## Hear as a Verb

### Definitions of "Hear" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “hear” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Be told or informed of.*
- *Perceive (sound) via the auditory sense.*
- *Receive a communication from someone.*
- *Examine or hear (evidence or a case) by judicial process.*
- *Listen or pay attention to.*
- *Perceive with the ear the sound made by (someone or something).*
- *Listen to and grant (a prayer).*
- *Listen to and judge (a case or plaintiff).*
- *Get to know or become aware of, usually accidentally.*
- *Listen and pay attention.*



## Synonyms of "Hear" as a verb (28 Words)

<b>apprehend</b>	Arrest (someone) for a crime. <i>We enter a field of vision we could not otherwise <b>apprehend</b>.</i>
<b><u>ascertain</u></b>	Find out, learn, or determine with certainty, usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>An attempt to <b>ascertain</b> the cause of the accident.</i>
<b>be given to understand</b>	Have an existence, be extant.
<b>be informed</b>	Spend or use time.
<b>be made aware</b>	Be identical or equivalent to.
<b>be told</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>catch</b>	Be the catcher. <i>She was hurrying downstairs to <b>catch</b> the news.</i>
<b>discern</b>	Recognize or find out. <i>She could faintly <b>discern</b> the shape of a skull.</i>
<b>discover</b>	Make a discovery make a new finding. <i>A teenager who has recently <b>discovered</b> fashion.</i>

<b>find out</b>	Decide on and make a declaration about.
<b><u>gather</u></b>	Collect or gather. <i>She <b>gathered</b> the child in her arms.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>The operator couldn't <b>get</b> Kobe because of the earthquake.</i>
<b>get a line</b>	Reach a destination; arrive by movement or progress.
<b>get wind</b>	Receive as a retribution or punishment.
<b>get word</b>	Receive as a retribution or punishment.
<b><u>glean</u></b>	Obtain (information) from various sources, often with difficulty. <i>The conditions of farm workers in the 1890s made <b>gleaning</b> essential.</i>
<b>hear tell</b>	Get to know or become aware of, usually accidentally.
<b><u>judge</u></b>	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>Other cases were <b>judged</b> by tribunal.</i>
<b>learn</b>	Commit to memory learn by heart. <i>That'll <b>learn</b> you he chuckled.</i>
<b>listen</b>	Listen and pay attention. <i>If I've had a stressful day I love to chill out and <b>listen</b> to music.</i>
<b>make out</b>	Achieve a point or goal.
<b><u>perceive</u></b>	To become aware of through the senses. <i>His mouth fell open as he <b>perceived</b> the truth.</i>
<b>pick up</b>	Pull lightly but sharply with a plucking motion.
<b><u>see</u></b>	See and understand have a good eye. <i>In the distance she could <b>see</b> the blue sea.</i>
<b>sit in judgement on</b>	Serve in a specific professional capacity.
<b>take heed</b>	Accept or undergo, often unwillingly.
<b>take in</b>	Take into one's possession.
<b>try</b>	Put to the test, as for its quality, or give experimental use to. <i>They decided to <b>try</b> for another baby.</i>

- *No doubt you heard about the raid.*
- *The jury had heard all the evidence.*
- *Our Heavenly Father has heard our prayers.*

- *An all-woman jury heard the case.*
- *She just doesn't hear what I'm telling her.*
- *Have you heard the news?*
- *We must hear the expert before we make a decision.*





## Associations of "Hear" (30 Words)

<b>aloud</b>	Audibly; not silently or in a whisper. <i>Cried <b>aloud</b> for help.</i>
<b><u>audible</u></b>	A change of playing tactics called by the quarterback at the line of scrimmage. <i>He spoke in an <b>audible</b> whisper.</i>
<b><u>audio</u></b>	An audible acoustic wave frequency. <i>They always raise the <b>audio</b> for commercials.</i>
<b>bell</b>	Nautical each of the eight half hour units of nautical time signaled by strokes of a ship's bell eight bells signals 4 00 8 00 or 12 00 o'clock either a.m. or p.m. <i>No problem I'll <b>bell</b> her tomorrow.</i>
<b>cackle</b>	A loud laugh suggestive of a hen's cackle. <i>Corporate luminaries <b>cackle</b> on about the importance of quality.</i>

<b>clang</b>	Make or cause to make a clang. <i>The belfry still <b>clangs</b> its bell at 9 p m.</i>
<b>click</b>	Produce a click. <i>The key <b>clicked</b> in the lock and the door opened.</i>
<b>ding</b>	Go ding dong like a bell. <i>Cash registers were <b>dinging</b> softly.</i>
<b>doorbell</b>	A push button at an outer door that gives a ringing or buzzing signal when pushed. <i>Charlotte rang the <b>doorbell</b>.</i>
<b>echo</b>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>His contention contains more than an <b>echo</b> of Rousseau.</i>
<b>gramophone</b>	An antique record player; the sound of the vibrating needle is amplified acoustically.
<b>hearing</b>	The act of hearing attentively. <i>The investigative committee will hold <b>hearings</b> in Chicago.</i>
<b>jingle</b>	(of writing) be full of alliteration or rhymes. <i>He <b>jingled</b> the coins in his purse.</i>
<b>listen</b>	Listen and pay attention. <i>If I ve had a stressful day I love to chill out and <b>listen</b> to music.</i>
<b>loudly</b>	Used as a direction in music to be played relatively loudly. <i>The crowd <b>loudly</b> booed the decision.</i>
<b>noise</b>	Make a lot of noise. <i>Whatever it was he didn t like it and he was going to let them know by making as loud a <b>noise</b> as he could.</i>
<b>phonic</b>	Relating to phonics. <i>The devices of poetry foreground <b>phonic</b> elements that are usually ignored in practical speech.</i>
<b>resound</b>	(of a place) be filled or echo with a sound or sounds. <i>The office <b>resounds</b> with the metronomic clicking of keyboards.</i>
<b>reverberate</b>	Return or re-echo (a sound). <i>The hall <b>reverberated</b> with laughter.</i>
<b>ring</b>	Make bells ring often for the purposes of musical edification. <i>A gas <b>ring</b>.</i>
<b>ringing</b>	The sound of a bell ringing E A Poe. <i>The tintinnabulation that so voluminously swells from the <b>ringing</b> and the dinging of the bells.</i>

<b>sonic</b>	Relating to audible sound. <i>A <b>sonic</b> boom.</i>
<b>sound</b>	Music speech and sound effects when recorded and used to accompany a film video or broadcast. <i>A <b>sound</b> thrashing.</i>
<b>telephone</b>	Contact someone using the telephone. <i>He <b>telephoned</b> his wife at 9 30.</i>
<b>telephony</b>	Transmitting speech at a distance. <i>Mobile <b>telephony</b>.</i>
<b>timbre</b>	The distinctive quality or character of someone or something. <i>Trumpet mutes with different <b>timbres</b>.</i>
<b>tocsin</b>	A bell used to sound an alarm. <i>He used his resignation as a <b>tocsin</b> to warn of the danger of dictatorship.</i>
<b>tonic</b>	Music the first note of a diatonic scale. <i><b>Tonic</b> muscle contraction.</i>
