boost	A source of help or encouragement leading to increase or improvement. <i>The cut in interest rates will give a further boost to the economy.</i>
cost increase	The property of having material worth (often indicated by the amount of money something would bring if sold).
<u>elevation</u>	The angle of something with the horizontal, especially of a gun or of the direction of a celestial object. <i>A prayer recommended for lay people at the elevation of the Host.</i>
enlargement	A photographic print that has been enlarged. <i>Talks on the enlargement of the EU.</i>
expansion	A discussion that provides additional information. <i>The rapid expansion of suburban London.</i>
<u>extension</u>	The action or process of enlarging or extending something. <i>Extension of the program to all in need.</i>
footslog	A long and exhausting walk or march.

growth	The process of developing physically, mentally, or spiritually. <i>The growth of culture.</i>
hiking	A long walk usually for exercise or pleasure. <i>She enjoys hiking and climbing in her spare time.</i>
inflation	(cosmology) a brief exponential expansion of the universe (faster than the speed of light) postulated to have occurred shortly after the big bang. <i>Tax allowances and excise duties were increased in line with inflation.</i>
journey on foot	The act of traveling from one place to another.
march	A piece of music composed to accompany marching or with a rhythm suggestive of marching. <i>Sousa wrote the best marches.</i>
multiplication	A multiplicative increase. <i>Repeated copying leads to a multiplication of errors.</i>
plod	The act of walking with a slow heavy gait. <i>I could recognize his plod anywhere.</i>
raise	An act of lifting or raising a part of the body while holding a weight. <i>He got a 3 raise.</i>
rise	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>They cheered the rise of the hot air balloon.</i>
salary increase	Something that remunerates.
slog	A forceful and uncontrolled hit, especially in cricket. <i>It wasn't all slog during those years.</i>
swelling	A natural rounded protuberance. <i>Painless swellings may appear in the lower abdomen.</i>
traipse	A tedious or tiring journey on foot.
trek	A haul of fish caught using a trek net. <i>A trek to the South Pole.</i>
trudge	A long difficult walk. <i>He began the long trudge back to Stokenchurch Street.</i>
wage hike	Something that remunerates.
wage increase	Something that remunerates.
walk	A path set aside for walking. <i>He took a walk after lunch.</i>

boost	Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>Boost the voltage in an electrical circuit.</i>
footslog	(especially of a soldier) walk or march for a long distance, typically wearily or with effort. <i>They footslogged around the two villages.</i>
go on foot	Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life.
hike up	Increase.
hitch up	Travel by getting free rides from motorists.
<u>hoist</u>	Raise (something) by means of ropes and pulleys. <i>They hoisted the patient onto the operating table.</i>
increase	Make bigger or more. <i>The boss finally increased her salary.</i>
inflate	Become inflated. <i>Inflate a balloons.</i>

<u>march</u>	March in protest take part in a demonstration. <i>Thousands marched behind the coffin.</i>
mark up	Mark by some ceremony or observation.
plod	Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud. <i>We plodded back up the hill.</i>
pull up	Perform an act, usually with a negative connotation.
push up	Move strenuously and with effort.
put up	Estimate.
raise	Raise from a lower to a higher position. <i>The alarm was raised when he failed to return home.</i>
slog	Walk or move with difficulty or effort. <i>They ll be slogging it out in the first round of the cup next Sunday.</i>
<u>traipse</u>	Walk or tramp about. <i>Students had to traipse all over London to attend lectures.</i>
<u>trek</u>	Fish using a trek net. <i>Many licences are given to men who trek for sport rather than professional fishermen.</i>
trudge	Walk slowly and with heavy steps, typically because of exhaustion or harsh conditions. <i>She trudged through blinding snow.</i>
<u>up</u>	Raise or pick up something. <i>Everybody was cheering and upping their glasses.</i>
walk	Take a walk go for a walk walk for pleasure. <i>His car had broken down and he d had to walk.</i>

scale	Remove the scales from. <i>The scale of the model.</i>

walker	New Zealand runner who in 1975 became the first person to run a mile in less that 3 minutes and 50 seconds (born in 1952). <i>A fell walker.</i>
walking	Close enough to be walked to. <i>Walking distance.</i>
