ebullient	Joyously unrestrained. <i>She sounded ebullient and happy.</i>
effusive	Relating to the eruption of large volumes of molten rock. <i>Insincere and effusive demonstrations of sentimental friendship.</i>
energetic	Working hard to promote an enterprise. <i>An energetic group of hikers.</i>
enthusiastic	Having or showing intense and eager enjoyment, interest, or approval. <i>An enthusiastic response.</i>
exuberant	Produced or growing in extreme abundance. <i>Exuberant over the top sculptures.</i>
fighting fit	Engaged in or ready for military or naval operations.
filling	(of food) leaving one with a pleasantly satiated feeling. <i>The full English breakfast was delicious and also very filling.</i>
fit	Physically and mentally sound or healthy. <i>My family keep fit by walking and cycling.</i>
fit as a fiddle	Physically and mentally sound or healthy.
fit as a flea	On the point of or strongly disposed.
flourishing	Developing rapidly and successfully; thriving. <i>Flourishing businesses.</i>
full-blooded	Of unmixed ancestry.
generous	More than is usual or necessary. <i>A generous assessment of his work.</i>
genuine	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something. <i>Genuine leather.</i>
hale	(of an old person) strong and healthy. <i>He s only just sixty very hale and hearty.</i>
hale and hearty	Exhibiting or restored to vigorous good health.
hardy	Able to survive under unfavorable weather conditions. <i>Hardy explorers of northern Canada.</i>
healthy	(of a part of the body) not diseased. <i>Plenty of healthy sleep.</i>

heartfelt	Earnest. <i>Our heartfelt thanks.</i>
<u>jovial</u>	Cheerful and friendly. <i>A jovial old gentleman.</i>
large	Fairly large or important in effect influential. <i>Many large investors are likely to take a different view.</i>
lively	(of a place or atmosphere) full of activity and excitement. <i>A lively homeward passage dodging aircraft and E boats.</i>
loud	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>Her voice was too loud.</i>
real	Coinciding with reality. <i>Statistics demonstrate that poverty and unemployment are very real problems.</i>
red-blooded	Endowed with or exhibiting great bodily or mental health.
robust	Sturdy and strong in form, constitution, or construction. <i>A robust body.</i>
<u>satisfying</u>	Providing abundant nourishment. <i>These are very satisfying books.</i>
<u>sincere</u>	Characterized by a firm and humorless belief in the validity of your opinions. <i>Sincere friendship.</i>
sizeable	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>A sizeable apartment.</i>
<u>solid</u>	Of good quality and condition solidly built. <i>Solid blackness.</i>
<u>spirited</u>	Made lively or spirited. <i>A spirited debate.</i>
<u>square</u>	Having the shape or approximate shape of a square. <i>The office was fifteen feet square.</i>
<u>substantial</u>	Providing abundant nourishment. <i>A mere dream neither substantial nor practical.</i>
<u>thorough</u>	Painstakingly careful and accurate. <i>Our accountant is thorough.</i>
<u>total</u>	Constituting the full quantity or extent; complete. <i>A total failure.</i>
true	Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north. <i>I would be true for there are those who trust me.</i>

unfeigned	Genuine; sincere. <i>A broad smile of unfeigned delight.</i>
uninhibited	Expressing one's feelings or thoughts unselfconsciously and without restraint. <i>Fits of uninhibited laughter.</i>
unreserved	Without reservations; complete. <i>Unreserved behavior.</i>
vivacious	Vigorous and animated. <i>A charming and vivacious hostess.</i>
wholehearted	Showing or characterized by complete sincerity and commitment. <i>Wholehearted commitment.</i>

affable	Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i>An affable smile.</i>
amiable	Disposed to please. <i>An amiable gathering.</i>
amity	A cordial disposition. <i>The presence of French troops in Scotland had produced hostility rather than amity.</i>

bray	A sound voice or laugh resembling a bray. <i>The mule uttered its insane bray.</i>
<u>cheerful</u>	Pleasantly (even unrealistically) optimistic. <i>A cheerful greeting.</i>
cordial	Politely warm and friendly. <i>A cordial regard for his visitor s comfort.</i>
crying	Shedding tears. <i>It would be a crying shame to let it all go to waste.</i>
cuddly	Denoting a toy, especially a model of an animal, that is padded or spongy and covered in soft fabric. <i>A cuddly teddybear.</i>
derisive	Expressing contempt or ridicule. <i>He gave a harsh derisive laugh.</i>
extroverted	Not introspective; examining what is outside yourself. <i>She is extroverted confident and gives rousing lectures.</i>
<u>favorable</u>	Presaging or likely to bring good luck. <i>Listened with a favorable ear.</i>
<u>fond</u>	Extravagantly or foolishly loving and indulgent. <i>A fond farewell.</i>
friendly	(of relations) not in conflict. <i>A consumer friendly policy.</i>
<u>genial</u>	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. <i>The genial sunshine.</i>
<u>glad</u>	Causing happiness. <i>Gave a glad shout.</i>
<u>grin</u>	A broad smile. <i>The skull grinned back at him its eye sockets dark and hollow.</i>
happy	Willing to do something. <i>A happy outcome.</i>
hilarity	Great merriment. <i>His incredulous expression was the cause of much hilarity.</i>
hoot	With reference to a car horn siren etc make or cause to make a hoot. <i>There were hoots of derision.</i>
<u>kindly</u>	Showing or motivated by sympathy and understanding and generosity. <i>Never mind she said kindly.</i>
laughter	The sound of laughing. <i>He roared with laughter.</i>

<u>maniacal</u>	Suffering from mania. <i>A maniacal dictator.</i>
mocking	Playfully vexing (especially by ridicule)- Lawrence Durrell. <i>He got jeers and mocking laughter as he addressed the marchers.</i>
smile	Express with a smile. <i>He flashed his most winning smile.</i>
smiling	Smiling with happiness or optimism Lewis Carroll. <i>It s nice to see everyone s smiling faces.</i>
<u>smirk</u>	Smile affectedly or derisively. <i>He smirked in triumph.</i>
<u>snicker</u>	A half-suppressed, typically scornful laugh; a snigger. <i>He could not evoke a snicker with his jokes.</i>
uproarious	Characterized by or provoking loud noise or uproar. <i>Uproarious humour.</i>
warm	An act of warming something or oneself. <i>A warm debate.</i>
<u>wholesome</u>	Sound or exhibiting soundness in body or mind. <i>Wholesome food.</i>
