- *Something that has been in a family for generations.*
- *Denoting a traditional variety of plant or breed of animal which is not associated with large-scale commercial agriculture.*
- *Any property that is considered by law or custom as inseparable from an inheritance is inherited with that inheritance.*
- *(law) any property that is considered by law or custom as inseparable from an inheritance is inherited with that inheritance.*
- *A valuable object that has belonged to a family for several generations.*

- heritage** Valued objects and qualities such as historic buildings and cultural traditions that have been passed down from previous generations.

- patrimony** Property inherited from one's father or male ancestor.  
***Patrimony** laws.*
- provision** Supplies of food, drink, or equipment, especially for a journey.  
*Changing levels of transport **provision**.*
- settlement** The action of allowing or helping people to establish settlements.  
*Most suppliers will offer early **settlement** discounts.*

<b>chain</b>	Fasten or secure with a chain. <i>The action would initiate a <b>chain</b> of events.</i>
<b>diamond</b>	A transparent piece of diamond that has been cut and polished and is valued as a precious gem. <i>She led a losing <b>diamond</b>.</i>
<b>expensive</b>	Costing a lot of money. <i>An <b>expensive</b> bottle of wine.</i>
<b>gem</b>	Decorate with or as with gems. <i>A pagoda embellished with precious <b>gems</b>.</i>
<b>gemstone</b>	A precious or semi-precious stone, especially one cut, polished, and used in a piece of jewellery.
<b>golden</b>	Made or consisting of gold. <i>The <b>golden</b> calf.</i>
<b>inestimable</b>	Beyond calculation or measure. <i>Jewels of <b>inestimable</b> value.</i>
<b>invaluable</b>	Extremely useful; indispensable. <i>An <b>invaluable</b> source of information.</i>
<b>jade</b>	An ornament made of jade. <i>A silk blouse in a vivid <b>jade</b> green.</i>
<b>jewel</b>	An ornament or piece of jewellery containing a precious stone or stones. <i>She loved dressing up in her <b>jewels</b>.</i>
<b>jewellery</b>	Personal ornaments, such as necklaces, rings, or bracelets, that are typically made from or contain jewels and precious metal. <i>She had silver hair and chunky gold <b>jewellery</b>.</i>
<b>jewelry</b>	An adornment (as a bracelet or ring or necklace) made of precious metals and set with gems (or imitation gems).
<b>luxuriously</b>	In an indulgently luxurious manner.
<b>medallion</b>	An emblem indicating that a taxicab is registered. <i><b>Medallions</b> of veal.</i>
<b>nephrite</b>	A hard, pale green or white mineral which is one of the forms of jade. It is a silicate of calcium and magnesium.
<b>precious</b>	Used for emphasis, often in an ironic context. <i>Don't be frightened my <b>precious</b>.</i>

<b>priceless</b>	So precious that its value cannot be determined. <i><b>Priceless</b> works of art.</i>
<b>rhinestone</b>	An imitation diamond, used in cheap jewellery and to decorate clothes. <i><b>Rhinestone</b> earrings.</i>
<b>ring</b>	Attach a ring to the foot of in order to identify. <i>The distinctive <b>ring</b> of the church bell.</i>
<b>silver</b>	Made of or coloured like silver. <i>Alexia remained a young woman even as her hair <b>silvered</b>.</i>
<b>successor</b>	A thing or person that immediately replaces something or someone. <i>Schoenberg saw himself as a natural <b>successor</b> to the German romantic school.</i>
<b>treasure</b>	A very valuable object. <i>The trunk held all her meager <b>treasures</b>.</i>
<b>valuable</b>	Extremely useful or important. <i>A <b>valuable</b> antique.</i>
<b>valued</b>	Having value of a specified kind. <i>Triple <b>valued</b>.</i>
<b>worthy</b>	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>A <b>worthy</b> fellow.</i>
