excitement	Something that arouses a feeling of excitement. <i>His face was flushed with excitement and his hands trembled.</i>
fervour	Feelings of great warmth and intensity. <i>He talked with all the fervour of a new convert.</i>
fixture	The quality of being fixed in place as by some firm attachment. <i>Plumbing fixtures.</i>
game	The equipment for a game especially a board game or a video game. <i>The game is 6 all.</i>
heat energy	The sensation caused by heat energy.
heating	The process of becoming warmer; a rising temperature. <i>We had no heating in our bedrooms.</i>
heating plant	Utility to warm a building.

heating system	The process of becoming warmer; a rising temperature.
high temperature	A lofty level or position or degree.
hotness	The presence of heat. <i>The astronauts are carefully balanced between the cold darkness of space and the burning hotness of the sun.</i>
humidity	Wetness in the atmosphere. <i>The temperature is seventy seven the humidity in the low thirties.</i>
<u>intensity</u>	The quality of being intense. <i>Hydrothermal processes of low intensity.</i>
intensity of feeling	High level or degree; the property of being intense.
match	The score needed to win a match. <i>A boxing match.</i>
meet	A meeting typically one with an illicit purpose. <i>Major meets such as national championships.</i>
meeting	A place where things merge or flow together (especially rivers). <i>He intrigued her on their first meeting.</i>
mugginess	A state of warm humidity.

swelter	An uncomfortably hot atmosphere. <i>The swelter of the afternoon had cooled.</i>
<u>tournament</u>	A series of jousts between knights contesting for a prize. <i>The Royal Tournament.</i>
vehemence	Intensity or forcefulness of expression. <i>The vehemence of his denial.</i>
warmness	A positive feeling of liking. <i>The warmness of his welcome made us feel right at home.</i>

carburetor	Mixes air with gasoline vapor prior to explosion.

dehydration	The loss or removal of water from something. <i>From an inspection of plants undergoing dehydration there was no evidence of root damage.</i>
diesel	German engineer born in France who invented the diesel engine 1858-1913. <i>A diesel locomotive.</i>
distillate	Something formed by distillation. <i>Petroleum distillates.</i>
<u>engine</u>	A fire engine. <i>Medieval engines of war.</i>
<u>fuse</u>	Equip with a fuse provide with a fuse. <i>The storm fused the electric mains.</i>
heatstroke	Collapse caused by exposure to excessive heat.
isotherm	A curve on a diagram joining points representing states of equal temperature.
isothermal	A line connecting points having the same temperature; an isotherm. <i>The cells remained approximately isothermal during freezing.</i>
locomotive	Of or relating to locomotion. <i>Locomotive power.</i>
motor	Relating to motor vehicles. <i>They motored north up the M6.</i>
smelt	Extract a metal from ore by smelting. <i>Coal was used to smelt the steel for the tinsplate.</i>
<u>steam</u>	Clean or otherwise treat with steam. <i>He d steamed the letter open and then resealed it.</i>
stove	Treat an object by heating it in a stove in order to apply a desired surface coating. <i>Dinner was already on the stove.</i>
summer	The warmest season of the year in the northern hemisphere it extends from the summer solstice to the autumnal equinox. <i>The golden summer of her life.</i>
sunstroke	Heatstroke brought about by excessive exposure to the sun.
swelter	Suffer from intense heat. <i>The swelter of the afternoon had cooled.</i>
<u>sweltering</u>	Excessively hot and humid or marked by sweating and faintness. <i>Sweltering athletes.</i>

- thermal** A thermal garment especially underwear.
***Thermal** power stations.*
- thermoelectric** Involving or resulting from thermoelectricity.
- turbine** A machine for producing continuous power in which a wheel or rotor, typically fitted with vanes, is made to revolve by a fast-moving flow of water, steam, gas, air, or other fluid.
- vaporizer** A device that puts out a substance in the form of a vapor (especially for medicinal inhalation).
- warmed** Having been warmed up.

- warmth** The quality, state, or sensation of being warm; moderate heat.
