<b><u>gradient</u></b>	The rate of such a change. <i>Fail safe brakes for use on steep <b>gradients</b>.</i>
<b><u>heap</u></b>	An untidy or dilapidated place or vehicle. <i>Her clothes lay in a <b>heap</b> on the floor.</i>
<b>high ground</b>	A state of altered consciousness induced by alcohol or narcotics.
<b>hillock</b>	A small natural hill.
<b>hillside</b>	The sloping side of a hill.
<b>hummock</b>	A hump or ridge in an ice field.
<b>incline</b>	An inclined surface or plane a slope especially on a road or railway. <i>The road climbs a long <b>incline</b> through a forest.</i>
<b>j. j. hill</b>	A local and well-defined elevation of the land.
<b>james jerome hill</b>	A local and well-defined elevation of the land.
<b>knoll</b>	A small natural hill. <i>A grassy <b>knoll</b>.</i>
<b>load</b>	A burden of responsibility, worry, or grief. <i>The system broke down under excessive <b>loads</b>.</i>
<b><u>mass</u></b>	(in general use) weight. <i>We get <b>masses</b> of homework.</i>
<b>mesa</b>	An isolated flat-topped hill with steep sides, found in landscapes with horizontal strata. <i>The tribe was relatively safe on the <b>mesa</b> but they had to descend into the valley for water.</i>
<b>mound</b>	A raised mass of earth and stones created for purposes of defence or burial. <i>The dead were cremated and then buried at the centre of a great <b>mound</b>.</i>
<b>mount</b>	A mounting consisting of a piece of metal as in a ring or other jewelry that holds a gem in place. <i>Delicate <b>mounts</b> for necklaces earrings and rings.</i>
<b><u>mountain</u></b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>They sought refuge in the <b>mountains</b>.</i>
<b>pike</b>	Medieval weapon consisting of a spearhead attached to a long pole or pikestaff superseded by the bayonet.
<b>pile</b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>A Victorian Gothic <b>pile</b>.</i>
<b>pitcher's mound</b>	Structure consisting of an artificial heap or bank usually of earth or stones.



<b>prominence</b>	A stream of incandescent gas projecting above the sun's chromosphere. <i>He stood on the rocky <b>prominence</b>.</i>
<b>quantity</b>	The figure or symbol representing a quantity. <i>The <b>quantity</b> and quality of the fruit can be controlled.</i>
<b>rise</b>	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>The car couldn't make it up the <b>rise</b>.</i>
<b>rising ground</b>	A movement upward.
<b>sloping ground</b>	The property possessed by a line or surface that departs from the horizontal.
<b>stack</b>	A rectangular or cylindrical pile of hay or straw or of grain in sheaf. <i>There's <b>stacks</b> of work for me now.</i>
<b>tor</b>	A hill or rocky peak. <i>Glastonbury <b>Tor</b>.</i>
<b>tump</b>	A small rounded hill or mound; a tumulus.

<b>cliff</b>	A steep rock face, especially at the edge of the sea. <i>He stood on a high <b>cliff</b> overlooking the town.</i>
<b>climb</b>	A mountain hill or slope that is climbed. <i>The rate of <b>climb</b> can be set by the pilot.</i>
<b>climbing</b>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i><b>Climbing</b> equipment.</i>
<b>crest</b>	Have attached at the top. <i>She <b>crested</b> a hill and saw the valley spread out before her.</i>
<b>dune</b>	A ridge of sand created by the wind; found in deserts or near lakes and oceans. <i>A sand <b>dune</b>.</i>
<b>earthen</b>	(of a pot) made of baked or fired clay. <i>On shelves sat <b>earthen</b> jugs.</i>
<b>gradient</b>	The rate of such a change. <i>The path becomes very rough as the <b>gradient</b> increases.</i>
<b>hammock</b>	A small natural hill.
<b>hillock</b>	A small hill or mound.
<b>hummock</b>	A small natural hill.
<b>knoll</b>	A small natural hill. <i>A grassy <b>knoll</b>.</i>
<b>mound</b>	The position on a baseball team of the player who throws the ball for a batter to try to hit. <i>He built his castle high upon the <b>mound</b>.</i>
<b>mountain</b>	A large number or amount or extent. <i>They sought refuge in the <b>mountains</b>.</i>
<b>precipice</b>	A very steep cliff. <i>We swerved toward the edge of the <b>precipice</b>.</i>
<b>precipitous</b>	(of a change to a worse situation or condition) sudden and dramatic. <i>The track skirted a <b>precipitous</b> drop.</i>
<b>promontory</b>	A point of high land that juts out into the sea or a large lake; a headland. <i>A rocky <b>promontory</b>.</i>
<b>ravine</b>	A deep narrow steep-sided valley (especially one formed by running water).
<b>ridge</b>	Form into a ridge. <i>Buff your nails in order to smooth <b>ridges</b>.</i>
<b>rolling</b>	Done or happening in a steady and continuous way. <i>She used <b>rolling</b> r s as in Spanish.</i>



- sandstone** Sedimentary rock consisting of sand or quartz grains cemented together, typically red, yellow, or brown in colour.
- scarp** A very steep bank or slope an escarpment.  
*The **scarp** edge of the central plateau.*
- slide** A part of a machine or instrument that slides.
