<b>estrus</b>	Applies to nonhuman mammals: a state or period of heightened sexual arousal and activity.
<b>excitement</b>	Something that arouses a feeling of excitement. <i>His face was flushed with <b>excitement</b> and his hands trembled.</i>
<b>fervour</b>	Feelings of great warmth and intensity. <i>He talked with all the <b>fervour</b> of a new convert.</i>
<b>fixture</b>	The quality of being fixed in place as by some firm attachment. <i>Plumbing <b>fixtures</b>.</i>
<b>game</b>	The equipment for a game especially a board game or a video game. <i>The <b>game</b> is 6 all.</i>

<b>heating</b>	The process of becoming warmer; a rising temperature. <i>We had no <b>heating</b> in our bedrooms.</i>
<b>heating plant</b>	Utility to warm a building.

<b>heating system</b>	The process of becoming warmer; a rising temperature.
<b>high temperature</b>	A lofty level or position or degree. The presence of heat.
<b>hotness</b>	<i>The astronauts are carefully balanced between the cold darkness of space and the burning <b>hotness</b> of the sun.</i>
<b>humidity</b>	Wetness in the atmosphere. <i>The temperature is seventy seven the <b>humidity</b> in the low thirties.</i>
<b><u>intensity</u></b>	The quality of being intense. <i>Hydrothermal processes of low <b>intensity</b>.</i>
<b>intensity of feeling</b>	High level or degree; the property of being intense.
<b>match</b>	The score needed to win a match. <i>A boxing <b>match</b>.</i>
<b>meet</b>	A meeting typically one with an illicit purpose. <i>Major <b>meets</b> such as national championships.</i>

<b>diesel</b>	German engineer born in France who invented the diesel engine 1858-1913. <i>A <b>diesel</b> locomotive.</i>
<b>distillate</b>	Something formed by distillation. <i>Petroleum <b>distillates</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>engine</u></a>	A fire engine. <i>Medieval <b>engines</b> of war.</i>
<a href="#"><u>fuse</u></a>	Equip with a fuse provide with a fuse. <i>The storm <b>fused</b> the electric mains.</i>
<b>heatstroke</b>	Collapse caused by exposure to excessive heat.
<b>isotherm</b>	A curve on a diagram joining points representing states of equal temperature.
<b>isothermal</b>	A line connecting points having the same temperature; an isotherm. <i>The cells remained approximately <b>isothermal</b> during freezing.</i>
<b>locomotive</b>	Of or relating to locomotion. <i><b>Locomotive</b> power.</i>
<b>motor</b>	Relating to motor vehicles. <i>They <b>motored</b> north up the M6.</i>
<b>smelt</b>	Extract a metal from ore by smelting. <i>Coal was used to <b>smelt</b> the steel for the tinsplate.</i>
<a href="#"><u>steam</u></a>	Clean or otherwise treat with steam. <i>He d <b>steamed</b> the letter open and then resealed it.</i>
<b>stove</b>	Treat an object by heating it in a stove in order to apply a desired surface coating. <i>Dinner was already on the <b>stove</b>.</i>
<b>summer</b>	The warmest season of the year in the northern hemisphere it extends from the summer solstice to the autumnal equinox. <i>The golden <b>summer</b> of her life.</i>
<b>sunstroke</b>	Heatstroke brought about by excessive exposure to the sun.
<b>swelter</b>	Suffer from intense heat. <i>The <b>swelter</b> of the afternoon had cooled.</i>
<a href="#"><u>sweltering</u></a>	Excessively hot and humid or marked by sweating and faintness. <i><b>Sweltering</b> athletes.</i>

- thermoelectric** Involving or resulting from thermoelectricity.
- turbine** A machine for producing continuous power in which a wheel or rotor, typically fitted with vanes, is made to revolve by a fast-moving flow of water, steam, gas, air, or other fluid.
- vaporizer** A device that puts out a substance in the form of a vapor (especially for medicinal inhalation).
