays an arrogant <b>contempt</b> for the wishes of the majority.</i>
<b><u>detest</u></b>	Dislike intensely. <i>She <b>detests</b> politicians.</i>
<b>detestation</b>	Intense dislike. <i>He is the <b>detestation</b> of the neighbourhood.</i>
<b>detested</b>	Treated with dislike or contempt.
<b>disaffection</b>	Disloyalty to the government or to established authority. <i>There is growing <b>disaffection</b> with large corporations.</i>
<b>discourtesy</b>	An impolite act or remark. <i>He was able to discourage visitors without obvious <b>discourtesy</b>.</i>
<b><u>disgust</u></b>	Cause (someone) to feel revulsion or strong disapproval. <i>Some of the audience walked out in <b>disgust</b>.</i>
<b>dislike</b>	Have or feel a dislike or distaste for. <i>They had taken a <b>dislike</b> to each other.</i>
<b><u>enmity</u></b>	The feeling of a hostile person. <i>Decades of <b>enmity</b> between the two countries.</i>
<b>execration</b>	Hate coupled with disgust.
<b>hate</b>	The emotion of intense dislike; a feeling of dislike so strong that it demands action. <i>He <b>hates</b> flying.</i>
<b><u>hostility</u></b>	The feeling of a hostile person. <i>He could no longer contain his <b>hostility</b>.</i>
<b>loathing</b>	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>The thought filled him with <b>loathing</b>.</i>
<b>malice</b>	The quality of threatening evil. <i>I bear no <b>malice</b> towards anybody.</i>

<b>odium</b>	Hate coupled with disgust. <i>He incurred widespread <b>odium</b> for military failures and government corruption.</i>
<b>rancour</b>	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will. <i>He spoke without <b>rancour</b>.</i>
<b>repellent</b>	A compound with which fabrics are treated to repel water. <i>Water <b>repellent</b> nylon.</i>
<b>scorn</b>	A person viewed with contempt or disdain. <i>At her lowest ebb she would have <b>scorned</b> to stoop to such tactics.</i>
<b>umbrage</b>	Shade or shadow, especially as cast by trees. <i>She took <b>umbrage</b> at his remarks.</i>
<b><u>vitriol</u></b>	Expose to the effects of vitriol or injure with vitriol. <i>Her mother's sudden gush of fury and <b>vitriol</b>.</i>
<b>vituperation</b>	Bitter and abusive language. <i>No one else attracted such <b>vituperation</b> from him.</i>
