## Henceforth as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Henceforth" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “henceforth” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *From this or that time on.*
- *From this time forth; from now on.*

### Synonyms of "Henceforth" as an adverb (7 Words)

<b>after this</b>	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time.
<b>as of now</b>	To the same degree (often followed by `as.
<b>from now on</b>	Indicates a change of subject or activity.
<b><a href="#">hence</a></b>	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion hence adv from this place. <i>Many vehicle journeys and <b>hence</b> a lot of pollution would be saved.</i>
<b>henceforward</b>	From this time forth; from now on.
<b>in the future</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>subsequently</b>	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. <i>The officer decided to stop and <b>subsequently</b> made an arrest.</i>

- *Henceforth she will be known as Mrs. Smith.*
- *Henceforth, parties which fail to get 5% of the vote will not be represented in parliament.*

<b>above</b>	(in writing) at an earlier place. <i>Since writing the <b>above</b> I have reconsidered.</i>
<b>after</b>	At a later or future time afterwards. <i>Two hours <b>after</b> that.</i>
<u><b>ahead</b></u>	Ahead of time in anticipation. <i>When you pay <b>ahead</b> or in advance you receive a discount.</i>
<b>antecedence</b>	Preceding in time.
<u><b>antecedent</b></u>	Denoting or counting as an antecedent. <i>Phrenology was an <b>antecedent</b> of modern neuroscience.</i>
<b>anterior</b>	A tooth situated at the front of the mouth. <i>The veins <b>anterior</b> to the heart.</i>
<b>before</b>	In front of someone or something. <i>They began trotting through the city with guards running <b>before</b> and behind.</i>
<b>extremity</b>	The degree to which something is extreme. <i>The <b>extremity</b> of despair.</i>
<u><b>forego</b></u>	Lose (s.th.) or lose the right to (s.th.) by some error, offense, or crime.
<u><b>forever</b></u>	Continually. <i>They are <b>forever</b> on the move.</i>
<u><b>former</b></u>	Of or occurring in the past. <i>I take the <b>former</b> view.</i>
<b>formerly</b>	In the past; in earlier times. <i>The building <b>formerly</b> housed the National Assembly.</i>
<u><b>forward</b></u>	The person who plays the position of forward in certain games such as basketball soccer or hockey. <i>An alarmingly <b>forward</b> yet painfully vulnerable child.</i>
<u><b>front</b></u>	Stand face to face with confront. <i>The CIA identified the company as a <b>front</b> for a terrorist group.</i>

<b>medial</b>	(of a vowel) pronounced in the middle of the mouth; central. <i>A <b>medial</b> consonant.</i>
<b>onwards</b>	In a forward direction.
<b>past</b>	A past tense or form of a verb. <i>The band has changed over the <b>past</b> twelve months.</i>
<b>permanence</b>	The state or quality of lasting or remaining unchanged indefinitely. <i>The clarity and <b>permanence</b> of the dyes.</i>
<b>permanency</b>	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration.
<b>precede</b>	Come before. <i>Most English adjectives <b>precede</b> the noun they modify.</i>
<b>precedence</b>	The condition of being considered more important than someone or something else; priority in importance, order, or rank. <i>His desire for power soon took <b>precedence</b> over any other consideration.</i>
<b>preceding</b>	Coming before something in order, position, or time. <i>The <b>preceding</b> pages.</i>
<b>predate</b>	Prey on or hunt for. <i>Here parish boundaries seem clearly to <b>predate</b> Roman roads.</i>
<b>prefatory</b>	Serving as an introduction or preface. <i>In his <b>prefatory</b> remarks the author claims that.</i>
<b>prematurely</b>	Before the end of the normal period of gestation. <i><b>Prematurely</b> grey hair.</i>
<b>previous</b>	Previous convictions a criminal record. <i>The <b>previous</b> occupant of the White House.</i>
<b>previously</b>	At an earlier time or formerly. <i>A <b>previously</b> unquestioned attitude.</i>
<b>priority</b>	The fact or condition of being regarded or treated as more important than others. <i>National independence takes <b>priority</b> over class struggle.</i>
<b>sometime</b>	At one time; formerly. <i>The <b>sometime</b> editor of the paper.</i>
<b>ventral</b>	Toward or on or near the belly (front of a primate or lower surface of a lower animal). <i>The <b>ventral</b> aspect of the human body.</i>
