Associations of "Heard" (30 Words)

aloud	With relatively high volume. <i>He wept aloud.</i>
<u>audible</u>	Heard or perceptible by the ear. <i>Some ultrasound is audible to dogs.</i>
<u>audio</u>	An audible acoustic wave frequency. <i>Audio equipment.</i>
bell	Preceded by a numeral the time as indicated every half hour of a watch by the striking of the ship s bell one to eight times. <i>Saved by the bell.</i>
cackle	A loud laugh suggestive of a hen s cackle. <i>Corporate luminaries cackle on about the importance of quality.</i>
clang	Make or cause to make a clang. <i>Clanging metal.</i>
<u>click</u>	Click repeatedly or uncontrollably. <i>Martha clicked her tongue.</i>
ding	Go ding dong like a bell. <i>Cash registers were dinging softly.</i>
doorbell	A push button at an outer door that gives a ringing or buzzing signal when pushed. <i>Charlotte rang the doorbell.</i>
<u>echo</u>	Ring or echo with sound. <i>A blue suit that echoed the colour of her eyes.</i>
gramophone	An antique record player; the sound of the vibrating needle is amplified acoustically.
<u>hearing</u>	The act of hearing attentively. <i>The court may stay execution pending a hearing.</i>

jingle	A light ringing sound such as that made by metal objects being shaken together. <i>He makes up advertising jingles.</i>
listen	Listen and pay attention. <i>I told her over and over again but she wouldn't listen.</i>
loudly	Used as a direction in music to be played relatively loudly. <i>She spoke loudly and angrily.</i>
noise	Make a lot of noise. <i>He enjoyed the street noises.</i>
phonic	Relating to phonics. <i>The devices of poetry foreground phonic elements that are usually ignored in practical speech.</i>
resound	(of a sound, voice, etc.) fill or echo throughout a place. <i>The hall resounded with laughter.</i>
reverberate	Ring or echo with sound. <i>Her deep booming laugh reverberated around the room.</i>
ring	Ring or echo with sound. <i>An area of Soho had been ringed in red.</i>
ringing	The sound of a bell ringing. <i>A ringing voice.</i>
sonic	(of speed) having or caused by speed approximately equal to that of sound in air at sea level. <i>A sonic wave.</i>
sound	Phonetics an individual sound unit of speech without concern as to whether or not it is a phoneme of some language. <i>The beautiful sound of music.</i>
telephone	An instrument used as part of a telephone system typically a single unit including a handset with a transmitting microphone and a set of numbered buttons by which a connection can be made to another such instrument. <i>It was eight thirty when the telephone rang and I knew it was Chandler.</i>
telephony	The working or use of telephones. <i>Mobile telephony.</i>
timbre	The distinctive quality or character of someone or something. <i>A voice high in pitch but rich in timbre.</i>
tocsin	The sound of an alarm (usually a bell). <i>He used his resignation as a tocsin to warn of the danger of dictatorship.</i>
tonic	Music the first note of a diatonic scale. <i>A tonic reflex.</i>
