According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "here" as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Used to refer to existence in the world in general.*
- *At this time; now.*
- *Used to draw attention to someone or something that has just arrived.*
- *To this place (especially toward the speaker).*
- *Used when indicating a time, point, or situation that has arrived or is happening.*
- *Used to indicate one's role in a particular situation.*
- *Used when gesturing to indicate the place intended.*
- *In or at this place; where the speaker or writer is.*



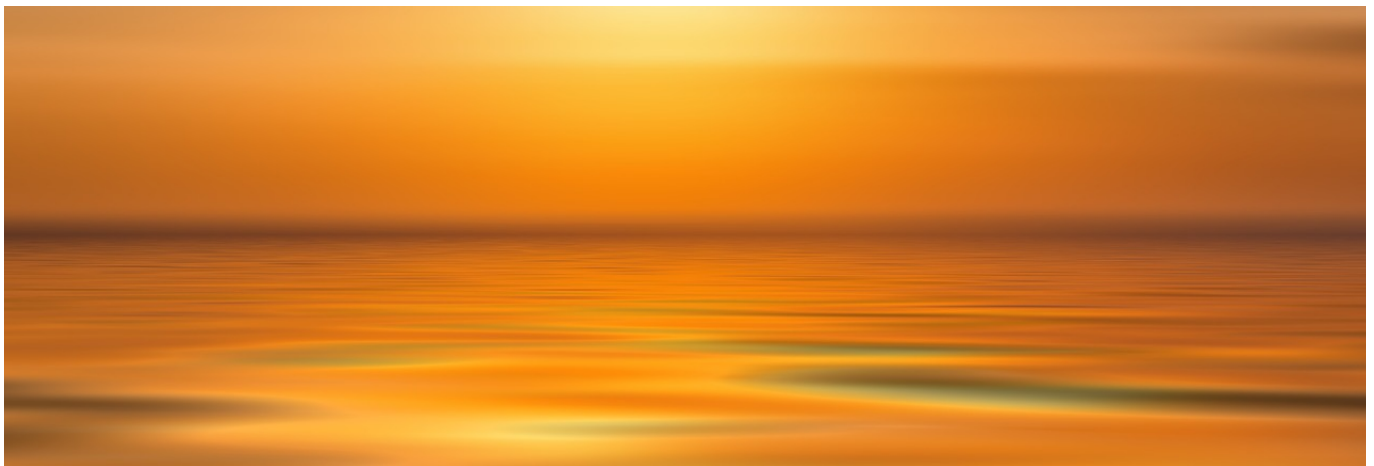
- *Used when introducing something or someone.*
- *In, at, or to this place or position.*
- *Used when giving something to someone.*
- *In this circumstance or respect or on this point or detail.*



## Synonyms of "Here" as an adverb (11 Words)

<b>close</b>	Very near to someone or something; with very little space between. <i>The bullet didn't come <b>close</b>.</i>
<b>closer</b>	(comparative of `near' or `close') within a shorter distance. <i>Come <b>closer</b> my dear.</i>
<b>hither</b>	To or towards this place. <i>I little knew then that such calamity would summon me <b>hither</b>.</i>
<b>in this location</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in this place</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in this spot</b>	To or toward the inside of.

<b>near</b>	At or to a short distance away nearby. <i>Don't shoot until they come <b>near</b>.</i>
<b>nearer</b>	Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>They drew <b>nearer</b>.</i>
<b>now</b>	Under the present circumstances; as a result of something that has recently happened. <i>Where are you living <b>now</b>.</i>
<b>over here</b>	Beyond the top or upper surface or edge; forward from an upright position.
<b>to here</b>	At this time; now.

<b>existence</b>	All that exists. <i>A person may be reaping the consequences of evil deeds sown in previous <b>existences</b>.</i>
<b>existing</b>	Existing in something specified. <i>The <b>existing</b> system.</i>
<b>extant</b>	Still in existence; not extinct or destroyed or lost. <i><b>Extant</b> manuscripts.</i>
<b>happen</b>	Happen occur or be the case in the course of events or by chance. <i>Two hours had passed and still nothing had <b>happened</b>.</i>
<b>heretofore</b>	Before now. <i>Diseases that <b>heretofore</b> were usually confined to rural areas.</i>
<b>hitherto</b>	Used in negative statement to describe a situation that has existed up to this point or up to the present time. <i><b>Hitherto</b> part of French West Africa Benin achieved independence in 1960.</i>
<b>live</b>	Inhabit or live in be an inhabitant of. <i>Tossed a <b>live</b> cigarette out the window.</i>
<b>location</b>	A position or address in computer memory. <i>The <b>location</b> of new housing beyond the existing built up areas.</i>
<b>meet</b>	Fill or meet a want or need. <i>The <b>meet</b> with Frank is on for 10 o clock.</i>
<b>now</b>	Fashionable or up to date. <i>If we leave <b>now</b> we can be home by ten.</i>
<b>outlast</b>	Live longer than. <i>The kind of beauty that will <b>outlast</b> youth.</i>
<b>pertain</b>	Be relevant to. <i>Their economic circumstances are vastly different from those which <b>pertained</b> in their land of origin.</i>



<b>place</b>	Score a goal by a place kick. <i>His score left him in ninth <b>place</b>.</i>
<b>presence</b>	The state or fact of existing, occurring, or being present. <i>He tested for the <b>presence</b> of radon.</i>
<b>present</b>	Something presented as a gift. <i>The <b>present</b> leader.</i>
<b>somewhere</b>	In or at or to some place someplace is used informally for somewhere. <i>She must be <b>somewhere</b>.</i>
