<b>growth</b>	The process of developing physically, mentally, or spiritually. <i>The <b>growth</b> of culture.</i>
<b>hiking</b>	A long walk usually for exercise or pleasure. <i>She enjoys <b>hiking</b> and climbing in her spare time.</i>
<b>inflation</b>	(cosmology) a brief exponential expansion of the universe (faster than the speed of light) postulated to have occurred shortly after the big bang. <i>Tax allowances and excise duties were increased in line with <b>inflation</b>.</i>
<b>journey on foot</b>	The act of traveling from one place to another.
<b>march</b>	A piece of music composed to accompany marching or with a rhythm suggestive of marching. <i>Sousa wrote the best <b>marches</b>.</i>
<b>multiplication</b>	A multiplicative increase. <i>Repeated copying leads to a <b>multiplication</b> of errors.</i>
<b>plod</b>	The act of walking with a slow heavy gait. <i>I could recognize his <b>plod</b> anywhere.</i>
<b>raise</b>	An act of lifting or raising a part of the body while holding a weight. <i>He got a 3 <b>raise</b>.</i>
<b>rise</b>	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>They cheered the <b>rise</b> of the hot air balloon.</i>
<b>salary increase</b>	Something that remunerates.
<b>slog</b>	A forceful and uncontrolled hit, especially in cricket. <i>It wasn't all <b>slog</b> during those years.</i>
<b>swelling</b>	A natural rounded protuberance. <i>Painless <b>swellings</b> may appear in the lower abdomen.</i>
<b>traipse</b>	A tedious or tiring journey on foot.
<b>trek</b>	A haul of fish caught using a trek net. <i>A <b>trek</b> to the South Pole.</i>
<b>trudge</b>	A long difficult walk. <i>He began the long <b>trudge</b> back to Stokenchurch Street.</i>
<b>wage hike</b>	Something that remunerates.
<b>wage increase</b>	Something that remunerates.
<b>walk</b>	A path set aside for walking. <i>He took a <b>walk</b> after lunch.</i>

<b>boost</b>	Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i><b>Boost</b> the voltage in an electrical circuit.</i>
<b>footslog</b>	(especially of a soldier) walk or march for a long distance, typically wearily or with effort. <i>They <b>footslogged</b> around the two villages.</i>
<b>go on foot</b>	Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life.

<b>march</b>	March in protest take part in a demonstration. <i>Thousands <b>marched</b> behind the coffin.</i>
<b>mark up</b>	Mark by some ceremony or observation.
<b>plod</b>	Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud. <i>We <b>plodded</b> back up the hill.</i>
<b>pull up</b>	Perform an act, usually with a negative connotation.
<b>push up</b>	Move strenuously and with effort.
<b>put up</b>	Estimate.
<b>raise</b>	Raise from a lower to a higher position. <i>The alarm was <b>raised</b> when he failed to return home.</i>
<b>slog</b>	Walk or move with difficulty or effort. <i>They ll be <b>slogging</b> it out in the first round of the cup next Sunday.</i>
<b>traipse</b>	Walk or tramp about. <i>Students had to <b>traipse</b> all over London to attend lectures.</i>
<b>trek</b>	Fish using a trek net. <i>Many licences are given to men who <b>trek</b> for sport rather than professional fishermen.</i>
<b>trudge</b>	Walk slowly and with heavy steps, typically because of exhaustion or harsh conditions. <i>She <b>trudged</b> through blinding snow.</i>
<b>up</b>	Raise or pick up something. <i>Everybody was cheering and <b>upping</b> their glasses.</i>
<b>walk</b>	Take a walk go for a walk walk for pleasure. <i>His car had broken down and he d had to <b>walk</b>.</i>
