
## Hectic as an Adjective

#### Definitions of "Hectic" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "hectic" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Marked by intense agitation or emotion.
- Full of incessant or frantic activity.
- Relating to or affected by a regularly recurrent fever typically accompanying tuberculosis, with flushed cheeks and hot, dry skin.





### Synonyms of "Hectic" as an adjective (9 Words)

fast and furious At a rapid tempo.

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<u>feverish</u>	Having or showing the symptoms of a fever. She felt sick and <b>feverish</b> .
<u>frantic</u>	Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion. <i>Frantic</i> attempts to resuscitate the girl.
frenetic	Fast and energetic in a rather wild and uncontrolled way. <i>Frenetic</i> screams followed the accident.
frenzied	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason- H.W.Carter. A <b>frenzied</b> mob.
manic	Showing wild, apparently deranged, excitement and energy. <i>Manic patients.</i>
<u>restless</u>	Ceaselessly in motion. The audience grew <b>restless</b> and inattentive.



very active	Precisely as stated.
very busy	Being the exact same one; not any other.

# Associations of "Hectic" (30 Words)

<u>bore</u>	A gun of a specified bore. His eyes <b>bore</b> d into hers.
<u>busy</u>	Unavailable for use by anyone else or indicating unavailability engaged is a British term for a busy telephone line. <i>A <b>busy</b> street.</i>
crazy	Foolish; totally unsound. Had a <b>crazy</b> dream.
<u>daily</u>	Every day; without missing a day. Boats can be hired for a <b>daily</b> rate.
<u>date</u>	Mark with a date. Mother s Day is always on the same <b>date</b> .
delirium	State of violent mental agitation. She had fits of <b>delirium</b> .



<u>dizzy</u>	Make dizzy or giddy. A <b>dizzy</b> ing pace.
drowsiness	A feeling of being sleepy and lethargic; sleepiness. <i>This drug can cause <b>drowsiness</b>.</i>
exhausted	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. She returned home <b>exhausted</b> from work.
fatigue	(always used with a modifier) boredom resulting from overexposure to something. <i>The nails have become rusted through or</i> <b>fatigue</b> d.
<u>feverish</u>	Having or affected by a fever. Worked at a <b>feverish</b> pace.
<u>frantic</u>	Conducted in a hurried, excited, and disorganized way. <i>Frantic</i> attempts to resuscitate the girl.
frenetic	Fast and energetic in a rather wild and uncontrolled way. A <b>frenetic</b> pace of activity.
frenzied	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason. A <b>frenzied</b> look in his eye.
<u>frenzy</u>	A state or period of uncontrolled excitement or wild behaviour. Doreen worked herself into a <b>frenzy</b> of rage.
hurry	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. <i>We d better <b>hurry</b>.</i>
<u>impatience</u>	A dislike of anything that causes delay. She crumpled up the pages in a burst of <b>impatience</b> .
<u>insane</u>	(of an action or quality) characterized or caused by madness. <i>She had an <b>insane</b> desire to giggle.</i>
<u>lackluster</u>	Lacking luster or shine. <i>Staring with <b>lackluster</b> eyes.</i>
5	The treatment or control of diseases or disorders, or the care of patients who suffer them. <i>He alleges that staff have been victims of</i> <b>management</b> <i>bullying.</i>
mania	An excessive enthusiasm or desire; an obsession. Many people suffering from <b>mania</b> do not think anything is wrong.
manic	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason. <i>The pace is utterly <b>manic</b></i> .
<u>rabid</u>	Marked by excessive enthusiasm for and intense devotion to a cause or idea. <i>She s expecting more rabid support from the home fans.</i>



raving	In a raving manner. Have you gone <b>raving</b> mad.
rushing	The action of gaining yardage or scoring a touchdown or conversion by running from scrimmage with the ball. He seems so calm amid all the <b>rushing</b> people.
<u>schedule</u>	Make a schedule plan the time and place for events. I ve <b>schedule</b> d a concert next week.
somnolence	A very sleepy state.
<u>weary</u>	Cause to become tired. She was <b>weary</b> of their constant arguments.
wild	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. A <b>wild</b> stretch of land.
<u>workload</u>	Work that a person is expected to do in a specified time. <i>He had been given three deputies to ease his</i> <b>workload</b> .
