<b>curing</b>	Prepare by drying, salting, or chemical processing in order to preserve.
<b><u>ease</u></b>	Of share prices interest rates etc decrease in value or amount. <i>International tension began to <b>ease</b>.</i>
<b>get better</b>	Come into the possession of something concrete or abstract.
<b>get someone back on their feet</b>	Receive a specified treatment (abstract).
<b>get well</b>	Grasp with the mind or develop an understanding of.
<b>harmonize</b>	Sing or play in harmony. <i>The colors don t <b>harmonize</b>.</i>
<b>help</b>	Give help or assistance be of service. <i>She never <b>helps</b> around the house.</i>
<b>improve</b>	Get better. <i>Communications <b>improved</b> during the 18th century.</i>
<b>lessen</b>	Make smaller. <i>The warmth of the afternoon <b>lessened</b>.</i>
<b>make better</b>	Behave in a certain way.
<b>make good</b>	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.
<b>make well</b>	Give certain properties to something.
<b>mend</b>	Heal or recover. <i>Foot injuries can take months to <b>mend</b>.</i>
<b>mitigate</b>	Make less severe or harsh. <i>Drainage schemes have helped to <b>mitigate</b> this problem.</i>

<b>palliate</b>	Allay or moderate (fears or suspicions). <i>This eliminated or at least <b>palliated</b> suspicions aroused by German unity.</i>

<b>put someone on the road to recovery</b>	Adapt.
