<b>bundle</b>	A set of nerve, muscle, or other fibres running in parallel close together. <i>She made a <b>bundle</b> selling real estate.</i>
<b>bus</b>	The topology of a network whose components are connected by a busbar. <i>The <b>busbar</b> in this computer can transmit data either way between any two components of the system.</i>
<b>conveyance</b>	The action or process of transporting or carrying someone or something from one place to another. <i>Art s <b>conveyance</b> of meaning is complicated.</i>
<b>cumulation</b>	A collection of objects laid on top of each other.
<b>cumulus</b>	Cloud forming rounded masses heaped on each other above a flat base at fairly low altitude. <i>The high <b>cumulus</b> is breaking up to give a lovely summer evening.</i>
<b>deal</b>	The set of hands dealt to the players. <i>Working mothers get a bad <b>deal</b>.</i>
<b>dune</b>	A ridge of sand created by the wind; found in deserts or near lakes and oceans. <i>A sand <b>dune</b>.</i>
<b><u>flock</u></b>	An orderly crowd. <i>A <b>flock</b> of gulls.</i>
<b>good deal</b>	Moral excellence or admirableness.

<b>jalopy</b>	A car that is old and unreliable. <i>His father got worried about him driving that old <b>jalopy</b> it wasn't safe.</i>
<b>jumble</b>	Articles collected for a jumble sale. <i>The books were in a chaotic <b>jumble</b>.</i>
<b>load</b>	A burden of responsibility, worry, or grief. <i>I do at least six <b>loads</b> of washing a week.</i>
<b>lot</b>	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>Nineteen <b>lots</b> failed to sell.</i>
<b>lots</b>	A parcel of land having fixed boundaries. <i>Made <b>lots</b> of new friends.</i>
<b>machine</b>	A person who acts with the mechanical efficiency of a machine. <i>Comedians are more than just laugh <b>machines</b>.</i>
<b>mass</b>	A large number of people or objects crowded together. <i>Seaside towns that catered for the <b>masses</b>.</i>
<b>masses</b>	A large number or amount or extent.
<b>means of transport</b>	Considerable capital (wealth or income).
<b>mess</b>	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>He needs treatment of some kind he's a real <b>mess</b>.</i>
<b>mickle</b>	A large amount.
<b>mint</b>	A peppermint sweet. <i>Plant <b>mint</b> in a large pot with drainage holes.</i>

<b>pile</b>	A column of wood or steel or concrete that is driven into the ground to provide support for a structure. <i>A Victorian Gothic <b>pile</b>.</i>
<b>plenty</b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>Such natural phenomena as famine and <b>plenty</b>.</i>
<b>quantities</b>	The concept that something has a magnitude and can be represented in mathematical expressions by a constant or a variable. <i>He had a <b>quantity</b> of ammunition.</i>

<b>caisson</b>	Large watertight chamber used for construction under water.
<b><u>cluster</u></b>	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>Ten <b>clusters</b> from all the primary health centres were selected.</i>
<b>collection</b>	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>A preview of their autumn <b>collection</b>.</i>
<b>compost</b>	Convert to compost. <i>Peat free <b>composts</b>.</i>
<b><u>congregate</u></b>	Gather into a crowd or mass. <i>The crowds <b>congregated</b> in front of the Vatican on Christmas Eve.</i>
<b><u>flock</u></b>	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>Tourists <b>flock</b> to Oxford in their thousands.</i>
<b><u>jam</u></b>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>Listeners <b>jammed</b> a radio station s switchboard with calls.</i>
<b>load</b>	Of a ship or vehicle take on a load. <i>The system broke down under excessive <b>loads</b>.</i>
<b>lot</b>	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>An inefficient <b>lot</b> our Council.</i>
<b><u>multitude</u></b>	A large number of people or things. <i>Father Peter addressed the <b>multitude</b>.</i>
<b>nucleate</b>	Having a nucleus. <i>Some cells had <b>nucleated</b>.</i>
<b><u>overload</u></b>	Become overloaded. <i>Both boats were <b>overloaded</b> and low in the water.</i>
<b><u>pack</u></b>	Seal with packing. <i>The nurse <b>packed</b> gauze in the wound.</i>
<b>pile</b>	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>My students <b>piled</b> out of three cars.</i>
<b>plenitude</b>	The condition of being full or complete. <i>An ancient Celtic god thought to bring a <b>plenitude</b> of wealth or food.</i>
