Definitions of "Henceforth" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “henceforth” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *From this or that time on.*
- *From this time forth; from now on.*

Synonyms of "Henceforth" as an adverb (7 Words)

after this	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time.
as of now	To the same degree (often followed by `as.
from now on	Indicates a change of subject or activity.
hence	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion hence adv from this place. <i>Many vehicle journeys and hence a lot of pollution would be saved.</i>
henceforward	From this time forth; from now on.
in the future	To or toward the inside of.
subsequently	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. <i>The officer decided to stop and subsequently made an arrest.</i>

Usage Examples of "Henceforth" as an adverb

- *Henceforth she will be known as Mrs. Smith.*
- *Henceforth, parties which fail to get 5% of the vote will not be represented in parliament.*

after	At a later or future time afterwards. <i>Two hours after that.</i>
ahead	Ahead of time in anticipation. <i>When you pay ahead or in advance you receive a discount.</i>
antecedence	Preceding in time.
antecedent	Denoting or counting as an antecedent. <i>Phrenology was an antecedent of modern neuroscience.</i>
anterior	A tooth situated at the front of the mouth. <i>The veins anterior to the heart.</i>
before	In front of someone or something. <i>They began trotting through the city with guards running before and behind.</i>
extremity	The degree to which something is extreme. <i>The extremity of despair.</i>
forego	Lose (s.th.) or lose the right to (s.th.) by some error, offense, or crime.
forever	Continually. <i>They are forever on the move.</i>
former	Of or occurring in the past. <i>I take the former view.</i>
formerly	In the past; in earlier times. <i>The building formerly housed the National Assembly.</i>
forward	The person who plays the position of forward in certain games such as basketball soccer or hockey. <i>An alarmingly forward yet painfully vulnerable child.</i>
front	Stand face to face with confront. <i>The CIA identified the company as a front for a terrorist group.</i>

medial	(of a vowel) pronounced in the middle of the mouth; central. <i>A medial consonant.</i>
onwards	In a forward direction.
past	A past tense or form of a verb. <i>The band has changed over the past twelve months.</i>
permanence	The state or quality of lasting or remaining unchanged indefinitely. <i>The clarity and permanence of the dyes.</i>
permanency	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration.
<u>precede</u>	Come before. <i>Most English adjectives precede the noun they modify.</i>
precedence	The condition of being considered more important than someone or something else; priority in importance, order, or rank. <i>His desire for power soon took precedence over any other consideration.</i>
<u>preceding</u>	Coming before something in order, position, or time. <i>The preceding pages.</i>
predate	Prey on or hunt for. <i>Here parish boundaries seem clearly to predate Roman roads.</i>
prefatory	Serving as an introduction or preface. <i>In his prefatory remarks the author claims that.</i>
prematurely	Before the end of the normal period of gestation. <i>Prematurely grey hair.</i>
previous	Previous convictions a criminal record. <i>The previous occupant of the White House.</i>
previously	At an earlier time or formerly. <i>A previously unquestioned attitude.</i>
<u>priority</u>	The fact or condition of being regarded or treated as more important than others. <i>National independence takes priority over class struggle.</i>
sometime	At one time; formerly. <i>The sometime editor of the paper.</i>
ventral	Toward or on or near the belly (front of a primate or lower surface of a lower animal). <i>The ventral aspect of the human body.</i>
