Synonyms of "Heated" as an adjective (18 Words)

animated	Having life or vigor or spirit. <i>An animated conversation.</i>
excited	Very enthusiastic and eager. <i>The excited atom returns to its former energy state and emits light or other radiation.</i>
fervid	Extremely hot- Nathaniel Hawthorne- Frances Trollope. <i>His fervid protestations of love.</i>
fiery	Having a passionate and quick-tempered nature. <i>The car was painted a fiery red.</i>
heated up	Marked by emotional heat; vehement.
het	Heterosexual. <i>He was all het up and sweaty.</i>
het up	In readiness.

<u>impassioned</u>	Characterized by intense emotion. An <i>impassioned</i> appeal.
<u>inflamed</u>	(of a part of the body) red or swollen as a result of inflammation. The <i>inflamed</i> clouds at sunset.
intense	Extremely sharp or intense. A burning and <i>intense</i> look.
keyed up	Serving as an essential component.
lively	Full of spirit. A <i>lively</i> gait.
passionate	Having, showing, or caused by strong feelings or beliefs. He s <i>passionate</i> about football.
<u>spirited</u>	Made lively or spirited. A <i>spirited</i> campaigner for women s rights.
<u>vehement</u>	Characterized by great force or energy. <i>Vehement</i> deluges of rain.
warmed up	Having been warmed up.
worked up	Open.
wound up	Put in a coil.



Usage Examples of "Heated" as an adjective

- *A heated swimming pool.*
- *Wiped his heated-up face with a large bandana.*
- *A heated argument.*
- *She had a heated argument with an official.*



Associations of "Heated" (30 Words)

argue	Have an argument about something. <i>It stands to reason she argued.</i>
<u>argument</u>	An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function F are x and the value is y . <i>They were involved in a violent argument.</i>
bicker	Argue about petty and trivial matters. <i>Couples who bicker over who gets what from the divorce.</i>
cloture	Terminate debate by calling for a vote. <i>A cloture motion.</i>
<u>contention</u>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>The teams were in fierce contention for first place.</i>
contentiousness	An inclination to be quarrelsome and contentious.

contributor	Someone who contributes (or promises to contribute) a sum of money. <i>Hunt was the largest contributor of hymns to these collections.</i>
<u>controversial</u>	Giving rise or likely to give rise to controversy or public disagreement. <i>A controversial decision on affirmative action.</i>
<u>controversy</u>	Prolonged public disagreement or heated discussion. <i>The announcement ended a protracted controversy.</i>
debate	An argument about a particular subject, especially one in which many people are involved. <i>Members of the society debated for five nights.</i>
<u>dialogue</u>	Provide a film or play with a dialogue. <i>Passages of dialogue.</i>
discussion	An extended communication (often interactive) dealing with some particular topic. <i>The book contains an excellent discussion of modal logic.</i>
disputable	Capable of being disproved. <i>Whether it can be described as art criticism may be disputable.</i>
elocution	A particular style of speaking. <i>Lessons in singing and elocution.</i>
<u>enthuse</u>	Make (someone) interested and eagerly appreciative. <i>They both enthused over my new look.</i>
<u>fervent</u>	Having or displaying a passionate intensity. <i>A fervent desire to change society.</i>
fever	A state of nervous excitement or agitation. <i>Quinine was used to reduce malarial fever.</i>
forum	A public facility to meet for open discussion. <i>We hope these pages act as a forum for debate.</i>
hassel	Norwegian chemist noted for his research on organic molecules (1897-1981).
importune	Approach (someone) to request or offer sexual services, especially as a prostitute. <i>The girl is charged with loitering in a public place with intent to solicit or importune another person.</i>
intensely	In an intense manner. <i>The fire was burning intensely.</i>
interlocutor	A person who takes part in a conversation.
lash	An eyelash. <i>Lash the horse.</i>

logician	An expert in or student of logic. <i>A leading mathematical logician.</i>
panel	Decorate with panels. <i>An interview panel.</i>
passion	Something that is desired intensely. <i>Their all consuming passion for each other.</i>
strap	Secure a sprained joint with a strap. <i>The goalkeeper s knee was strapped up.</i>
vigorously	In a way that involves physical strength, effort, or energy; strenuously. <i>He vigorously denied the allegation.</i>
violently	In a violent manner. <i>The aircraft began violently shaking.</i>
whip	Thrash about flexibly in the manner of a whiplash. <i>The whip raised a red welt.</i>
