Definitions of "Hiatus" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “hiatus” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An interruption in the intensity or amount of something.*
- *A pause or break in continuity in a sequence or activity.*
- *A missing piece (as a gap in a manuscript).*
- *A natural opening or perforation through a bone or a membranous structure.*
- *A break between two vowels coming together but not in the same syllable, as in the ear and cooperate.*

Synonyms of "Hiatus" as a noun (24 Words)

abatement	The act of abating. <i>It was resolved to serve an abatement notice.</i>
aperture	A device that controls amount of light admitted. <i>A refracting telescope with an aperture of 3 inches.</i>
breach	A failure to perform some promised act or obligation. <i>A breach of confidence.</i>

break	Dance music featuring breakbeats. <i>A weekend break in the Cotswolds.</i>
breathing space	The bodily process of inhalation and exhalation; the process of taking in oxygen from inhaled air and releasing carbon dioxide by exhalation.
cavity	A sizeable hole (usually in the ground). <i>The abdominal cavity.</i>
cleft	A long narrow opening.
fissure	(anatomy) a long narrow slit or groove that divides an organ into lobes. <i>The bacteria survive around vents or fissures in the deep ocean floor.</i>
foramen	A natural opening or perforation through a bone or a membranous structure.
gap	A narrow opening. <i>There are many gaps in our understanding of what happened.</i>
hole	A hollow place in a solid body or surface. <i>Intriguing as it sounds the theory is full of holes.</i>
interlude	A thing occurring or done during an interval. <i>Short instrumental interludes between songs.</i>
intermission	A time interval during which there is a temporary cessation of something. <i>He was granted an intermission in his studies.</i>
interruption	A time interval during which there is a temporary cessation of something. <i>Students returning to education after an interruption in their career.</i>
interval	A component of activity in interval training. <i>United led 3 0 at the interval.</i>
lacuna	An ornamental sunken panel in a ceiling or dome. <i>The journal has filled a lacuna in Middle Eastern studies.</i>
lull	A pause during which things are calm or activities are diminished. <i>For two days there had been a lull in the fighting.</i>
opening	The act of opening something. <i>The ray of light revealed his cautious opening of the door.</i>
pause	A control allowing the temporary interruption of recording, playback, or other process. <i>She dropped me outside during a brief pause in the rain.</i>
reprieve	A cancellation or postponement of a punishment. <i>He accepted the death sentence and refused to appeal for a reprieve.</i>

respite	The act of relieving; postponing or remitting punishment. <i>The refugee encampments will provide some respite from the suffering.</i>
rest	The sign denoting a musical rest. <i>You look as though you need a rest.</i>
suspension	Temporary cessation or suspension. <i>The agitator in the vat keeps the slurry in suspension.</i>
time out	A reading of a point in time as given by a clock.

Associations of "Hiatus" (30 Words)

abeyance	Temporary cessation or suspension. <i>Matters were held in abeyance pending further enquiries.</i>
cease	Cease is a noun only in the phrase without cease end. <i>They were asked to cease all military activity.</i>
cessation	The fact or process of ending or being brought to an end. <i>The cessation of hostilities.</i>
deadlock	Secure a door with a deadlock. <i>Ashton broke the deadlock with a penalty after 15 minutes.</i>
desist	Stop doing something; cease or abstain. <i>Each pledged to desist from acts of sabotage.</i>
discontinue	Prevent completion. <i>He discontinued his visits.</i>
discontinuity	A break in or lack of continuity. <i>There is no significant discontinuity between modern and primitive societies.</i>
disruption	Disturbance or problems which interrupt an event, activity, or process. <i>No industry is immune to digital disruption.</i>
halt	Come to a halt stop moving. <i>There is growing pressure to halt the bloodshed.</i>
halting	Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. <i>Uttered a few halting words of sorrow.</i>
immovable	Immovable property. <i>The immovable hills.</i>

interfere	Of light or other electromagnetic waveforms interact to produce interference. <i>You promised not to interfere.</i>
intermission	The act of suspending activity temporarily. <i>The daily work goes on without intermission.</i>
interruption	Some abrupt occurrence that interrupts an ongoing activity. <i>She ignored the interruption and carried on.</i>
<u>intervene</u>	Be situated between things. <i>Eight days intervened.</i>
layover	A period of rest or waiting before a further stage in a journey. <i>There was only a forty eight minute layover.</i>
leaving	The act of departing.
momentarily	For a very short time. <i>We paused momentarily before proceeding.</i>
<u>pause</u>	Interrupt temporarily an activity before continuing. <i>The speaker paused.</i>
preside	Act as president. <i>Johnson has presided over eight matches since Beck s dismissal.</i>
recess	Make a recess in. <i>Recess the piece of wood.</i>
<u>refrain</u>	Stop oneself from doing something. <i>He refrained from hitting him back.</i>
reprieve	Relieve temporarily. <i>Under the new regime prisoners under sentence of death were reprieved.</i>
<u>respite</u>	Grant a respite to someone especially a person condemned to death. <i>A Letter of Licence by which creditors agreed to postpone claims brought only temporary respite.</i>
<u>rest</u>	Give a rest to. <i>The field should be grazed or rested.</i>
stanch	Stop the flow of a liquid.
standstill	A situation in which no progress can be made or no advancement is possible. <i>The traffic came to a standstill.</i>
<u>stasis</u>	An abnormal state in which the normal flow of a liquid (such as blood) is slowed or stopped. <i>Creative stasis.</i>

- suspension** Temporary cessation or suspension.
*A **suspension** of maize starch in arachis oil.*
