colonist	A person who settles in a new colony or moves into new country.

commencement	An academic exercise in which diplomas are conferred. <i>The date of commencement.</i>
early	Of an early stage in the development of a language or literature. <i>Took early retirement.</i>
emanate	Originate from; be produced by. <i>He emanated a powerful brooding air.</i>
fore	Front part of a vessel or aircraft. <i>The fore and hind pairs of wings.</i>
front	Provide something with a front or facing of a particular type or material. <i>The Spartans preserving an even and unbroken front.</i>
germinal	In the earliest stage of development. <i>De Beauvoir s germinal book <i>The Second Sex</i>.</i>
inaugurate	Commence officially. <i>He inaugurated a new policy of trade and exploration.</i>
incipient	Only partly in existence; imperfectly formed. <i>An incipient black eye.</i>

initial	Mark or sign a document with one's initials in order to authorize or validate it. <i>See that your client initials all alterations.</i>
initially	At the beginning. <i>Initially he thought the new concept was nonsense.</i>
initiate	A person who has been initiated into an organization or activity. <i>He initiated a new program.</i>
<u>initiative</u>	Serving to set in motion. <i>Anti hunting groups have seized the initiative in the dispute.</i>
introduction	A thing preliminary to something else, especially an explanatory section at the beginning of a book, report, or speech. <i>Issues arising from the introduction of new technology.</i>
launch	An act or instance of launching something. <i>He launched a biting attack on BBC chiefs.</i>
<u>origin</u>	The point or place where something begins, arises, or is derived. <i>Origin in sensation.</i>
<u>originate</u>	Bring into being. <i>The flight originates in Calcutta.</i>
outset	The start or beginning of something. <i>The project was flawed from the outset.</i>
<u>pioneer</u>	Open up a road or terrain as a pioneer. <i>The technique was pioneered by a Swiss doctor in the 1930s.</i>
projectile	Denoting or relating to a projectile. <i>A projectile weapon.</i>
pundit	Someone who has been admitted to membership in a scholarly field. <i>Political pundits were tipping him for promotion.</i>
<u>rocket</u>	An elongated rocket propelled missile or spacecraft. <i>She showed the kind of form that rocketed her to the semi finals last year.</i>
settler	A clerk in a betting shop who calculates the winnings. <i>The early European settlers in America were often fleeing from religious persecution.</i>
source	Obtain from a particular source. <i>The writer carefully sourced her report.</i>
<u>stirring</u>	Agitating a liquid with an implement. <i>A stirring and thriving politician.</i>
