<b>animated</b>	Full of life or excitement; lively. <i>An <b>animated</b> cartoon.</i>
<b>boisterous</b>	(of weather or water) wild or stormy. <i><b>Boisterous</b> winds and waves.</i>
<b><u>cheerful</u></b>	Noticeably happy and optimistic. <i>A <b>cheerful</b> greeting.</i>
<b>droll</b>	Comical in an odd or whimsical manner. <i>His unique brand of <b>droll</b> self mockery.</i>
<b><u>entertaining</u></b>	Providing amusement or enjoyment. <i>An <b>entertaining</b> puppet show.</i>

<b>funny</b>	Not as expected. <i>Suddenly my stomach felt <b>funny</b>.</i>
<b>high-spirited</b>	Joyously unrestrained.
<b><u>hysterical</u></b>	Relating to or suffering from hysteria. <i>The band were mobbed by <b>hysterical</b> fans.</i>
<b>hysterically funny</b>	Characterized by or arising from psychoneurotic hysteria- Morris Fishbein.
<b>jocular</b>	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>She sounded in a <b>jocular</b> mood.</i>
<b><u>jolly</u></b>	Happy and cheerful. <i>We had a very <b>jolly</b> time.</i>
<b><u>jovial</u></b>	Cheerful and friendly. <i>She was in a <b>jovial</b> mood.</i>
<b>lively</b>	Intellectually stimulating or perceptive. <i>A <b>lively</b> gait.</i>
<b><u>merry</u></b>	Offering fun and gaiety. <i>After the third beer he began to feel quite <b>merry</b>.</i>
<b>mirthful</b>	Full of or showing high-spirited merriment. <i>A <b>mirthful</b> laugh.</i>
<b><u>noisy</u></b>	Full of or characterized by loud and nonmusical sounds. <i>The pub was crowded and <b>noisy</b>.</i>
<b>riotous</b>	Hilariously funny. <i><b>Riotous</b> times.</i>
<b><u>rowdy</u></b>	Noisy and disorderly. <i>It was a <b>rowdy</b> but good natured crowd.</i>
<b>screaming</b>	Giving a long, loud, piercing cry or cries. <i>In <b>screaming</b> agony.</i>
<b><u>sparkling</u></b>	(of a drink) effervescent; fizzy. <i><b>Sparkling</b> wines.</i>
<b>uproarious</b>	Marked by or causing boisterous merriment or convulsive laughter. <i>An <b>uproarious</b> party.</i>
<b>very funny</b>	Being the exact same one; not any other.
<b><u>vivacious</u></b>	Vigorous and animated. <i>Her <b>vivacious</b> and elegant mother.</i>
<b><u>witty</u></b>	Showing or characterized by quick and inventive verbal humour. <i>Marlowe was charming and <b>witty</b>.</i>

**amusement** The provision or enjoyment of entertainment.  
*On the promenade the **amusements** were still open.*

**badinage** Humorous or witty conversation.  
*He developed a nice line in **badinage** with the Labour leader.*

<b>banter</b>	The playful and friendly exchange of teasing remarks. <i>There was much good natured <b>banter</b>.</i>
<b>buffoonery</b>	Behaviour that is ridiculous but amusing. <i>The film is full of wordplay and <b>buffoonery</b>.</i>
<b>comedy</b>	The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. <i>Satiric <b>comedy</b>.</i>
<b>enjoy</b>	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>The industry <b>enjoyed</b> a boom.</i>
<b>entertaining</b>	Providing amusement or enjoyment. <i>Films should be <b>entertaining</b>.</i>
<b>exhilaration</b>	A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. <i>They felt the <b>exhilaration</b> of victory.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
<b>fun</b>	A source of fun. <i>They are just <b>funning</b> you.</i>
<b>funny</b>	Slightly but undefinably unwell. <i><b>Funny</b> stories that made everybody laugh.</i>
<b>glad</b>	Any of numerous plants of the genus <i>Gladiolus</i> native chiefly to tropical and South Africa having sword-shaped leaves and one-sided spikes of brightly colored funnel-shaped flowers; widely cultivated. <i>He will be <b>glad</b> to carry your bags.</i>
<b>happy</b>	Satisfied with the quality or standard of. <i>We re just <b>happy</b> that he s still alive.</i>
<b>hilarity</b>	Extreme amusement, especially when expressed by laughter. <i>His incredulous expression was the cause of much <b>hilarity</b>.</i>
<b>humor</b>	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>He was in a bad <b>humor</b>.</i>
<b>humorous</b>	Having or showing a sense of humour. <i><b>Humorous</b> cartoons.</i>
<b>jest</b>	A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. <i>It was said in <b>jest</b>.</i>
<b>jocular</b>	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>His voice was <b>jocular</b>.</i>
<b>joke</b>	Make jokes talk humorously or flippantly. <i>She was in a mood to tell <b>jokes</b>.</i>

<b>jollity</b>	The quality of being cheerful. <i>He was full of false <b>jollity</b>.</i>
<b>jolly</b>	Happy and cheerful. <i>He was a <b>jolly</b> man full of jokes.</i>
<b>jovial</b>	Cheerful and friendly. <i>A <b>jovial</b> old gentleman.</i>
<b>joviality</b>	A jovial nature.
<b>joyous</b>	Full of or characterized by joy. <i>Felt a <b>joyous</b> abandon.</i>
<b>laugh</b>	A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. <i>Thanks for the <b>laugh</b>.</i>
<b>laughing</b>	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i><b>Laughing</b> children.</i>
<b>merry</b>	Offering fun and gaiety. <i>A <b>merry</b> evening.</i>
<b>slapstick</b>	Characterized by horseplay and physical action. <i>A loud and exhilarating rattle of bladders and <b>slapsticks</b>.</i>
<b>witticism</b>	A message whose ingenuity or verbal skill or incongruity has the power to evoke laughter. <i>Maurice roared with laughter at his own <b>witticisms</b>.</i>
<b>witty</b>	Showing or characterized by quick and inventive verbal humour. <i>A <b>witty</b> remark.</i>
