| <a href="#">front</a>        | Provide something with a front or facing of a particular type or material.<br><i>The Spartans preserving an even and unbroken <b>front</b>.</i> |
| <b>germinal</b>              | In the earliest stage of development.<br><i>De Beauvoir s <b>germinal</b> book <i>The Second Sex</i>.</i>                                       |
| <b>inaugurate</b>            | Commence officially.<br><i>He <b>inaugurated</b> a new policy of trade and exploration.</i>   |
| <a href="#">incipient</a>    | Only partly in existence; imperfectly formed.<br><i>An <b>incipient</b> black eye.</i>  |

| <b>initial</b>           | Mark or sign a document with one's initials in order to authorize or validate it.<br><i>See that your client <b>initials</b> all alterations.</i>  |
| <b>initially</b>         | At the beginning.<br><i><b>Initially</b> he thought the new concept was nonsense.</i>  |
| <b>initiate</b>          | A person who has been initiated into an organization or activity.<br><i>He <b>initiated</b> a new program.</i>   |
| <b><u>initiative</u></b> | Serving to set in motion.<br><i>Anti hunting groups have seized the <b>initiative</b> in the dispute.</i>  |

| <b><u>origin</u></b>     | The point or place where something begins, arises, or is derived.<br><i><b>Origin</b> in sensation.</i>  |
| <b><u>originate</u></b>  | Bring into being.<br><i>The flight <b>originates</b> in Calcutta.</i>  |
| <b>outset</b>            | The start or beginning of something.<br><i>The project was flawed from the <b>outset</b>.</i>  |
| <b><u>pioneer</u></b>    | Open up a road or terrain as a pioneer.<br><i>The technique was <b>pioneered</b> by a Swiss doctor in the 1930s.</i>   |
| <b>projectile</b>        | Denoting or relating to a projectile.<br><i>A <b>projectile</b> weapon.</i>  |
| <b>pundit</b>            | Someone who has been admitted to membership in a scholarly field.<br><i>Political <b>pundits</b> were tipping him for promotion.</i>   |
| <b><u>rocket</u></b>     | An elongated rocket propelled missile or spacecraft.<br><i>She showed the kind of form that <b>rocketed</b> her to the semi finals last year.</i>  |
| <b>settler</b>           | A clerk in a betting shop who calculates the winnings.<br><i>The early European <b>settlers</b> in America were often fleeing from religious persecution.</i>                                    |
