
### Hilarious as an Adjective

- Extremely amusing.






# Synonyms of "Hilarious" as an adjective (26 Words)

amusing	Arousing or provoking laughter. An <b>amusing</b> speaker.
animated	Full of life or excitement; lively. An <b>animated</b> cartoon.
boisterous	(of weather or water) wild or stormy. <b>Boisterous</b> winds and waves.
<u>cheerful</u>	Noticeably happy and optimistic. A <b>cheerful</b> greeting.
droll	Comical in an odd or whimsical manner. His unique brand of <b>droll</b> self mockery.
<u>entertaining</u>	Providing amusement or enjoyment. An <b>entertaining</b> puppet show.
farcical	Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce. <i>He considered the whole idea</i> <b>farcical</b> .



funny	Not as expected. Suddenly my stomach felt <b>funny</b> .
high-spirited	Joyously unrestrained.
<u>hysterical</u>	Relating to or suffering from hysteria. The band were mobbed by <b>hysterical</b> fans.
hysterically funny	Characterized by or arising from psychoneurotic hysteria- Morris Fishbein.
jocular	Characterized by jokes and good humor. She sounded in a <b>jocular</b> mood.
<u>jolly</u>	Happy and cheerful. We had a very <b>jolly</b> time.
<u>jovial</u>	Cheerful and friendly. She was in a <b>jovial</b> mood.
lively	Intellectually stimulating or perceptive. A <b>lively</b> gait.
<u>merry</u>	Offering fun and gaiety. After the third beer he began to feel quite <b>merry</b> .
mirthful	Full of or showing high-spirited merriment. A <b>mirthful</b> laugh.
<u>noisy</u>	Full of or characterized by loud and nonmusical sounds. <i>The pub was crowded and <b>noisy</b>.</i>
riotous	Hilariously funny. <i>Riotous</i> times.
<u>rowdy</u>	Noisy and disorderly. It was a <b>rowdy</b> but good natured crowd.
screaming	Giving a long, loud, piercing cry or cries. In <b>screaming</b> agony.
<u>sparkling</u>	(of a drink) effervescent; fizzy. <i>Sparkling</i> wines.
uproarious	Marked by or causing boisterous merriment or convulsive laughter. <i>An uproarious party.</i>
very funny	Being the exact same one; not any other.
<u>vivacious</u>	Vigorous and animated. <i>Her vivacious and elegant mother.</i>
witty	Showing or characterized by quick and inventive verbal humour. Marlowe was charming and <b>witty</b> .

# **Associations of "Hilarious" (30 Words)**

<u>amusement</u>	The provision or enjoyment of entertainment. On the promenade the <b>amusement</b> s were still open.
<u>badinage</u>	Humorous or witty conversation. <i>He developed a nice line in <b>badinage</b> with the Labour leader.</i>



<u>banter</u>	The playful and friendly exchange of teasing remarks. <i>There was much good natured banter</i> .
buffoonery	Behaviour that is ridiculous but amusing. The film is full of wordplay and <b>buffoonery</b> .
<u>comedy</u>	The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. <i>Satiric comedy</i> .
enjoy	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>The industry</i> <b>enjoy</b> ed a boom.
<u>entertaining</u>	Providing amusement or enjoyment. Films should be <b>entertaining</b> .
<u>exhilaration</u>	A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. They felt the <b>exhilaration</b> of victory.
exultant	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
fun	A source of fun. They are just <b>fun</b> ning you.
funny	Slightly but undefinably unwell. <i>Funny stories that made everybody laugh.</i>
<u>glad</u>	Any of numerous plants of the genus Gladiolus native chiefly to tropical and South Africa having sword-shaped leaves and one-sided spikes of brightly colored funnel-shaped flowers; widely cultivated. <i>He will be glad to carry your bags.</i>
happy	Satisfied with the quality or standard of. We re just <b>happy</b> that he s still alive.
hilarity	Extreme amusement, especially when expressed by laughter. <i>His incredulous expression was the cause of much <b>hilarity</b>.</i>
humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>He was in a bad humor.</i>
humorous	Having or showing a sense of humour. <i>Humorous</i> cartoons.
jest	A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. <i>It was said in <b>jest</b>.</i>
jocular	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>His voice was <b>jocular</b>.</i>
<u>joke</u>	Make jokes talk humorously or flippantly. She was in a mood to tell <b>joke</b> s.



jollity	The quality of being cheerful. <i>He was full of false <b>jollity</b>.</i>
<u>jolly</u>	Happy and cheerful. <i>He was a <b>jolly</b> man full of jokes.</i>
<u>jovial</u>	Cheerful and friendly. A <b>jovial</b> old gentleman.
joviality	A jovial nature.
<u>joyous</u>	Full of or characterized by joy. Felt a <b>joyous</b> abandon.
laugh	A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. <i>Thanks for the <b>laugh</b></i> .
laughing	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing</i> children.
merry	Offering fun and gaiety. A <b>merry</b> evening.
slapstick	Characterized by horseplay and physical action. A loud and exhilarating rattle of bladders and <b>slapstick</b> s.
witticism	A message whose ingenuity or verbal skill or incongruity has the power to evoke laughter. Maurice roared with laughter at his own <b>witticism</b> s.
<u>witty</u>	Showing or characterized by quick and inventive verbal humour. <i>A witty remark.</i>
