- *Showing extreme courage; especially of actions courageously undertaken in desperation as a last resort.*

<b>enormous</b>	Very large in size, quantity, or extent. <i>The possibilities are <b>enormous</b>.</i>
<b><u>epic</u></b>	Relating to or characteristic of an epic or epics. <i>The gig last night was <b>epic</b>.</i>
<b><u>expansive</u></b>	Able or tending to expand or characterized by expansion. <i>Wine made the guest <b>expansive</b>.</i>
<b><u>fearless</u></b>	Oblivious of dangers or perils or calmly resolute in facing them. <i><b>Fearless</b> reporters and photographers.</i>
<b><u>gallant</u></b>	Having or displaying great dignity or nobility. <i>A <b>gallant</b> pageant.</i>
<b>grand</b>	Very good or enjoyable; excellent. <i>We had a <b>grand</b> day.</i>
<b>herculean</b>	Displaying superhuman strength or power. <i>A <b>herculean</b> task.</i>

<b>indomitable</b>	Impossible to subdue or defeat. <i>A woman of <b>indomitable</b> spirit.</i>

<b>plucky</b>	Marked by courage and determination in the face of difficulties or danger; robust and uninhibited. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
<b>prodigious</b>	Remarkably or impressively great in extent, size, or degree. <i>Rumours of <b>prodigious</b> happenings such as monstrous births.</i>
<b>stalwart</b>	Strongly built and sturdy. <i>Proud of her tall <b>stalwart</b> son.</i>
<b>stupendous</b>	So great in size or force or extent as to elicit awe. <i>The most <b>stupendous</b> views.</i>
<b>superhuman</b>	Above or beyond the human or demanding more than human power or endurance. <i><b>Superhuman</b> strength.</i>
<b>titanic</b>	Of great force or power. <i>A series of <b>titanic</b> explosions.</i>
<b>unafraid</b>	Feeling no fear or anxiety. <i>She was calm and <b>unafraid</b>.</i>
<b>undaunted</b>	Resolutely courageous. <i><b>Undaunted</b> in the face of death.</i>
<b>valiant</b>	Possessing or showing courage or determination. <i>She made a <b>valiant</b> effort to hold her anger in check.</i>
<b>valorous</b>	Having or showing valor. <i><b>Valorous</b> deeds on the field of honour.</i>

<b><u>daredevil</u></b>	Presumptuously daring. <i>A <b>daredevil</b> skydiver.</i>
<b>daring</b>	Adventurous courage. <i>The <b>daring</b> of the players brings fortune or ruin.</i>
<b>daringly</b>	In an original manner.
<b><u>gallant</u></b>	A man who is charmingly attentive to women. <i>A <b>gallant</b> warrior.</i>
<b>gallantry</b>	Sexual intrigue. <i>A medal awarded for outstanding <b>gallantry</b> during the raid.</i>

<b><u>manly</u></b>	Characteristic of a man. <i><b>Manly</b> sports.</i>
