- *(of a ghost) manifest itself at (a place) regularly.*
- *Follow stealthily or recur constantly and spontaneously to.*
- *(of something unpleasant) continue to affect or cause problems for.*
- *Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place.*
- *(of a person or animal) frequent (a place).*
- *Be persistently and disturbingly present in (the mind).*
- *Haunt like a ghost; pursue.*

- afflict** (of a problem or illness) cause pain or trouble to; affect adversely.
*He comforted the **afflicted**.*
- appear in** Appear as a character on stage or appear in a play etc.
- be a regular client of** Be identical to; be someone or something.
- be a regular visitor to** Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
- bedevil** (of something bad) cause great and continual trouble to.
*Projects like this are **bedevilled** by a shortage of cash.*
- beleaguer** Surround so as to force to give up.
*He attempts to answer several questions that **beleaguer** the industry.*
- beset** Surround and harass.
*The zebra was **beset** by leopards.*

<u>besiege</u>	Surround and harass. <i>The television station was besieged with calls.</i>
<u>burden</u>	Cause (someone) worry, hardship, or distress. <i>They were not yet burdened with adult responsibility.</i>
cause suffering to	Give rise to; cause to happen or occur, not always intentionally.
<u>disturb</u>	Destroy the peace or tranquility of. <i>Don't disturb the patient's wounds by moving him too rapidly.</i>
<u>frequent</u>	Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place. <i>Bears which persisted in frequenting developed areas.</i>
<u>ghost</u>	Act as ghostwriter of a work. <i>The masked men ghosted across the moonlit yard.</i>
gnaw at	Bite or chew on with the teeth.
harrow	Draw a harrow over land. <i>Todd could take it whereas I'm harrowed by it.</i>
lie heavy on	Assume a reclining position.
linger in	Be about.
loiter in	Be about.
materialize in	Come into being; become reality.
nag at	Bother persistently with trivial complaints.
<u>obsess</u>	Preoccupy or fill the mind of (someone) continually and to a troubling extent. <i>He was obsessed with the idea of revenge.</i>
<u>oppress</u>	Come down on or keep down by unjust use of one's authority. <i>He was oppressed by some secret worry.</i>
patronize	Give financial or other support to (a person, organization, or cause). <i>She was determined not to be put down or patronized.</i>
<u>plague</u>	Pester or harass (someone) continually. <i>He has been plagued by ill health.</i>
prey on	Prey on or hunt for.
rack	Move by a rack and pinion. <i>Rack leather.</i>
spend time in	Spend completely.
<u>stalk</u>	Go through (an area) in search of prey. <i>Her ex-boyfriend stalked her.</i>

torment	Torment emotionally or mentally. <i>He was tormented by jealousy.</i>
<u>torture</u>	Subject to torture. <i>His tortured mind.</i>
trouble	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>Could I trouble you for a receipt.</i>
visit regularly	Assail.
weigh heavily on	Show consideration for; take into account.
<u>worry</u>	Touch or rub constantly. <i>I found my dog contentedly worrying a bone.</i>

A morbid fear of being closed in a confined space.
*The small stuffy room had begun to give him **claustrophobia**.*

dread

A person with dreadlocks.
*The man whom Henry **dreaded** as the future champion of English freedom.*

extrasensory	Seemingly outside normal sensory channels.
fear	The likelihood of something unwelcome happening. <i>I fear I won't make it to your wedding party.</i>
fearfulness	The trait of being afraid.
fright	Frighten. <i>I got the fright of my life seeing her in the hotel.</i>
frighten	Drive out by frightening. <i>If you say anything to him you might frighten him off.</i>
<u>frightening</u>	Making someone afraid or anxious; terrifying. <i>A frightening experience.</i>
<u>ghost</u>	Act as ghostwriter of a work. <i>The building is haunted by the ghost of a monk.</i>
<u>horror</u>	A literary or film genre concerned with arousing feelings of horror. <i>Many have a horror of consulting a dictionary.</i>
<u>obsess</u>	Haunt like a ghost; pursue. <i>He was obsessed with the idea of revenge.</i>
<u>panic</u>	Drive someone through panic into hasty action. <i>The students panicked when told that final exams were less than a week away.</i>
paranormal	Seemingly outside normal sensory channels. <i>What seemed to be paranormal manifestations.</i>
petrify	Change into stone. <i>Slogans petrify our thinking.</i>
<u>psychic</u>	A person considered or claiming to have psychic powers a medium. <i>Psychic powers.</i>
<u>psychological</u>	Of, affecting, or arising in the mind; related to the mental and emotional state of a person. <i>The victim had sustained physical and psychological damage.</i>
scared	Fearful; frightened. <i>I'm scared stiff of flying.</i>
scary	Frightening; causing fear. <i>It was scary the way they bonded with each other.</i>
spectral	Of or like a ghost. <i>A spectral menacing face.</i>
spirit	Infuse with spirit. <i>I hope the team will build on this spirit of confidence.</i>

<u>terrified</u>	Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation. <i>The terrified horse bolted.</i>
terrify	Cause to feel extreme fear. <i>The thought terrifies me.</i>
<u>terrifying</u>	Causing extreme terror. <i>A terrifying wail.</i>
terror	Terrorism. <i>His delivery is the terror of even world class batsmen.</i>
thriller	A very exciting contest or experience. <i>A tense thriller about a diamond heist that goes badly wrong.</i>
timidity	Lack of courage or confidence. <i>She believes everyone can overcome their timidity.</i>
