- *Used to refer to existence in the world in general.*
- *At this time; now.*
- *Used to draw attention to someone or something that has just arrived.*
- *To this place (especially toward the speaker).*
- *Used when indicating a time, point, or situation that has arrived or is happening.*
- *Used to indicate one's role in a particular situation.*
- *Used when gesturing to indicate the place intended.*
- *In or at this place; where the speaker or writer is.*

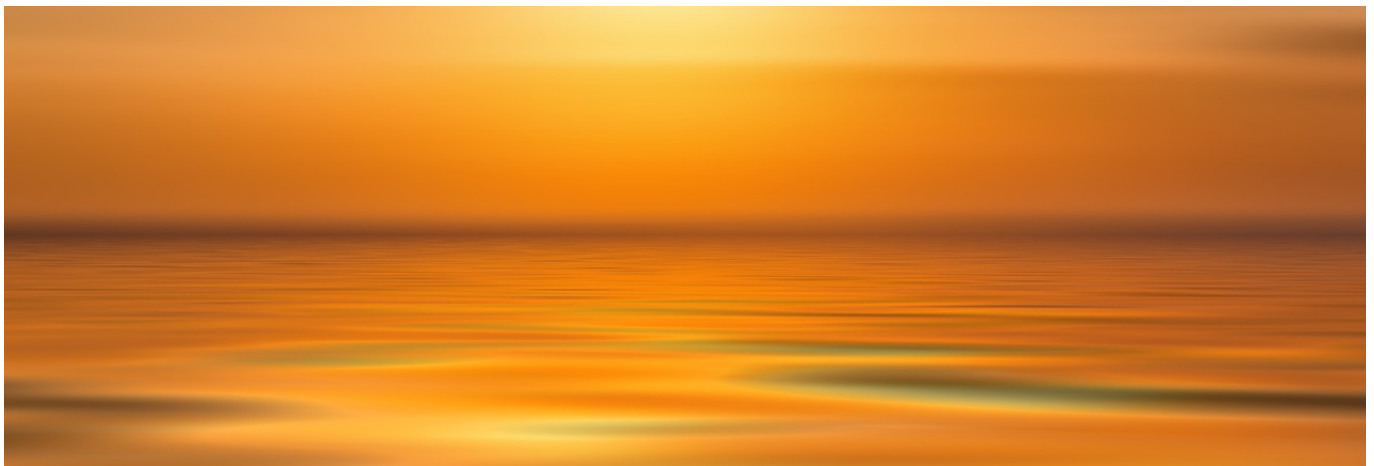
- *Used when introducing something or someone.*
- *In, at, or to this place or position.*
- *Used when giving something to someone.*
- *In this circumstance or respect or on this point or detail.*



Synonyms of "Here" as an adverb (11 Words)

close	Very near to someone or something; with very little space between. <i>The bullet didn't come close.</i>
<u>closer</u>	(comparative of 'near' or 'close') within a shorter distance. <i>Come closer my dear.</i>
hither	To or towards this place. <i>I little knew then that such calamity would summon me hither.</i>
in this location	To or toward the inside of.
in this place	To or toward the inside of.
in this spot	To or toward the inside of.

near	At or to a short distance away nearby. <i>Don t shoot until they come near.</i>
nearer	Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>They drew nearer.</i>
now	Under the present circumstances; as a result of something that has recently happened. <i>Where are you living now.</i>
over here	Beyond the top or upper surface or edge; forward from an upright position.
to here	At this time; now.

happen	Happen occur or be the case in the course of events or by chance. <i>Two hours had passed and still nothing had happened.</i>
heretofore	Before now. <i>Diseases that heretofore were usually confined to rural areas.</i>
hitherto	Used in negative statement to describe a situation that has existed up to this point or up to the present time. <i>Hitherto part of French West Africa Benin achieved independence in 1960.</i>
live	Inhabit or live in be an inhabitant of. <i>Tossed a live cigarette out the window.</i>
location	A position or address in computer memory. <i>The location of new housing beyond the existing built up areas.</i>
meet	Fill or meet a want or need. <i>The meet with Frank is on for 10 o clock.</i>
now	Fashionable or up to date. <i>If we leave now we can be home by ten.</i>
outlast	Live longer than. <i>The kind of beauty that will outlast youth.</i>
<u>pertain</u>	Be relevant to. <i>Their economic circumstances are vastly different from those which pertained in their land of origin.</i>

place	Score a goal by a place kick. <i>His score left him in ninth place.</i>
<u>presence</u>	The state or fact of existing, occurring, or being present. <i>He tested for the presence of radon.</i>
present	Something presented as a gift. <i>The present leader.</i>
