- *Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy.*
- *Arrogantly superior and disdainful.*



## Synonyms of "Haughty" as an adjective (29 Words)

- above oneself** Appearing earlier in the same text.
- arrogant** Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one's own importance or abilities.  
*A typically **arrogant** assumption.*
- cavalier** Given to haughty disregard of others.  
*Anne was irritated by his **cavalier** attitude.*
- conceited** Excessively proud of oneself; vain.  
*An attitude of self **conceited** arrogance.*
- condescending** Having or showing an attitude of patronizing superiority.  
*She thought the teachers were arrogant and **condescending**.*
- contemptuous** Expressing extreme contempt.  
*She was intolerant and **contemptuous** of the majority of the human race.*
- disdainful** Showing contempt or lack of respect.  
*Some economists are **disdainful** of their colleagues in other social disciplines.*
- egotistical** Excessively conceited or absorbed in oneself; self-centred.  
*He s selfish **egotistical** and arrogant.*

<b>full of oneself</b>	Containing as much or as many as is possible or normal.
<b>high-handed</b>	Given to haughty disregard of others.
<b>imperious</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His <b>imperious</b> demands.</i>
<b>lofty</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style. <i><b>Lofty</b> intellectual disdain.</i>
<b>lordly</b>	Of or befitting a lord. <i>They were putting on <b>lordly</b> airs.</i>
<b>overbearing</b>	Expecting unquestioning obedience. <i>An <b>overbearing</b> ill tempered brute.</i>
<b>overweening</b>	Showing excessive confidence or pride. <i><b>Overweening</b> ambition.</i>
<b>patronizing</b>	(used of behavior or attitude) characteristic of those who treat others with condescension. <i>He smiled in a rather <b>patronizing</b> manner.</i>
<b>pompous</b>	Affectedly grand, solemn, or self-important. <i>Processions and other <b>pompous</b> shows.</i>
<b>prideful</b>	Having an excessively high opinion of oneself. <i>Walked with a <b>prideful</b> swagger.</i>
<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i>A <b>proud</b> grandma of three boys.</i>
<b>scornful</b>	Feeling or expressing contempt or derision. <i><b>Scornful</b> laughter.</i>
<b>self-important</b>	Having or showing feelings of unwarranted importance out of overbearing pride.
<b>smug</b>	Having or showing an excessive pride in oneself or one's achievements. <i>He was feeling <b>smug</b> after his win.</i>
<b>sniffy</b>	Scornful; contemptuous. <i>Some people are <b>sniffy</b> about tea bags.</i>
<b>snobbish</b>	Relating to, characteristic of, or like a snob. <i>The writer takes a rather <b>snobbish</b> tone.</i>
<b>stuck-up</b>	Overly conceited or arrogant-Laurent Le Sage.
<b>supercilious</b>	Behaving or looking as though one thinks one is superior to others. <i>Curled his lip in a <b>supercilious</b> smile.</i>
<b>superior</b>	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>A <b>superior</b> officer.</i>

**swaggering** Very chic.  
A *swaggering* bully.

**vain** Producing no result; useless.  
A *vain* attempt to tidy up the room.

*Her **ambition** was to become a pilot.*
- [arrogant](#) Having or revealing an exaggerated sense of one's own importance or abilities.  
*An **arrogant** official.*
- arty** Making a strong, affected, or pretentious display of being artistic or interested in the arts.  
*A very **arty** film.*
- blowhard** A boastful or pompous person.  
*The segregationist **blowhards** who would dominate the politics of my state for a generation.*
- boastful** Exhibiting self-importance.  
*A **boastful** letter.*

<b><u>braggadocio</u></b>	Boastful or arrogant behaviour.
<b>braggart</b>	Exhibiting self-importance. <i><b>Braggart</b> men.</i>
<b>bragging</b>	An instance of boastful talk. <i>We became involved in a lively <b>bragging</b> session.</i>
<b>brash</b>	Having an ostentatious or tasteless appearance. <i>He was <b>brash</b> cocky and arrogant.</i>
<b>conceit</b>	The trait of being unduly vain and conceited false pride. <i>He could always come up with some inspired off the wall <b>conceit</b>.</i>
<b>conceited</b>	Excessively proud of oneself; vain. <i>Fred s so <b>conceited</b> he d never believe anyone would refuse him.</i>
<b>confident</b>	Not liable to error in judgment or action. <i>We require outgoing <b>confident</b> people able to approach large groups.</i>
<b>imperious</b>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His <b>imperious</b> demands.</i>
<b>insolently</b>	In an insolent manner.
<b>lordly</b>	Of, characteristic of, or suitable for a lord. <i><b>Lordly</b> titles.</i>
<b><u>overbearing</u></b>	Unpleasantly overpowering. <i>Insufferably <b>overbearing</b> behavior toward the waiter.</i>
<b>pomposity</b>	Lack of elegance as a consequence of being pompous and puffed up with vanity. <i>His reputation for arrogance and <b>pomposity</b>.</i>
<b>pompous</b>	Affectedly grand, solemn, or self-important. <i>Processions and other <b>pompous</b> shows.</i>
<b>poseur</b>	A person who behaves affectedly in order to impress others.
<b><u>presumptuous</u></b>	Excessively forward. <i>The duchess would not put up with <b>presumptuous</b> servants.</i>
<b><u>pride</u></b>	The trait of being spurred on by a dislike of falling below your standards. <i>I went to <b>pride</b> as a teenager before I was ready to come out.</i>
<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i>A <b>proud</b> moment.</i>
<b><u>snob</u></b>	A person who believes that their tastes in a particular area are superior to those of other people. <i>A musical <b>snob</b>.</i>

- snobbish** Relating to, characteristic of, or like a snob.  
*The writer takes a rather **snobbish** tone.*
- supercilious** Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy.  
*Curled his lip in a **supercilious** smile.*
- superciliousness** The trait of displaying arrogance by patronizing those considered inferior.
- vainglorious** Excessively proud of oneself or one's achievements; overly vain.  
*This **vainglorious** boast of personal infallibility.*
- vainglory** Excessive pride in oneself or one's achievements; excessive vanity.  
*His **vainglory** put the Republic at risk.*
- vanity** Excessive pride in or admiration of one's own appearance or achievements.  
*It flattered his **vanity** to think I was in love with him.*
- vaunt** A boast.  
*He was initially **vaunted** by the West for his leadership of the country.*
