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| amusing | Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>An amusing speaker.</i> |
| animated | Full of life or excitement; lively. <i>An animated cartoon.</i> |
| boisterous | (of weather or water) wild or stormy. <i>Boisterous winds and waves.</i> |
| <u>cheerful</u> | Noticeably happy and optimistic. <i>A cheerful greeting.</i> |
| droll | Comical in an odd or whimsical manner. <i>His unique brand of droll self mockery.</i> |
| <u>entertaining</u> | Providing amusement or enjoyment. <i>An entertaining puppet show.</i> |
| farcical | Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce. <i>He considered the whole idea farcical.</i> |

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| funny | Not as expected. <i>Suddenly my stomach felt funny.</i> |
| high-spirited | Joyously unrestrained. |
| <u>hysterical</u> | Relating to or suffering from hysteria. <i>The band were mobbed by hysterical fans.</i> |
| hysterically funny | Characterized by or arising from psychoneurotic hysteria- Morris Fishbein. |
| jocular | Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>She sounded in a jocular mood.</i> |
| <u>jolly</u> | Happy and cheerful. <i>We had a very jolly time.</i> |
| <u>jovial</u> | Cheerful and friendly. <i>She was in a jovial mood.</i> |
| lively | Intellectually stimulating or perceptive. <i>A lively gait.</i> |
| <u>merry</u> | Offering fun and gaiety. <i>After the third beer he began to feel quite merry.</i> |
| mirthful | Full of or showing high-spirited merriment. <i>A mirthful laugh.</i> |
| <u>noisy</u> | Full of or characterized by loud and nonmusical sounds. <i>The pub was crowded and noisy.</i> |
| riotous | Hilariously funny. <i>Riotous times.</i> |
| <u>rowdy</u> | Noisy and disorderly. <i>It was a rowdy but good natured crowd.</i> |
| screaming | Giving a long, loud, piercing cry or cries. <i>In screaming agony.</i> |
| <u>sparkling</u> | (of a drink) effervescent; fizzy. <i>Sparkling wines.</i> |
| uproarious | Marked by or causing boisterous merriment or convulsive laughter. <i>An uproarious party.</i> |
| very funny | Being the exact same one; not any other. |
| <u>vivacious</u> | Vigorous and animated. <i>Her vivacious and elegant mother.</i> |
| <u>witty</u> | Showing or characterized by quick and inventive verbal humour. <i>Marlowe was charming and witty.</i> |

amusement The provision or enjoyment of entertainment.
*On the promenade the **amusements** were still open.*

badinage Humorous or witty conversation.
*He developed a nice line in **badinage** with the Labour leader.*

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| banter | The playful and friendly exchange of teasing remarks. <i>There was much good natured banter.</i> |
| buffoonery | Behaviour that is ridiculous but amusing. <i>The film is full of wordplay and buffoonery.</i> |
| comedy | The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. <i>Satiric comedy.</i> |
| enjoy | Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>The industry enjoyed a boom.</i> |
| entertaining | Providing amusement or enjoyment. <i>Films should be entertaining.</i> |
| exhilaration | A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. <i>They felt the exhilaration of victory.</i> |
| exultant | Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the exultant crowds.</i> |
| fun | A source of fun. <i>They are just funning you.</i> |
| funny | Slightly but undefinably unwell. <i>Funny stories that made everybody laugh.</i> |
| glad | Any of numerous plants of the genus <i>Gladiolus</i> native chiefly to tropical and South Africa having sword-shaped leaves and one-sided spikes of brightly colored funnel-shaped flowers; widely cultivated. <i>He will be glad to carry your bags.</i> |
| happy | Satisfied with the quality or standard of. <i>We re just happy that he s still alive.</i> |
| hilarity | Extreme amusement, especially when expressed by laughter. <i>His incredulous expression was the cause of much hilarity.</i> |
| humor | The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>He was in a bad humor.</i> |
| humorous | Having or showing a sense of humour. <i>Humorous cartoons.</i> |
| jest | A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. <i>It was said in jest.</i> |
| jocular | Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>His voice was jocular.</i> |
| joke | Make jokes talk humorously or flippantly. <i>She was in a mood to tell jokes.</i> |

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| jollity | The quality of being cheerful. <i>He was full of false jollity.</i> |
| jolly | Happy and cheerful. <i>He was a jolly man full of jokes.</i> |
| jovial | Cheerful and friendly. <i>A jovial old gentleman.</i> |
| joviality | A jovial nature. |
| joyous | Full of or characterized by joy. <i>Felt a joyous abandon.</i> |
| laugh | A humorous anecdote or remark intended to provoke laughter. <i>Thanks for the laugh.</i> |
| laughing | Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing children.</i> |
| merry | Offering fun and gaiety. <i>A merry evening.</i> |
| slapstick | Characterized by horseplay and physical action. <i>A loud and exhilarating rattle of bladders and slapsticks.</i> |
| witticism | A message whose ingenuity or verbal skill or incongruity has the power to evoke laughter. <i>Maurice roared with laughter at his own witticisms.</i> |
| witty | Showing or characterized by quick and inventive verbal humour. <i>A witty remark.</i> |
