### Definitions of "Haven" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “haven” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A place of safety or refuge.*
- *An inlet providing shelter for ships or boats; a harbour or small port.*
- *A shelter serving as a place of safety or sanctuary.*
- *A sheltered port where ships can take on or discharge cargo.*



## Synonyms of "Haven" as a noun (17 Words)

<b>anchorage</b>	An anchorite's dwelling place. <i>The mother provides emotional <b>anchorage</b> for the entire family.</i>
<b>asylum</b>	Shelter or protection from danger. <i>He'd been committed to an <b>asylum</b>.</i>
<b>harbor</b>	A sheltered port where ships can take on or discharge cargo.
<b>harbour</b>	A sheltered port where ships can take on or discharge cargo. <i>The westerly wind kept us in <b>harbour</b> until the following afternoon.</i>
<b>mooring</b>	The ropes, chains, or anchors by or to which a boat, ship, or buoy is moored. <i>They tied up at Water Gypsy's permanent <b>moorings</b>.</i>
<b>oasis</b>	A shelter serving as a place of safety or sanctuary. <i>The park is an <b>oasis</b> of calm in the centre of the city.</i>
<b>place of safety</b>	A space reserved for sitting (as in a theater or on a train or airplane).

**place of security** A general vicinity.

**port** A place seaport or airport where people and merchandise can enter or leave a country.

*The French **port** of Toulon.*

**port in a storm** An opening (in a wall or ship or armored vehicle) for firing through.

**refuge** Act of turning to for assistance.

*The family came to be seen as a **refuge** from a harsh world.*

**retreat** A quiet or secluded place in which one can rest and relax.

*Their country **retreat** in Ireland.*

**roads** A partly sheltered anchorage.

**sanctuary** A nature reserve.

*A donkey **sanctuary**.*

**sanctum** A place of inviolable privacy.

*An icon installed within the **sanctum** of the temple.*

**seaport** A sheltered port where ships can take on or discharge cargo.

**shelter** A way of organizing business to reduce the taxes it must pay on current earnings.

*Huts like this are used as a **shelter** during the winter.*

## Associations of "Haven" (30 Words)

### asylum

A hospital for mentally incompetent or unbalanced person.  
*We provide **asylum** for those too ill to care for themselves.*

### **crossing**

The action of crossing something.  
*We were thirty yards from the **crossing** when a man stepped off the pavement.*

### **deportation**

The action of deporting a foreigner from a country.  
*Asylum seekers facing **deportation**.*

### **deviant**

A deviant person or thing.  
*Killers **deviants** and those whose actions are beyond most human comprehension.*

**disembarkation** The act of passengers and crew getting off of a ship or aircraft.

**embarkation** The act of passengers and crew getting aboard a ship or aircraft.

<b>emigration</b>	The act of leaving one's own country to settle permanently in another; moving abroad. <i>Mass <b>emigration</b> from Ireland to the United States.</i>
<b>escape</b>	Escape potentially unpleasant consequences get away with a forbidden action. <i>Hard work was his <b>escape</b> from worry.</i>
<b>escaped</b>	Having escaped especially from confinement. <i>Searching for two <b>escaped</b> prisoners.</i>
<b>exile</b>	The act of expelling a person from their native land. <i>The poet was <b>exiled</b> because he signed a letter protesting the government's actions.</i>
<b>exodus</b>	The departure of the Israelites from Egypt. <i>The annual <b>exodus</b> of sun seeking Canadians to Florida.</i>
<b>flee</b>	Run away quickly. <i>He was forced to <b>flee</b> the country.</i>
<b>guard</b>	The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team. <i>An insurance policy is a good <b>safeguard</b>.</i>
<b>harbor</b>	A place of refuge and comfort and security. <i>She is <b>harboring</b> a grudge against him.</i>
<b>harbour</b>	Of a ship or its crew moor in a harbour. <i>They enjoyed fishing in the <b>harbour</b>.</i>
<b>influx</b>	The process of flowing in. <i>The lakes are fed by <b>influxes</b> of meltwater.</i>
<b>migrant</b>	Habitually moving from place to place especially in search of seasonal work. <i><b>Migrant</b> birds.</i>
<b>oasis</b>	A shelter serving as a place of safety or sanctuary. <i>The park is an <b>oasis</b> of calm in the centre of the city.</i>
<b>pier</b>	A breakwater or mole.
<b>port</b>	Turn or go to the port or left side of a ship. <i>The French <b>port</b> of Toulon.</i>
<b>protection</b>	Protection money paid to criminals especially on a regular basis. <i>A <b>protection</b> racket.</i>
<b>recourse</b>	Act of turning to for assistance. <i>Surgery may be the only <b>recourse</b>.</i>
<b>refuge</b>	A shelter from danger or hardship. <i>Took <b>refuge</b> in lying.</i>

<b>refugee</b>	A person who has been forced to leave their country in order to escape war, persecution, or natural disaster. <i>A <b>refugee</b> camp.</i>
<b>repatriate</b>	A person who has been repatriated. <i>Foreign firms would be permitted to <b>repatriate</b> all profits.</i>
<b>run</b>	Move about freely and without restraint or act as if running around in an uncontrolled way. <i>Everything s <b>running</b> according to plan.</i>
<b>safety</b>	A play in which the ball is downed by the offence in their own end zone, scoring two points to the defence. <i>A <b>safety</b> helmet.</i>
<u><b>sanctuary</b></u>	A shelter from danger or hardship. <i>She thought of her room as a <b>sanctuary</b>.</i>
<u><b>shelter</b></u>	Provide shelter for. <i>He hung back in the <b>shelter</b> of a rock.</i>
<b>transportation</b>	The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966. <i>The era of global mass <b>transportation</b>.</i>
