<b><u>accumulate</u></b>	Get or gather together. <i>The toxin <b>accumulated</b> in their bodies.</i>
<b><u>accumulation</u></b>	A mass or quantity of something that has gradually gathered or been acquired. <i>The <b>accumulation</b> of wealth.</i>

	A mass or collection of things; an assemblage.
<b><u>agglomeration</u></b>	<i>The arts centre is an <b>agglomeration</b> of theatres galleries shops restaurants and bars.</i>
<b>amass</b>	Gather together in a crowd or group. <i>He <b>amassed</b> a fortune estimated at close to a million pounds.</i>
<b><u>assemble</u></b>	(of male moths) gather for mating in response to a pheromone released by a female. <i><b>Assemble</b> your colleagues.</i>
<b>batch</b>	Batch together assemble or process as a batch. <i>I had nothing to do but <b>batch</b> the reports.</i>
<b><u>bunch</u></b>	Form into a bunch. <i>She <b>bunched</b> her fingers into a fist.</i>
<b>bundle</b>	Make into a bundle. <i>They <b>bundled</b> out into the corridor.</i>
<b>caisson</b>	A chest or wagon for holding or conveying ammunition.
<b><u>cluster</u></b>	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>Ten <b>clusters</b> from all the primary health centres were selected.</i>
<b>collection</b>	A sum of money raised during a church or charity collection. <i>The <b>collection</b> of data.</i>
<b>compost</b>	Treat soil with compost. <i>Sweet peppers can be grown singly in pots of potting <b>compost</b>.</i>
<b><u>congregate</u></b>	Gather into a crowd or mass. <i>Some 4 000 demonstrators had <b>congregated</b> at a border point.</i>
<b><u>flock</u></b>	Come together as in a cluster or flock. <i>A <b>flock</b> of gulls.</i>
<b><u>jam</u></b>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>Mum dad and I <b>jammed</b> into the pickup truck.</i>
<b>load</b>	Place a load or large quantity of something on or in a vehicle ship container etc. <i>In addition to their own food they must carry a <b>load</b> of up to eighty pounds.</i>
<b>lot</b>	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>It s just one <b>lot</b> of rich people stealing from another.</i>
<b><u>multitude</u></b>	A large indefinite number. <i>A <b>multitude</b> of TV antennas.</i>

<b>nucleate</b>	Form into a nucleus. <i><b>Nucleated</b> cells.</i>
<b><u>overload</u></b>	Become overloaded. <i>Don t <b>overload</b> the car.</i>
<b><u>pack</u></b>	Seal with packing. <i>The murder trial <b>packed</b> the court house.</i>
<b>pile</b>	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>A Victorian Gothic <b>pile</b>.</i>
<b>plenitude</b>	An abundance. <i>The <b>plenitude</b> of the Pope s powers.</i>
<b>sheaf</b>	A bundle of objects of one kind, especially papers. <i>The corn and barley had to be <b>sheafed</b> and stooked.</i>
<b><u>stack</u></b>	Arrange in stacks. <i><b>Stack</b> the deck of cards.</i>
<b><u>stacked</u></b>	(of a woman) having large breasts. <i>Full sized washer dryers are replacing <b>stacked</b> units.</i>
<b>superimpose</b>	Place on top of. <i>Can you <b>superimpose</b> the two images.</i>
<b><u>swarm</u></b>	Of flying insects move in or form a swarm. <i>A <b>swarm</b> of insects obscured the light.</i>
<b>ton</b>	A unit of weight or volume of sea cargo equal to a metric ton 1 000 kg or 40 cu ft. <i>I feel <b>tons</b> better.</i>
