### **Definitions of "Hectic" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “hectic” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Marked by intense agitation or emotion.*
- *Full of incessant or frantic activity.*
- *Relating to or affected by a regularly recurrent fever typically accompanying tuberculosis, with flushed cheeks and hot, dry skin.*



## Synonyms of "Hectic" as an adjective (9 Words)

**fast and furious** At a rapid tempo.

**feverish** Having or showing the symptoms of a fever.  
*She felt sick and **feverish**.*

**frantic** Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion.  
***Frantic** attempts to resuscitate the girl.*

**frenetic** Fast and energetic in a rather wild and uncontrolled way.  
***Frenetic** screams followed the accident.*

**frenzied** Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason-  
H.W.Carter.  
*A **frenzied** mob.*

**manic** Showing wild, apparently deranged, excitement and energy.  
***Manic** patients.*

**restless** Ceaselessly in motion.  
*The audience grew **restless** and inattentive.*

**very active**

Precisely as stated.

**very busy**

Being the exact same one; not any other.

**bore**

A gun of a specified bore.  
*His eyes **bored** into hers.*

**busy**

Unavailable for use by anyone else or indicating unavailability engaged is a British term for a busy telephone line.  
*A **busy** street.*

**crazy**

Foolish; totally unsound.  
*Had a **crazy** dream.*

**daily**

Every day; without missing a day.  
*Boats can be hired for a **daily** rate.*

**date**

Mark with a date.  
*Mother s Day is always on the same **date**.*

**delirium**

State of violent mental agitation.  
*She had fits of **delirium**.*

<b>dizzy</b>	Make dizzy or giddy. <i>A <b>dizzying</b> pace.</i>
<b>drowsiness</b>	A feeling of being sleepy and lethargic; sleepiness. <i>This drug can cause <b>drowsiness</b>.</i>
<b>exhausted</b>	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>She returned home <b>exhausted</b> from work.</i>
<b>fatigue</b>	(always used with a modifier) boredom resulting from overexposure to something. <i>The nails have become rusted through or <b>fatigued</b>.</i>
<b>feverish</b>	Having or affected by a fever. <i>Worked at a <b>feverish</b> pace.</i>
<b>frantic</b>	Conducted in a hurried, excited, and disorganized way. <i><b>Frantic</b> attempts to resuscitate the girl.</i>
<b>frenetic</b>	Fast and energetic in a rather wild and uncontrolled way. <i>A <b>frenetic</b> pace of activity.</i>
<b>frenzied</b>	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason. <i>A <b>frenzied</b> look in his eye.</i>
<b>frenzy</b>	A state or period of uncontrolled excitement or wild behaviour. <i>Doreen worked herself into a <b>frenzy</b> of rage.</i>
<b>hurry</b>	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. <i>We d better <b>hurry</b>.</i>
<b>impatience</b>	A dislike of anything that causes delay. <i>She crumpled up the pages in a burst of <b>impatience</b>.</i>
<b>insane</b>	(of an action or quality) characterized or caused by madness. <i>She had an <b>insane</b> desire to giggle.</i>
<b>lackluster</b>	Lacking luster or shine. <i>Staring with <b>lackluster</b> eyes.</i>
<b>management</b>	The treatment or control of diseases or disorders, or the care of patients who suffer them. <i>He alleges that staff have been victims of <b>management</b> bullying.</i>
<b>mania</b>	An excessive enthusiasm or desire; an obsession. <i>Many people suffering from <b>mania</b> do not think anything is wrong.</i>
<b>manic</b>	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason. <i>The pace is utterly <b>manic</b>.</i>
<b>rabid</b>	Marked by excessive enthusiasm for and intense devotion to a cause or idea. <i>She s expecting more <b>rabid</b> support from the home fans.</i>

<b>raving</b>	In a raving manner. <i>Have you gone <b>raving</b> mad.</i>
<b>rushing</b>	The action of gaining yardage or scoring a touchdown or conversion by running from scrimmage with the ball. <i>He seems so calm amid all the <b>rushing</b> people.</i>
<u><a href="#">schedule</a></u>	Make a schedule plan the time and place for events. <i>I ve <b>scheduled</b> a concert next week.</i>
<b>somnolence</b>	A very sleepy state.
<u><a href="#">weary</a></u>	Cause to become tired. <i>She was <b>weary</b> of their constant arguments.</i>
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>A <b>wild</b> stretch of land.</i>
<u><a href="#">workload</a></u>	Work that a person is expected to do in a specified time. <i>He had been given three deputies to ease his <b>workload</b>.</i>
