### Definitions of "Hegemony" as a noun

- *The dominance or leadership of one social group or nation over others.*
- *Leadership or dominance, especially by one state or social group over others.*

### Synonyms of "Hegemony" as a noun (14 Words)

<b>ascendancy</b>	The state that exists when one person or group has power over another. <i>The <b>ascendancy</b> of good over evil.</i>
<b>authority</b>	Official permission or approval. <i>He is an <b>authority</b> on corporate law.</i>
<b>control</b>	The activity of managing or exerting control over something. <i>Growing <b>controls</b> on local spending.</i>
<b><u>dominance</u></b>	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. <i>All had in conformity with the principle of <b>dominance</b> round seeds with yellow cotyledons.</i>

<b>dominion</b>	The territory of a sovereign or government. <i>The Angevin <b>dominions</b>.</i>
<b>leadership</b>	The status of a leader. <i>They challenged his <b>leadership</b> of the union.</i>
<b>mastery</b>	Power to dominate or defeat. <i><b>Mastery</b> of the seas.</i>
<b>power</b>	A state powerful enough to influence events throughout the world. <i>He was a <b>power</b> in the university.</i>
<b>predominance</b>	The quality of being more noticeable than anything else. <i>Hollywood's continued <b>predominance</b> in the international film market.</i>
<b>primacy</b>	The office, period of office, or authority of a primate of the Church. <i>The first years of his <b>primacy</b> were tranquil.</i>
<b>rule</b>	A rule or law concerning a natural phenomenon or the function of a complex system. <i>Violence is the <b>rule</b> not the exception.</i>
<b>sovereignty</b>	The authority of a state to govern itself or another state. <i>National <b>sovereignty</b>.</i>
<b>supremacy</b>	The state or condition of being superior to all others in authority, power, or status. <i>The <b>supremacy</b> of the king.</i>
<b>sway</b>	Pitching dangerously to one side. <i>The country was under the <b>sway</b> of rival warlords.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Hegemony" as a noun

- *Germany was united under Prussian hegemony after 1871.*
- *The consolidation of the United States' hegemony over a new international economic system.*
- *To say they have priority is not to say they have complete hegemony.*
- *The hegemony of a single member state is not incompatible with a genuine confederation.*

## Associations of "Hegemony" (30 Words)

<b>administrate</b>	Work in an administrative capacity; supervise or be in charge of. <i>The person administrating the database system has left the company.</i>
<b>ascendant</b>	Most powerful or important or influential. <i>That idea was in the <b>ascendant</b>.</i>

<b>authority</b>	A person or organization having political or administrative power and control. <i>He had absolute <b>authority</b> over his subordinates.</i>
<a href="#"><u>autocracy</u></a>	A political theory favoring unlimited authority by a single individual. <i>The Grand Duchy of Tuscany was an <b>autocracy</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>checkpoint</u></a>	A place (as at a frontier) where travellers are stopped for inspection and clearance.
<b>control</b>	The activity of managing or exerting control over something. <i><b>Control</b> the lever.</i>
<b>dictatorship</b>	A country governed by a dictator. <i>The effects of forty years of <b>dictatorship</b>.</i>
<b>disinformation</b>	Misinformation that is deliberately disseminated in order to influence or confuse rivals (foreign enemies or business competitors etc). <i>The entire Western intelligence system had been systematically manipulated with clever <b>disinformation</b>.</i>
<b>domineer</b>	Rule or exercise power over (somebody) in a cruel and autocratic manner. <i>She doesn't <b>domineer</b> preferring to lead by inspiration rather than by intimidation.</i>
<b>govern</b>	Conduct oneself, especially with regard to controlling one's emotions. <i>The future of Jamaica will be <b>governed</b> by geography not history.</i>
<b>manage</b>	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. <i>She <b>manages</b> horses better than anyone I know.</i>
<b>marketing</b>	The action or business of promoting and selling products or services, including market research and advertising. <i>The Western arts of <b>marketing</b> and distribution.</i>
<a href="#"><u>mastery</u></a>	The act of mastering or subordinating someone. <i>She played with some <b>mastery</b>.</i>
<b>mendacious</b>	Not telling the truth; lying. <i>A <b>mendacious</b> statement.</i>
<a href="#"><u>mercenary</u></a>	A professional soldier hired to serve in a foreign army. <i><b>Mercenary</b> killers.</i>
<a href="#"><u>military</u></a>	The military forces of a nation. <i>The <b>military</b> machine is the same one we faced in 1991 but now it is weaker.</i>

<b><u>misinformation</u></b>	False or inaccurate information, especially that which is deliberately intended to deceive. <i>Nuclear matters are often entangled in a web of secrecy and <b>misinformation</b>.</i>
<b>officer</b>	Provide with military officers. <i>He is an <b>officer</b> of the court.</i>
<b><u>overlord</u></b>	A ruler, especially a feudal lord. <i>The undisputed <b>overlord</b> of the crime family.</i>
<b>personnel</b>	The department responsible for hiring and training and placing employees and for setting policies for personnel management. <i>Many of the <b>personnel</b> involved require training.</i>
<b>proficiency</b>	The quality of having great facility and competence. <i>Practice greatly improves <b>proficiency</b>.</i>
<b><u>propaganda</u></b>	The dissemination of propaganda as a political strategy. <i>The party's leaders believed that a long period of education and <b>propaganda</b> would be necessary.</i>
<b>reign</b>	The period during which a monarch is sovereign. <i>She was hoping for a long <b>reign</b> as world champion.</i>
<b><u>repression</u></b>	A state of forcible subjugation. <i>Students sparked off events that ended in brutal <b>repression</b>.</i>
<b><u>ruler</u></b>	Measuring stick consisting of a strip of wood or metal or plastic with a straight edge that is used for drawing straight lines and measuring lengths.
<b>superintendence</b>	Management by overseeing the performance or operation of a person or group. <i>Under his vigilant <b>superintendence</b> a building was erected.</i>
<b><u>supremacy</u></b>	The state or condition of being superior to all others in authority, power, or status. <i>The <b>supremacy</b> of the king.</i>
<b><u>theocracy</u></b>	A political unit governed by a deity (or by officials thought to be divinely guided). <i>It is a society just emerging from <b>theocracy</b>.</i>
